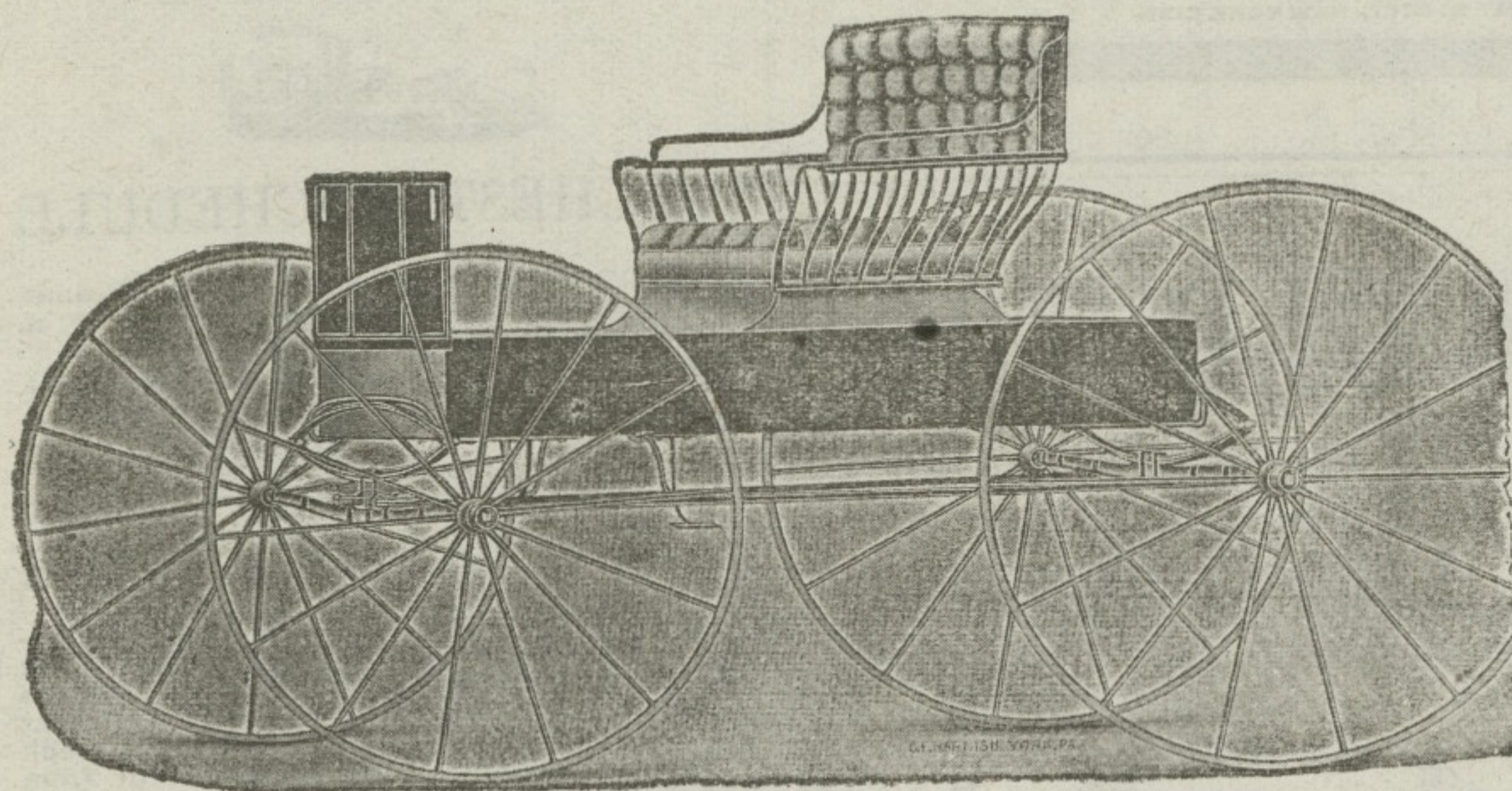

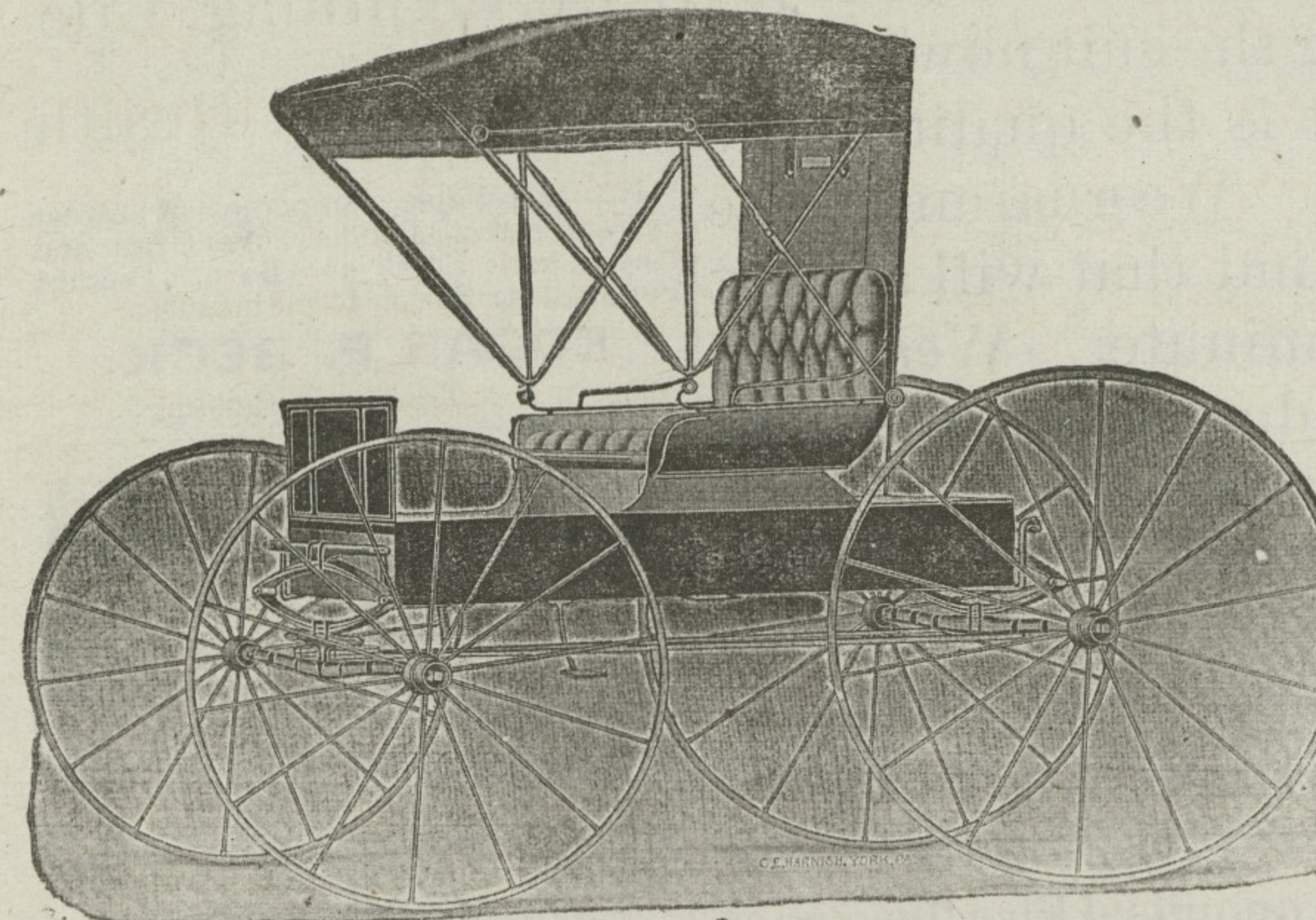

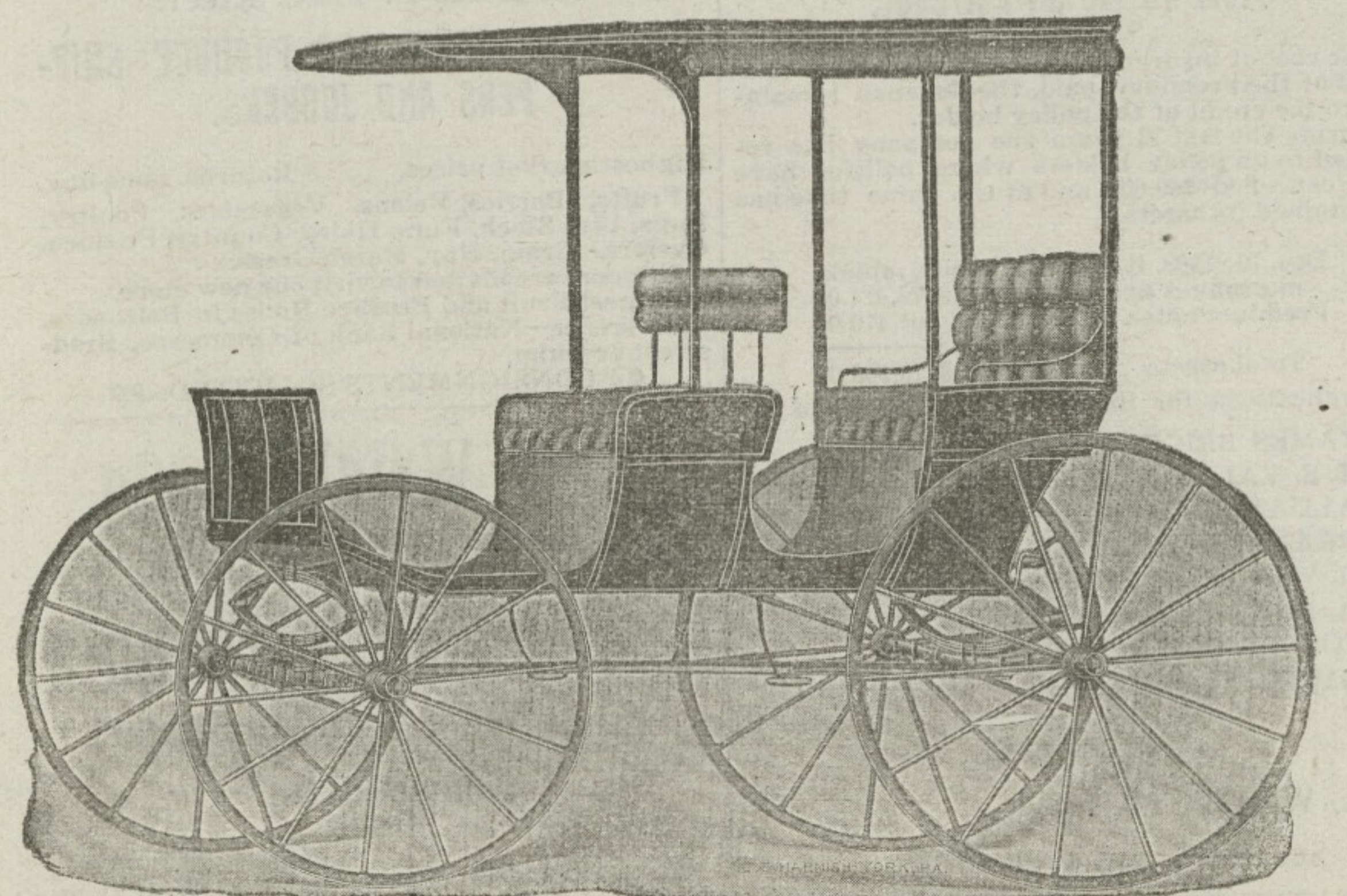

### A Severe Storm.

The heaviest electrical storm of the summer visited Chestertown and surrounding country on Sunday night, refreshing temporarily a sweltering community, but doing considerable damage. The rain fall was probably the heaviest of the year, it beginning to rain about 7:30 o'clock and continuing at intervals during the entire night. The heaviest rain fell about three o'clock Monday morning. Rain spouts were powerless to carry off the water as well as the town sewers, and as a consequence many cellars in the town were flooded, one having as much as six feet of water in it. The lightning was incessant, and the thunder was like unto a bombardment. A valuable horse belonging to Mr. Frank Shinn, in Quaker Neck, was killed, five sheep and two lambs at Mr. George Beck's in Lankford, the sheep belonged to Mr. Beck and the lambs to Mr. H. Stockton Startt were killed by lightning, and a shock of wheat in Mr. Herman's Bramble's field near Lank-

ford, was struck by lightning and destroyed. Several other shocks in Mr. Bramble's field were swept by the rain down to Brice's mill branch. The storm closed one of the hottest weeks ever experienced in this section in the month of June, and its severity may be due in a measure to the excessive heat. It furnished very little relief from the heat, for while the mercury did not rise so high, yet Monday was one of the most uncomfortable days of the summer on account of the humidity. The oldest residents of the town state that not within their memory has so much rain fallen during one storm as fell on Sunday night, and never have they known such blistering weather as we have experienced in these "rare" days of June. Lightning set fire to Mr. Fletcher Caulk's barn, near Sassafras, but it was not destroyed. A house in Cecilton was damaged by a bolt, and a shock of wheat in Mr. Walter T. Morris' wheat field, near town, was destroyed.

Late reports from the storm on Sunday night state that 10 sheep belonging to Mr. S. G. McCollister, of near Church Hill, were killed by lightning, a barn on the M. deK. Smith and Hynson heirs farm near Crumpton, was destroyed. This property, together with Mr. B. F. Shinn's horse, noted elsewhere, were insured with Jos. N. Wheatley & Co.

In the storm of Thursday night which followed the hottest day of the summer, two valuable colts belonging to Mr. Jesse R. Copper, near Kennedyville, were killed by lightning. They were insured with Mr. Edgar P. Beck.
