THE FARMER AND THE WHEAT CROP.

Receipts of new Southern wheat Saturday, 19,948 bushels; same day last year, 27,411 bushels. Receipts so far this season, 333,740 bushels; same time last year, 842,223 bushels. Extreme range of prices Saturday, \$1.01al.21; same day last year, 84c96 cents.

This is a brief official statement furnished to the members of the Baltimore Chamber of Commerce. It is seemingly insignificant, but it is of growing importance to the growers of wheat and to the consumers of bread. When it is considered that wheat in the nearby territory has now been harvested and that this is the period when it usually finds its way to the trading centers, the range of prices deserves more than passing notice. The prices received last year were regarded as satisfactory by most farmers, because in the early movement of the crop values generally touch their lowest ebb. This year the price levels are from 16 cents to 25 cents a bushel higher than a year ago and are on a basis not exceeded in this market for about 20 years. The price range is governed solely by the quality of the wheat offered. At 25 cents a bushel advance it means that the farmer who has raised 20 bushels of good wheat to the acre gets \$5 more profit from an acre than in 1908. On 100 acres this means \$500 and on 200 acres—not an unusual sowing by the tide-water Maryland and Virginia wheat farmers—it means an increased income to him of \$1,000 on this crop alone.

Assuming that it costs 70 cents to raise a bushel of wheat—and this is regarded as a fair estimate—for each 1,000 bushels of high-grade wheat grown the farmer pays \$700, including the harvesting and transportation charges. On the market to-day he will get for this \$1,250, or a net gain of \$550. For the purpose of calculation the cost of production is estimated, but it has generally been accepted that the first cost to the farmer of raising a bushel of wheat is between 60 and 70 cents. All above is profit. The increased cost of labor and the enhanced value of the land in recent years may have somewhat increased this cost. None will deny that at \$1 a bushel or above wheat is a profitable crop. This is what the farmer is now receiving.

It is true the quantity of wheat coming to market is less than a year ago, the local receipts then being more than double those now coming in. This difference in the supply would naturally have some effect on prices, but it is not believed that it altogether occasions the wide difference prevailing this year over last. That the wheat crop in this section is short is acknowledged, but is not admitted there is less than half a crop. Early in the harvesting period it was thought the yield would be two-thirds of an average. At present prices and with the present yield the farmer returned to account when the check is returned from his selling agent. There is another side to this prosperity picture. While the farmer derives his profit the bread consumer helps to pay the bill. High wheat prices mean high cost for flour, and this is paid by all—from the wealthiest individual to the poorest laborer who ekes out his living by constant struggle and economy. This is a sad side, but the farmer is enabled to spend freely, he, perhaps, makes it possible for greater employment at satisfactory pay for those who are not so fortunate in their sphere of life as he is in his.—Balti-Sun.

Proclamation.

WHEREAS, at the January Session of the General Assembly of Maryland, held in the year of our Lord, one thousand nine hundred and eight, an Act was passed proposing an amendment to Section 1 of Article 1 of the Constitution of the State which said Act is in the following words, to-wit:

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths of all the members of each of the two Houses concurring, that the following section be and the same is hereby proposed as an amendment to Section one of Article 1 of the Constitution of said State, and if adopted by the legal and qualified voters thereof, as herein provided, it shall supersede and stand in the place and stead of Section one of said Article one.

SEC. 1. All elections shall be by ballot, and every male citizen of the United States of the age of twenty-one years or upwards, who has been a resident of the State for two years and of the county in which he may offer to vote, for one year next preceding the election, and who, moreover, is duly registered as a qualified voter as provided in this Article, shall be entitled to vote in the ward or election district in which he resides, and in case any county or city shall be so divided as to form portions of different election districts for the election of Representatives in Congress, Senators, Delegates or other officers, then to entitle a person to vote for such officer, he must have been a resident of that part of the county or city which shall form a part of the electoral district in which he offers to vote, for one year next preceding the election; but a person who shall have acquired a residence in such county or city, entitling him to vote at any such election, shall not be entitled to vote in the election district from which he is removed, until he shall have acquired a residence in the part of the county or city to which he has removed.

Every male citizen of the United States having the above prescribed qualifications of age and residence shall be entitled to be registered so as to become a qualified voter if he be, first, a person who, on the first day of January in the year eighteen hundred and sixty-nine, or prior thereto, was entitled to vote under the laws of this State, or of any other State of the United States, wherein he then resided; or secondly, a person who, at the time of his registration, shall be a foreign born citizen of the United States naturalized before the first day of January in the year eighteen hundred and sixty-nine and the date of his naturalization shall be shown on the books of the State; or thirdly, a male descendant of such last mentioned person; or fourthly, a person who, at the time of his registration, shall be, in his own handwriting, with pen and ink, without aid, suggestion or memorandum whatsoever, and without any question or direction addressed to the officers of registration, make and sign an application to register correctly, stating in such application his name, age, date and place of birth, his occupation and profession, and the time and for the two years next preceding, the name or names of the persons, or the name of the person, who, at the time of his registration, shall be, in his own handwriting, with pen and ink, without aid, suggestion or memorandum whatsoever, and without any question or direction addressed to the officers of registration, make and sign an application to register correctly, stating in such application his name, age, date and place of birth, his occupation and profession, and the time and for the two years next preceding, the name or names of the persons, or the name of the person, who, at the time of his registration, shall be, in his own handwriting, with pen and ink, without aid, suggestion or memorandum whatsoever, and without any question or direction addressed to the officers of registration, make and sign an application to 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
