Drowned at Betterton.

In an effort to recover an oar which he had lost while rowing at Betterton at 2.30 o'clock Sunday afternoon, Mr. John H. Thalheimer, 23 years old, 1714 North Wolfe street, Baltimore, fell from the boat and was drowned before aid could reach him. He was accompanied by Mr. Stephen J. Purzer, cigar dealer, southwest corner of Calvert and Centre streets.

The accident occurred about 500 yards from shore, and at the time no boats were near the little craft which Mr. Thalheimer had been rowing. The hundreds of pleasure seekers on the shore were unaware of the tragedy until they were notified and the rowing was not generally known until boats with grappling irons went out to seek the body.

The body was found on Tuesday afternoon. It was terribly disfigured and eaten by the crabs. Undertaker W. H. Krusen prepared the remains for burial and they were shipped to the young man's home in Baltimore on the Susquehanna on Tuesday evening.
