THE "RULE or ruin" policy has struck
the Chestertown Water Board with a
vengeance, and conditions are about as
deplorable and ridiculous as they can
well be imagined.

THE Methodist Protestant Church has
lost a valuable member by the death of
Mr. Charles W. Simpson, of Baltimore,
brother of Mr. Thomas V. Simpson, of
Chestertown. He was one of the
founders of Broadway M. P. Church,
Baltimore, and on numerous occasions
had represented the church in the
annual conferences. He will be sorely
missed in the church as well as in the
walks of business life, where he was
noted for his integrity and faithfulness
to duty.

THE TOTAL REGISTERED negro vote in
Kent county in 1908 was 1567. The
total Republican vote both white and
colored in the county, taking Taft's
vote as a basis, was 1757 votes. This
would indicate that there are only 199
white Republicans in Kent county. Now
if the Republican ticket should win at
the election in November, Kent county
would be dominated by the negro
voters of the county, and as soon as they
realized their power they would be de-
manding, and rightfully so, positions as
election workers, judges and clerks at
elections, especially primaries, and the
190 white Republicans will be powerless
to stop them. We would see negro
domination with a vengeance, and the po-
litical affairs of the county would shortly
be in a pretty mess. Mr. Taxpayer,
look to your interest.

THE REPUBLICAN party in the First
Congressional District has a negro vote
which is two-thirds of their total vote
at the election, and if the negro knew
his power and banded together in the
support of candidates of his own color
in the primaries the tickets in every
county except Cecil would be made up
entirely of negroes. The figures show
exactly what the negro could accomplish
in this direction with a united action. It
is for this reason that the Republicans
dare not hold their primaries under the
Crawford County plan where the candi-
dates are voted for direct, and it is
for this same reason that the next Leg-
islature should pass a compulsory Craw-
ford County Primary Law and make the
Republicans hold their primaries under
that plan. If this is done and the negro
finds out his power it will mean the
complete elimination of a white Repub-
lican party in the First District of
Maryland.—EX.

THE Republican State Convention met
in the Maryland Theatre, Baltimore on
Wednesday and simply adopted the plat-
form and nominated the candidate,
whom Boss Billie Stone had selected.
It was a one man convention from start
to finish. Frank E. Williams, editor of
the Cecil Whig, a former Presbyterian
minister, and a stump speaker for the
Prohibition party, was nominated for
State Comptroller against that old
Roman of Democracy, Dr. Joshua W.
Hering. Strange how well the Repub-
licans like to go out of their own party
for a man to lead them. Here is a for-
mer Prohibitionist their candidate for
Comptroller and he in Kent those who
were once true and tried Democrats
are now occupying the places of leader-
ship in the G. O. P. Mr. Williams is a
bitter enemy of Gov. Crothers, and his
paper is almost weekly filled with vit-
uperative statements concerning the Gov-
ernor's political course. The platform
adopted is full of promises impossible
of fulfillment, and brings forth those
grandiloquent statements designed to
catch votes.

THE Auditing Committee for Kent
county is at work upon the accounts in
the office of the County Commissioners.
The committee consists of Messrs.
Philip G. Wilmer, E. Thomas Massey,
and Mr. Henry Brown, who has been
appointed in the place of Senator Jas.
H. Baker.

REPUBLICANS CAN'T WIN.

The registration figures for Kent
county for 1908 show that there were
1567 negro voters in the county last
year. The total Republican vote both
white and colored, taking Taft's vote in
the last presidential election as a basis,
in Kent county is 1757 votes. In the
last Democratic primaries 2054 votes
were polled, but under normal condi-
tions the total Democratic vote in Kent
county is something over 1900 votes.
The Democratic party, therefore, should
both parties poll their full strength at
the election in November, will have a
clear majority over the Republicans of
nearly 200. This should be sufficient
evidence of the fact that it is utterly
impossible for the Republicans to elect
a single man on their ticket unless they
receive some support from the Demo-
crats. And if a single man on the Re-
publican ticket is elected it will be the
best evidence in the world that he did
receive support from the Democrats.
We do not believe, therefore, that the
Democratic ticket or any part of it will
be defeated because every man on the
ticket is worthy of the confidence and
support of every Democrat in the county
regardless of faction.
