The Levy List.

The annual statement of expenses for Kent county appears in this issue, and is well worth the study of every taxpayer in the county. The statement shows the total expenses of the county to have been for the past year \$113,839.13. \$75,907.15 were issued in certificates and \$37,931.98 were provided for by cash levy. The most important items were for roads and bridges \$43,285.53; schools, \$24,000; circuit court, \$5,705.63; court house and jail, \$4,901.00; almshouse, \$3,196.80; commissioners' office, \$2,559.31. The amount of money spent on the roads of the county by districts was as follows:

Fifth "—Mr. Wagner	6,319.51

SOMETIME ago it was reported by a local paper that private citizens of near Massey were building a gravel road which would be a great improvement to that part of the county. The levy list counts for that road, in this manner—Gibbs, Isaac (new gravel road), \$893.80, showing that the county and not private citizens paid for the road.

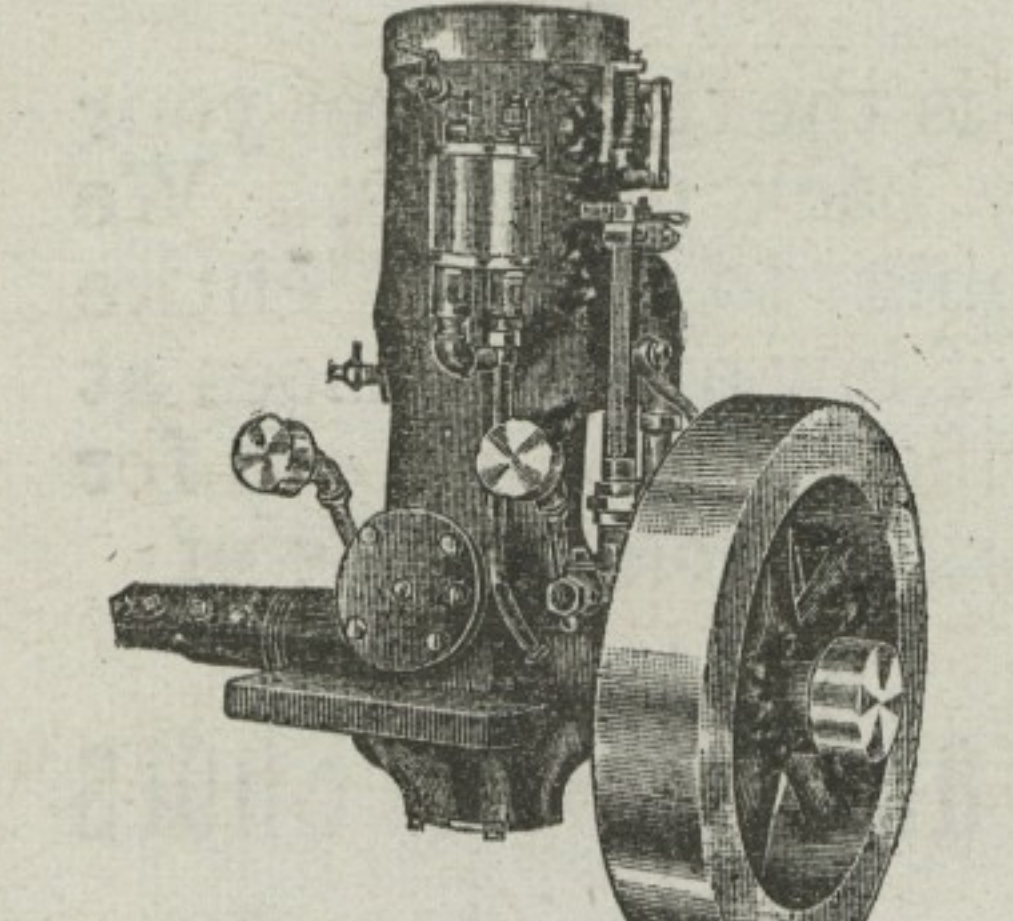
