THE Prohibition party held its State convention in Baltimore on Tuesday afternoon and nominated Mr. Richard A. Harris, of Baltimore, for Comptroller. Mr. Harris is well-known in church circles, being actively engaged in Christian Endeavor work.

WHAT difference would it ever make to the American farmer whether Dr. Cook or Commander Peary discovered the North Pole? You can't grow corn and potatoes, or raise sheep up there. To say the least of it, Commander Peary is rather late in making his announcement after Dr. Cook is reaping all the glory of the first sight.

We publish in this issue a very interesting and well-written article from Messrs. H. G. and B. S. Sutton descriptive of a recent visit to the Alaska Yukon Exposition in Seattle. The writers give much information concerning the country and scenery through which they passed, and their description of the modes of travel, and the manner and customs of the people is well worth reading.

THE Baltimore Sun in an editorial on Wednesday declared emphatically in favor of the Democratic candidates and the platform of that party. It made it perfectly clear to the people of the State that it will support the Amendment and use its wonderful power and influence for the elimination of the negro from politics. With the Baltimore Sun, Senator Rayner and ex-Gov. Warfield actively supporting the Amendment, it will mean such an influence as will make the Republicans look like thirty cents after next fall's election.

It is encouraging to note the unanimity of opinions among Democrats regardless of faction as to the success of the Democratic ticket in the fall. It is realized among the adherents of both factions of the party that the ticket is evenly divided as a result of the recent primaries, and there is a spirit of satisfaction among the people that for the very best good of the party and for the harmony of its workers and voters the recent result of the primaries was fortunate. Of course, there have come to our ears rumors of a disposition on the part of certain Democrats to defeat a part of the ticket by a previous arrangement with the Republicans, but this is not credited at all, because of the fact that all such rumors are emanating from Republican sources in an attempt to create discord and disruption in the Democratic party which the Republicans would so much like to see. Let no Democrat encourage such peanut politics as this. Let no Democrat be so foolish as to fall into a trap which the Republicans have set, and sacrifice his political principles and the welfare of his county simply to get even with the man on the Democratic ticket who may not happen to be of his own faction. That is just exactly what it will amount to, if the Republican ticket or any part of it is elected in the fall. There are enough Democrats in Kent county, regardless of the large negro vote, to give every man on the ticket a majority of from 150 to 200, and if every man on the ticket could be elected four and two years ago by majorities ranging from 200 to 150, there is no good or sufficient reason why the same thing should not occur this fall, and only the basest sort of treachery on the part of Democrats themselves can accomplish the defeat of a single man on the ticket. So pay no attention to Republican rumors, scattered for the purpose of causing discord and disruption. Let the Democrats keep their eyes open, work for the success of every man on the ticket, and the Republicans will not know they are running.
