Sometime ago a petition was circulated among our business people praying for the convenience of transmitting the mail which has been lying in the post office until the 7.48 train on Monday morning on the 4.04 train on Sunday afternoon. 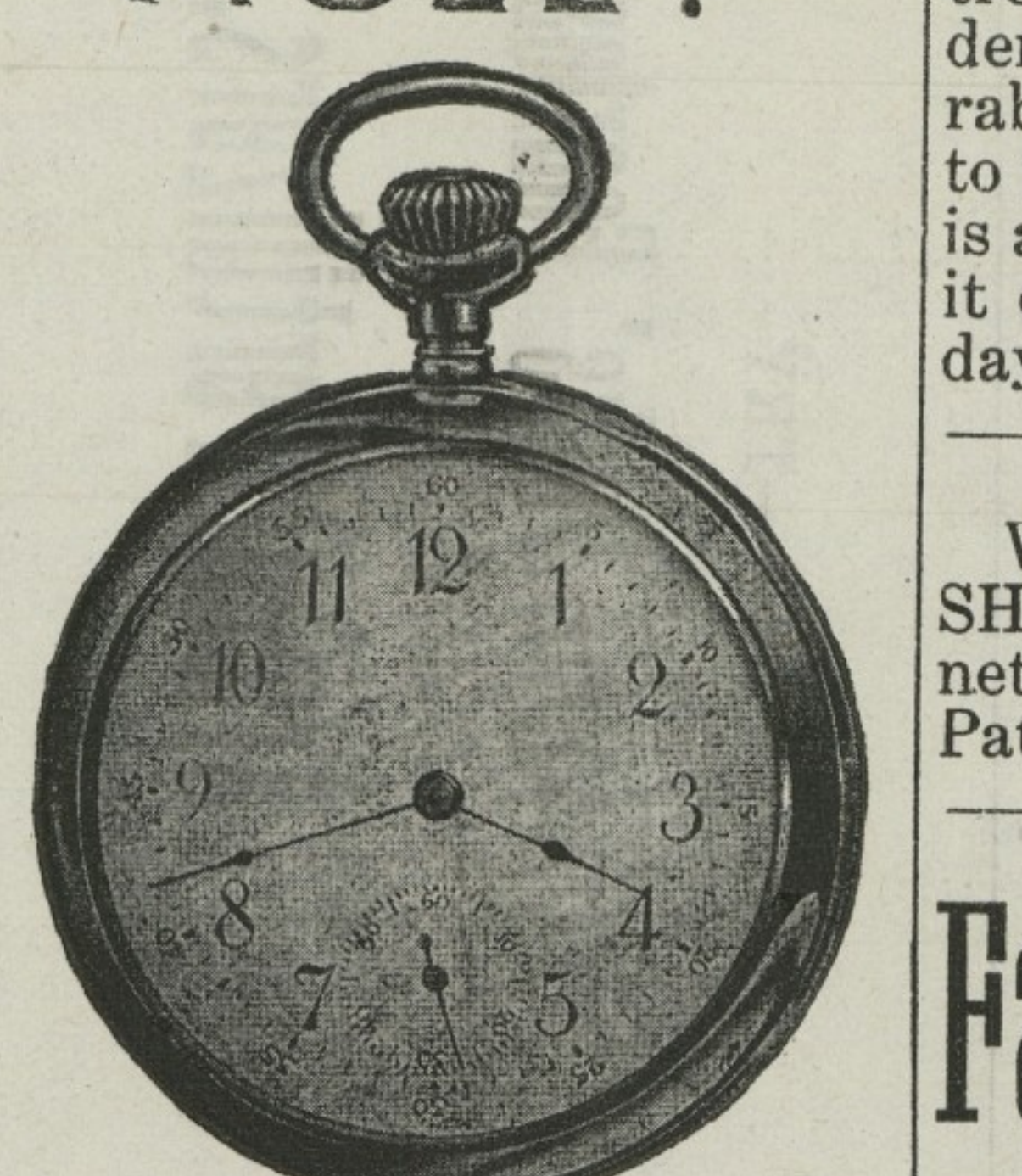

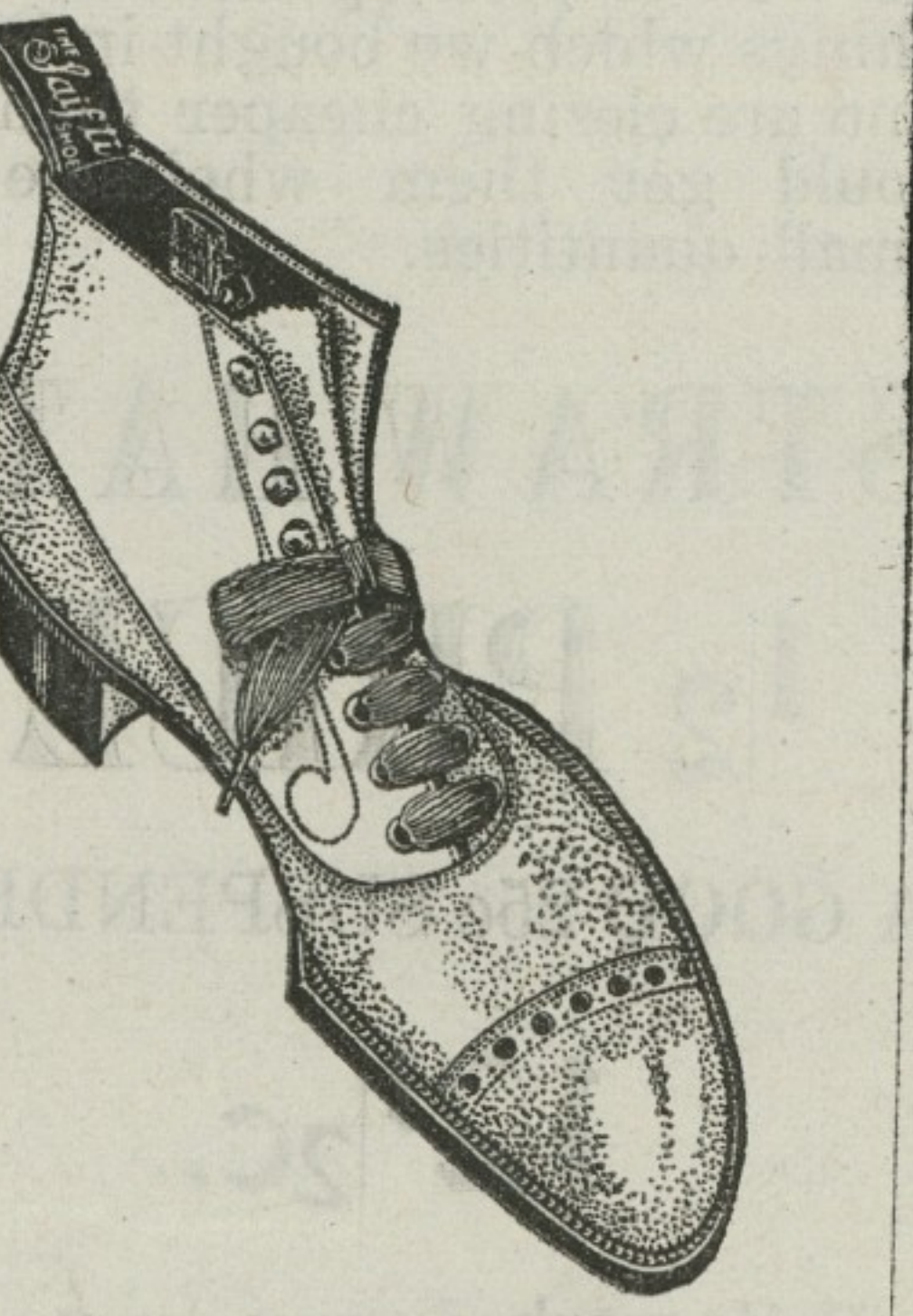
