THE DEATH of Governor John Johnson, of Minnesota, is a serious blow to the Democratic party and a great loss to the country generally. He was one of those rare men, who though actively engaged in politics, had a due regard for the welfare of his fellowmen, and eschewed anything that was not in thorough accord with the highest and noblest principles of morality and truth. Such men are all too rare, and the country can ill afford to lose the power of their influence.

UNITED STATES SENATOR Isidor Rayner filed with Chairman Murray Vandiver, of the State Democratic Central Committee, last week his declaration that he would enter the Senatorial primaries for re-election. From present indications Mr. Rayner will be the only candidate for the United States Senate in the Democratic primaries. He will be supported by the party leaders, including United States Senator John Walter Smith, Governor Crothers, State Senator Arthur P. Gorman, ex-Congressman Joshua W. Miles, Col. Buchanan Schley and Mr. John J. Mahon and every other Democrat in the State of Maryland. Every one should seek the privilege to vote for such a worthy representative in the United States Senate as Senator Rayner has made.

IN DAYS GONE BY when our fathers and grandfathers were living, they did not begin to seed wheat until October 10th. This date they regarded as sufficiently far removed from the warm period which usually follows the Equinox in September, and close enough to the balmy weather of November Indian summer to give the wheat a good stand and to prevent the usurpation of the virtues of the fertilizers until the winter months, when the wheat needs all the nutriment it can get. As a result our farmers of those days seldom missed a crop of wheat. Would it not be well for our farmers of today to try the experiment of waiting until the 10th of October to begin seeding, in view of the fact that the wheat crop has been a failure during the last two years? Our wheat in this section is distinctively a cold weather grain, and if it gets a too forward growth because of early planting it runs the risk of being injured just before the harvest because it has used up the nutriment in the soil before the season of danger approaches. We are firm believers in late seeding for wheat so that when the wheat begins to grow in the spring after a hard winter, there will be nutriment enough in the soil to assist in its growth and to enable it to withstand adverse weather conditions just prior to harvest. Let our farmers in this season of poor crops think about the matter.

### ATTENTION DEMOCRATS!

The attention of Democratic voters throughout the county is called to the fact that the first registration day will be Tuesday, September 28th. It is absolutely essential in order to be able to vote, that the voter's name must be on the registration books upon the day of election, and if a voter has changed his district since last year a transfer must be had. The voter must appear in person before the registrars of the district in which he resided last year and present it to the registrars of the district in which he is now living. This can only be done on one of the two registration days, and it should be attended to without fail on the first day, as it frequently happens that something prevents it from being done on the second. There are only two registration days this year Tuesday, September 28 h, and Tuesday, October 5th. Tuesday, October 12th is for revision only and no new names can be added to the list of voters on that date.

IN HIS great speech at the Lyric, Baltimore, last week, Senator Isidor Rayner in speaking of the Amendment forcibly said:

"It is said that the sole purpose of the amendment is to retain political control of this State by our party. If any one will visit our counties and observe their condition, they will come to the conclusion that the people there are animated by a broader and a higher purpose. In the northern counties there is a large and intelligent white Republican vote, but in the eastern and southern counties, where this question is a burning issue, the Republican party is largely composed of ignorant negroes, and the white people of these counties are determined, and rightly so, that their public affairs and the administration of their offices shall not pass under negro domination. The city of Baltimore owns something to the counties, as well as the counties owe something to the city, and there must be mutual co-operation between them in order to advance the interests of both. It is my deliberate judgment that this question is one that is far removed from a political issue alone; that it is an issue that seriously affects the well-being and progress of every portion of the State; and that Maryland should be governed and its affairs administered by the character and the honor and the intelligence of its best citizenship. I have always been in favor of the principles that underlie this Suffrage Amendment, and while the last one was objectionable, this one gives expression to my views, and for years and years I have advocated an educational test upon the lines therein advocated."

### Can't the Negro See This?

Senator Rayner in his speech at the Lyric made it very plain why the Republican party in Maryland is opposed to negro disfranchisement. He said: "Why does the Republican party so stubbornly contend for negro suffrage? To accomplish a moral purpose? I deny it, and I challenge them to the proof. To promote the commercial interests of the State? It is absurd. To advance its progress in any way? We know that this is not true. I assert that the Federal officeholders desire the negro simply as a voter; that they have never in this world done anything for him from any moral, political, worldly or religious standpoint; that their only object is to secure his vote in order to keep themselves in power, and that all their clamor with reference to this subject involving a great moral issue is a false pretense, so far as they are concerned, because the Democratic party has done more for the welfare of the negro than the Republican party has ever done or ever will do, and that ever since the Fourteenth and Fifteenth Amendments the Republican politicians of Maryland have simply driven their negro voters to the polls, like cattle to the shambles, for one purpose alone, and that is to retain their hold upon the Federal offices of Maryland."

### Mr. THOMAS HILL DEAD.

After having lain in a critical condition for more than two weeks, Mr. Thomas Hill, one of the best-known real estate dealers of Baltimore, expired at 1 o'clock Tuesday at the New England Sanatorium, at Melrose, Mass. His death was caused by a stroke of paralysis, which he had suffered about two weeks ago while swimming at Beach Bluff Mass.

At the time Mr. Hill died, his wife and son, Malcolm, were at his bedside. The body arrived in Baltimore Wednesday night and was taken immediately to his home, 1302 McCulloh street. The funeral took place from there yesterday at noon, thence to St. Peter's Protestant Episcopal Church. The funeral services were conducted by the Rev. Romily Humphries, rector of the church. Burial services were in Druid Hill Cemetery.

Mr. Hill was born in Baltimore October 31, 1834. His father, Mr. Thomas Gardiner Hill, was a first sergeant in the Fifty-seventh Regiment in the War of 1812. On his death, his son Thomas, who had received a good education in the public schools of the city, was practically thrown upon his own responsibility. The law at first called him and he entered the office of Brown & Brune. Although he was ready to pass the bar examinations, he failed to apply for a sheepskin, believing that he would make more of a success in the real estate business. For many years he was an agent of the late Mr. James McHenry, and built up one of the largest real estate firms in the city.

Mr. Hill was president and founder of the old Real Estate Exchange; vice-president of the Title Insurance and Trust Company; vice-president of the Mortgage Guarantee Company; vice-president of the Title Guaranties and Trust Company, and treasurer and one of the founders of the Maryland Assn. and Training School.

Mr. Hill was an active worker in the religious field, and was a vestryman and registrar of St. Peter's Protestant Episcopal Church. He was also identified with the Boys' Home Society and the St. Andrew's Scotch Society. Mr. Hill's marriage to Miss Harriet Louisa Westcott, daughter of the late George B. Westcott, of Chestertown, in November of 1862, was under rather romantic circumstances, and Mr. Hill was fond of telling how he had driven through a blinding snowstorm to his bride's home from the steamboat wharf on the return to Baltimore after the ceremony. Mr. Hill is survived by his widow, one daughter (Mrs. Anna Bryant Saffler, wife of Rev. John G. Saffler, of Baltimore) and two sons (Malcolm Westcott Hill, an electrical engineer of Baltimore, and Norman A. Hill, an electrical engineer of Philadelphia.

Order of Publication. Henry Tillison, vs. Mamie Tillison. In the Circuit Court for Kent County, in Equity. No. 1713, Bill for Divorce.

The object of this suit is to procure a decree "A Vinculo Matrimonii" in favor of the complainant, Henry Tillison from the defendant Mamie Tillison. The bill states that the said complainant, Henry Tillison, was on or about October 4th, 1884, married to his wife, Mamie Tillison, with whom he resided at Baltimore, in Kent county, Maryland, for one year, then they removed to Camden, New Jersey, where they resided until about October, 1900, when she deserted him. That they were separated till December, 1900, when they again lived together in Wilmington, in the State of Delaware, when she again deserted him, and that after said last mentioned desertion he returned to Kent county, State of Maryland, and has continued to live in said Kent county ever since, but that his said wife is a non-resident of the State of Maryland and that he is informed and verily believes that she is a resident of the city of Wilmington and State of Delaware.

That though the conduct of him towards his said wife, Mamie Tillison, has always been kind, affectionate and above reproach, the said Mamie Tillison has without any just reason or cause, abandoned and deserted him, and has declared her intention to live with no longer, and that such last mentioned desertion and abandonment has continued uninterruptedly for at least three years, and she has refused to give notice of the part of her beyond any reasonable expectation of reconciliation.

That there have been no children born to the parties to this case as a result of said marriage. It is thereupon this 24th day of September, 1909, ordered that the complainant, by causing a copy of this order to be inserted in some newspaper published and printed in Kent county, Maryland, one in each of four successive weeks before the 25th day of October, 1909, give notice to the said defendant of the object and substance of this bill, warning her to appear in this court in person or by solicitor on or before the 10th day of November next, to answer the premises and show cause, if any she hath, why a decree should and pass as prayed.
