State W. C. T. U. Convention.

The annual meeting of the Maryland Woman's Christian Temperance Union will be held Sept. 29, 30 and Oct. 1st, in St. Paul's M. E. Church, Hagerstown, Md. Each Union is entitled to one delegate and one extra for every twenty-five members. All members of the convention will be guests of Hagerstown Union and are requested to send names to Miss Ella M. Lechust, not later than Sept. 25. It is ordered that the treasurer's books be closed one week before convention. Mrs. Louise Rounds and Mrs. Ella Boole, National Lecturers, have been engaged for chief speakers. This meeting promises to be of unusual interest, the present agitation of the liquor question for Washington county, which is to come up at the fall election lends enthusiasm to the work. Thus for thirty-four years the women of this organization have labored to educate against the evils of the drink habit and drink traffic. Notwithstanding the advanced ideas that are sweeping the course from many parts of this and other countries, the last session of the Maryland Legislature refused to grant the privilege of counties deciding for themselves the question of having liquor sold in their midst. Here, in the third city in population in our State may be seen the effects of a Curfew Law. This was secured some years ago through the efforts of citizens led by one of the pastors. In the present struggle to free themselves from the liquor traffic, may a just cause likewise prevail against its most formidable enemies—the voters.
