members, not only for their proper protection at fires, but also to serve as uniforms and to distinguish them from other workers not connected with your association, and while it will probably not be possible to secure all these things at once, I am satisfied that our people will aid you in securing them by liberal contributions from time to time to such methods as may be deemed best to adopt for the purpose.

If I may venture without impropriety to make a suggestion, it seems to me it would not be unreasonable to appeal to the merchants and business men of the town to provide these personal equipments, and though I cannot claim to be a business man, I am willing for this purpose to be so considered. But the most valuable element in assuring the efficiency and good repute of your company will be the establishment and maintenance of order and discipline. Each man should know and observe his place; he should be prompt in responding to any alarm sounded, and should recognize promptly and cheerfully the authority of the officers of the company chosen by the members themselves. With such a spirit prevailing you cannot fail to accomplish the object of your organization and to deserve and receive the confidence and support of the community.

One of the readiest and best ways in which the citizens of the town can contribute with little or no expenditure of money to the promotion of your interest and advantage will be for those who are regular subscribers to magazines or literary newspapers to send them, say once a month, when their families have read and enjoyed them, to this room for the use of your association. You can thus be supplied with wholesome and pleasant reading in well lighted reading room, ample for all your members and to which you can always have access during your leisure hours.

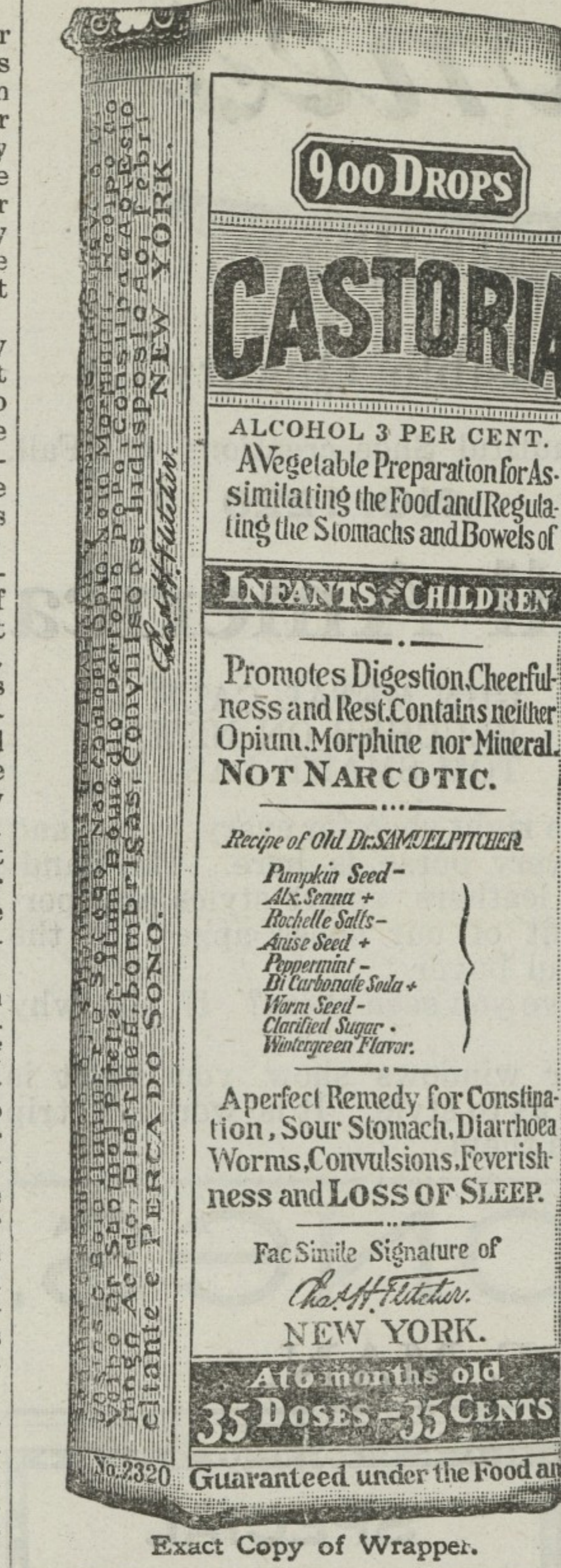
Before closing these brief and desultory remarks addressed to your association in response to their invitation, I wish to congratulate the town commissioners and the Water Board upon their acquisition of permanent and convenient quarters in this building for the transaction of their business, and for the custody and preservation of their records. The double use to which this building is to be devoted appropriately characterizes it as "The Municipal Building," and I trust that the joint occupants will not only always dwell in harmony, but that the members of this fire company, both as individuals and in their collective capacity, will set to all our young men a shining example of sobriety, good order and proper submission to discipline. At the conclusion of Judge Pearce's address, a fine portrait of Mr. France, the first president of the fire company, was hung in place and was presented by Mr. A. M. Culp, who said: "LADIES AND GENTLEMEN—Members of the Volunteer Fire Co. of Chestertown. On behalf of a number of friends I have the pleasure of presenting to you a picture of President Thos. D. France. We think it proper on this occasion to express our appreciation of the service he has rendered the Fire company and the community in which we have been organized in this town, which accomplished little or nothing from lack of interest and proper leadership. That the fate of this organization has not been that of those in the past is due largely to the faithfulness and energy of its president. We trust that in years to come when others have taken the places of those now active in the affairs of the Company this picture will serve to remind them of what was accomplished by its first President, officers and charter members."

After inspiring music by the Fire Company Orchestra, which furnished the most delightful music for the entire day, the benediction was pronounced by Rev. Dr. H. B. Martin, and the audience spent the remainder of the morning in an inspection of the handsome building.

THE FLAG RAISING. The exercises in the afternoon were under the auspices of the Jr. Order United American Mechanics and were inspiring and extremely enjoyable. Prof. L. J. Smith, of the order, presided, and after prayer by Dr. Martin, introduced Rev. Dr. F. T. Little, who made a very happy and pleasing introductory address. Prof. Smith next introduced Rev. Dr. L. E. Barrett, who made one of the finest and most appropriate flag presentation addresses it has ever been our pleasure to hear. We wish we had the manuscript of the doctor's address for publication, but as he did not have his notes, it is assumed that his address was unwritten. It was masterly and eloquent and fitted the occasion perfectly. President France gracefully accepted the flag on behalf of the company and thanked the order for their gift and interest, and the audience repaired to the street, where, as the glorious stars and stripes were flung to the breeze from the top of the flag pole by Mr. F. H. Russell, the audience sang the immortal Star Spangled Banner. The flag is a beautiful one 16 feet long and 12 feet wide.

THE RECEPTION. The exercises of the day closed with a brilliant reception in the auditorium, which was beautifully illuminated by electric lights. In fact, the entire building is lighted from the dome to the apparatus room. Notwithstanding the very inclement night, nearly five hundred guests were present and shook hands with the president and with the members of the receiving committee—the officers. Splendid refreshments of ices and cake were served by members of the company in full dress, and the splendid orchestra discontinued such music as to cause a shaking of the feet as the closing feature of a most eventful day in the history of the town and fire company. The chestnut was one of the best that has been gotten together in the town for many years, and the music was inspiring and delightful. The orchestra was composed of Messrs. Warren C. Hurlock, Hyman Rogers, Thomas Dixon, Roland Matthews, violins; Donald Stam, clarinet; Arthur Bacon, cornet; Foster Cannon, trombone; and Miss Lillian Matthews, pianist. Miss Matthews was presented with a handsome bouquet at the close of the reception.

Five members of the Centreville Fire Company attended the reception and were greatly pleased with the new home of the Chestertown firemen.
