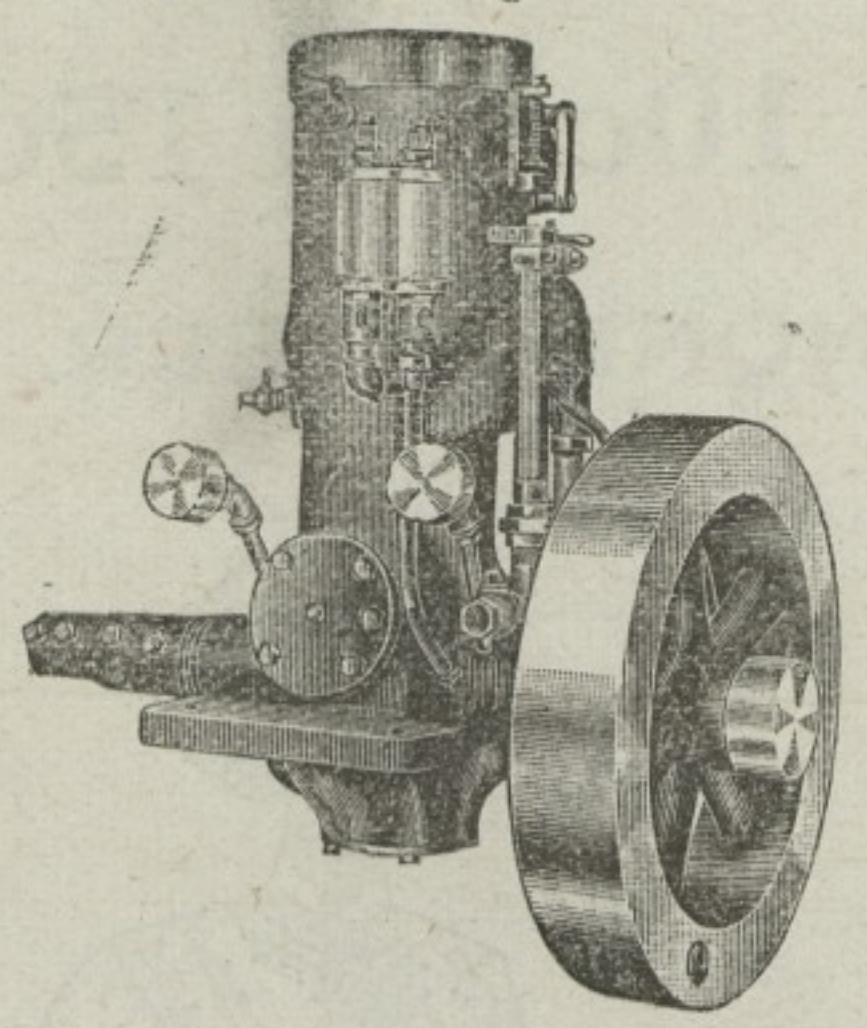
An extract from an address made by the Comptroller of the Currency at the meeting of the American Bankers' Association held in Chicago September 14th, 1909:

Interesting Bank News.

All national banks whose surplus and undivided profits exceed or equal their capital stock are placed by the Comptroller upon what is term the roll of honor. According to this roll as copyrighted by "The Financier," New York, there are twenty-five such banks in Maryland, of which nine are Eastern Shore banks standing in the following order in the State:

Elkton National Bank, corporate number 1238, rank in State, 3rd.
National Bank of Rising Sun, corporate number 2841, rank in State, 4th.
Denton National Bank, corporate number 2947, rank in State, 8th.
Centerville National Bank, corporate number 2941, rank in State, 12th.
Snow Hill National Bank, corporate number 2783, rank in State, 13th.
Dorchester National Bank, corporate number 4802, rank in State, 14th.
Salisbury National Bank, corporate number 3250, rank in State, 15th.
Pocomoke City National Bank, corporate number 4191, rank in State, 16th.
Second National Bank, Chestertown, corporate number 4227, rank in State, 25th.

The corporate number of each bank indicates the relative position of age. It may well be doubted whether there is another single Congressional District in the country that can make a stronger showing, and especially in view of the fact that our interests are almost wholly agricultural. The facts speak volumes for the value and attractions of our lands and for the conduct of our banking institutions. The Second National, it will be seen, is the "youngest" of the twenty-five, but is forging to the front.

Horse Dies on Chester Bridge.

A horse belonging to Mr. John Palmatory, a trucker in Double Creek, dropped dead on Tuesday morning at the Queen Anne's end of Chester Bridge draw. Mr. Palmatory was on his way to Chestertown with a load of truck and just as he got within a few feet of the draw his horse suddenly dropped and died in a few minutes. This is a great loss to Mr. Palmatory and he has the sympathy of the entire community. Mr. Daniel Cox, bridge keeper, went to the assistance of Mr. Palmatory and after removing the harness from the dead animal they opened the draw and pushed the carcass overboard. Some colored men tied a rope to the dead horse, towed it across the river to Mt. J. T. Anthony's farm, skinned it and sold the hide for \$2.00.
