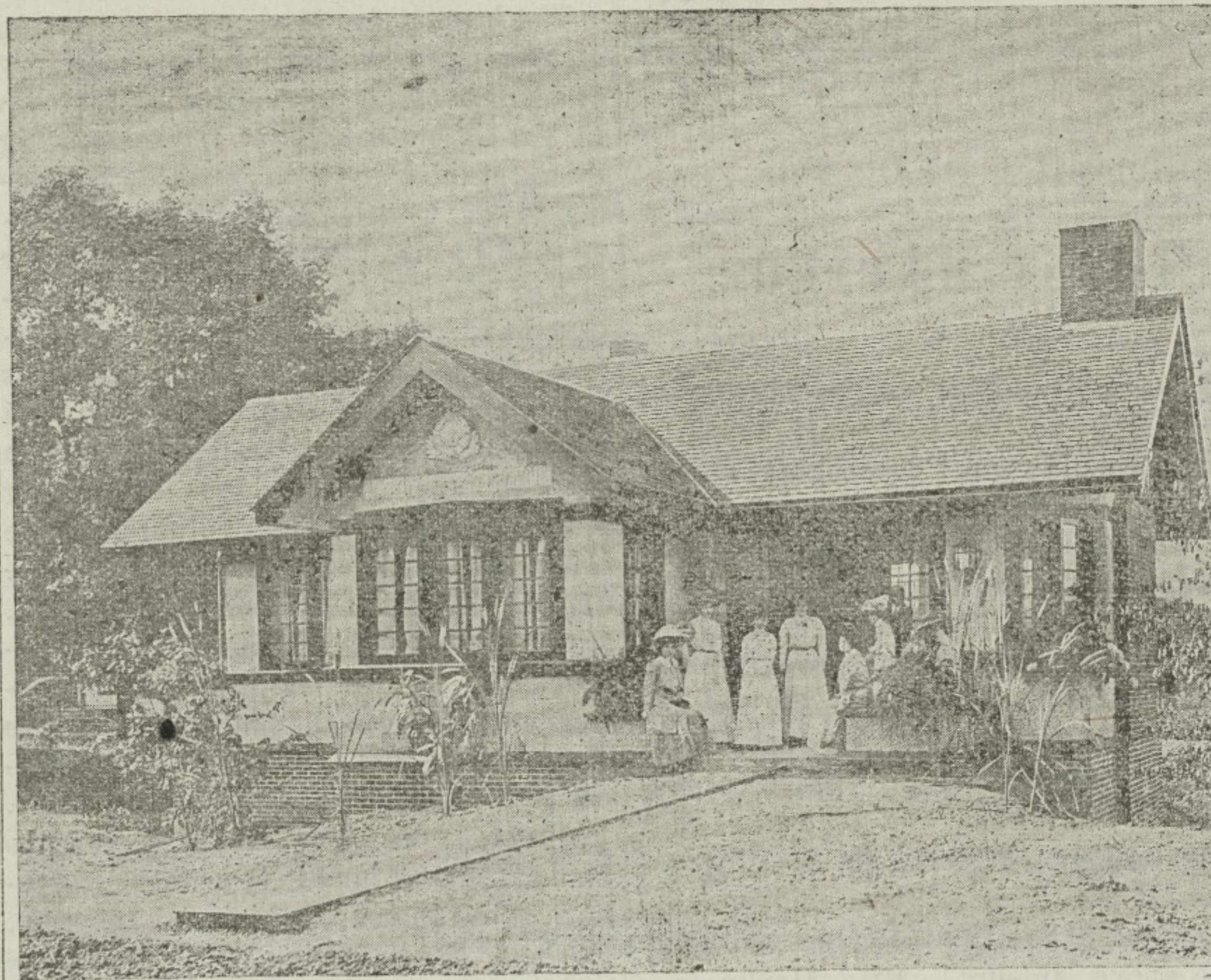

GREAT OPPORTUNITY FOR CHESTERTOWN.



Chestertown Has a Good Chance to Secure a Fine Building Like This at No Cost to its Citizens.

There is a movement on foot running through the country styled, "The American League." Fifty different publishing houses, some of them the largest and most influential, are accepting subscriptions through this league, and in return give 50 per cent. of the price and contract to give two pages of advertising or descriptive matter (explaining the work of the league) each month for five months. Among these are Review of Review, Pictorial Review, Metropolitan and others.

This league will build a Chapter House in any town where the women will organize and form a bureau. This building will belong to the ladies to use as they please. What would such a place mean to the literary society, the W. C. T. U., the missionary societies of all the churches, the D. of A., the Dorcas and all other societies of women as a place of meeting, a place to hold entertainments, a reading room and library, and even the Farmers Grange because their women members worked for it and it was theirs. This "league" has an accredited representative here and a chapter house may be had if the women want it. Sometimes since the volunteer firemen wanted a chapter house and the whole town and community joined forces, and by contributions, working and holding bazaars secured money enough to build a home which is a credit and a joy forever, but it took work and money. Now for the ladies chapter house, not one cent is asked for.

It is said in a town of 3000 the subscription money will average \$1.00 for all or \$3,000. Now, if that can be controlled, \$1,500 goes to the league and half of that or \$750 remains with the chapter house to meet all expenses. If it controls more it means more. There must be a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer. A building site is secured sometimes by donations, sometimes bought, and the title is made out to the trustees of the league, but in after years if there should be no further use for the building it will be returned to the donor.

Mrs. Emma Sheppard spent part of last week in Crumpton.

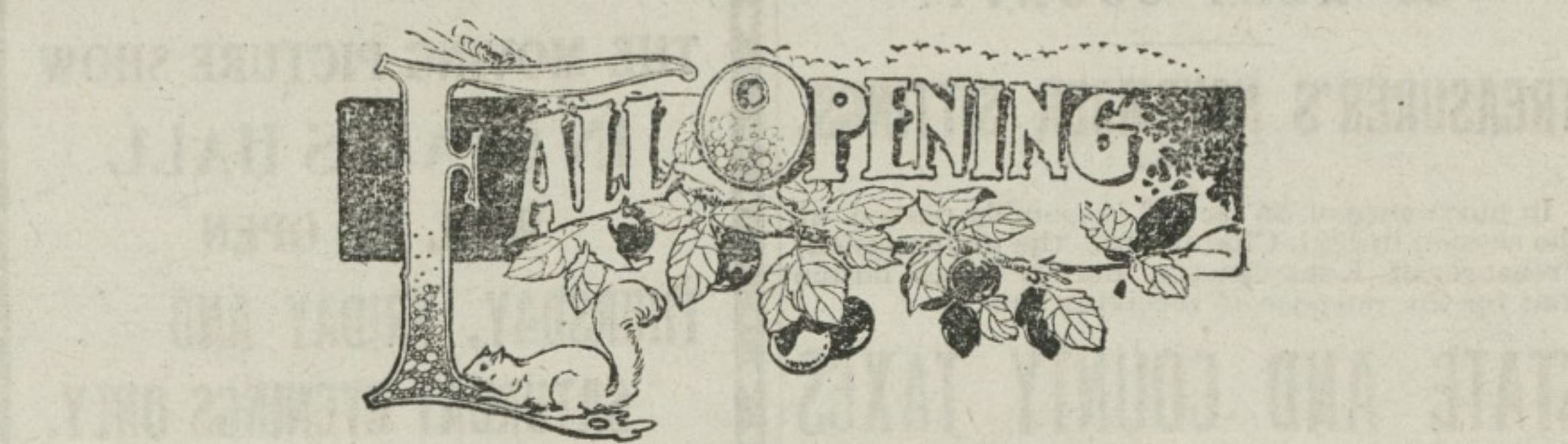
Mrs. Oren has sold her Crumpton property, and will remove to the Jones property about January 1st.
