Last Wednesday night, while Miss Gertrude Kramer was writing letters, she happened to look out of the window toward Mr. Marion Downey's house and store and saw fire; this she immediately told her father, who had gone to bed. Mr. Kramer arose and hurried to the barn to let his horses out, and started the report of fire in the neighborhood. The telephones were kept busy for several minutes, and the men and boys of Rock Hall who saw and heard of the fire hastened to the scene, but too late to save the Kramer house. Mr. and Mrs. Downey were in Rock Hall at the time of the fire, attending service at the M. E. Church. News was told them and they hurried home only to find the house in ashes. The house was totally destroyed, that is, beyond saving anything when they arrived. For a time Percy, Mr. Downey's son, could not be found, and most every one thought he had been caught in the ruins, but he had gone to Rock Hall, having found the house afire went for his father; he was passed on the road, and not being seen, caused this alarm to be circulated. When he returned a few minutes later many hearts were made glad, knowing that he was safe. Mrs. Maslin's house, which was next to the Kramer house, not more than twenty-five feet, was saved by the heroic work of the citizens of Gratitude and Rock Hall. Surely the house would have been burned had not the crowd bravely volunteered to help. A bucket brigade was formed from the house to the river after the wells were pumped dry. What a lucky thing the river was near, for most of the wells were very low, and had they had to depend on these the whole village would have gone.

Special mention and hearty thanks should certainly be awarded to William Clayton, Marlon and George Coleman, and in fact all who helped. Every one sympathises with the families of both the parties. The loss could not be ascertained, but at a rough estimate I would say close to \$10,000, if not more.

Revals are still in progress in our town, and we are having some fine meetings. Everybody come out.

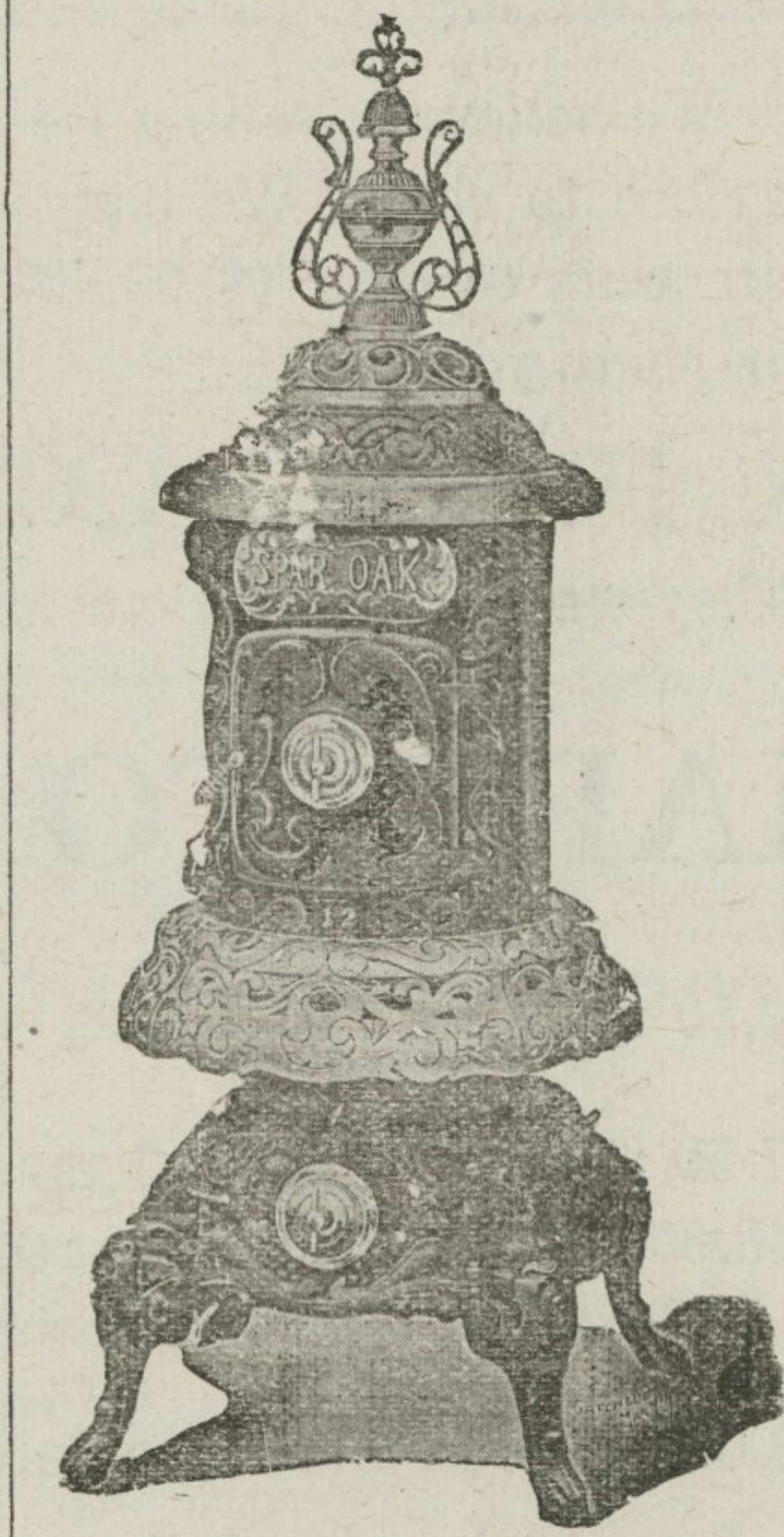
Betterton Briefs.
