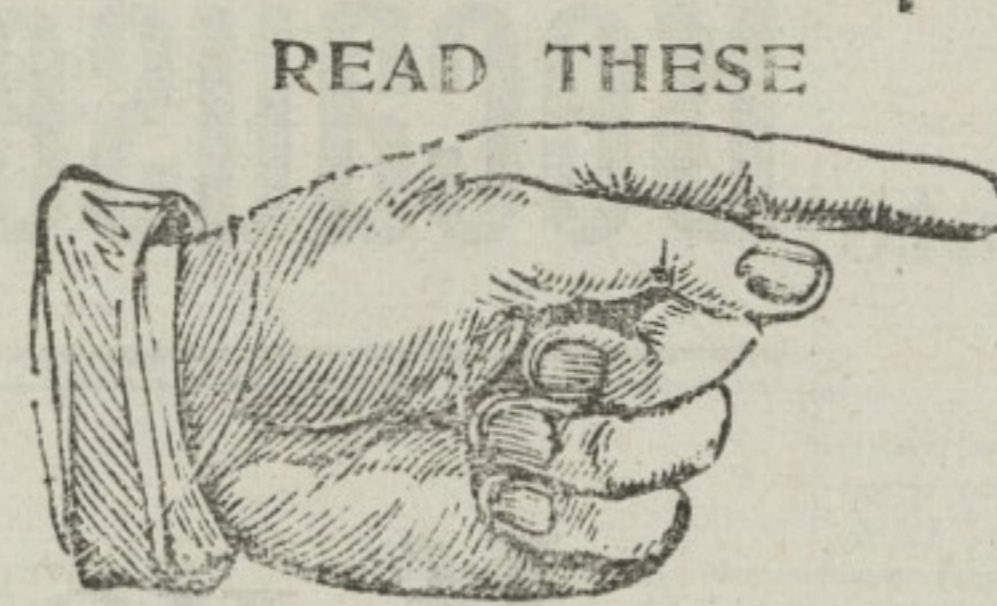

If your total purchases amount to \$10 or more (but under \$20), half your fare will be repaid you.

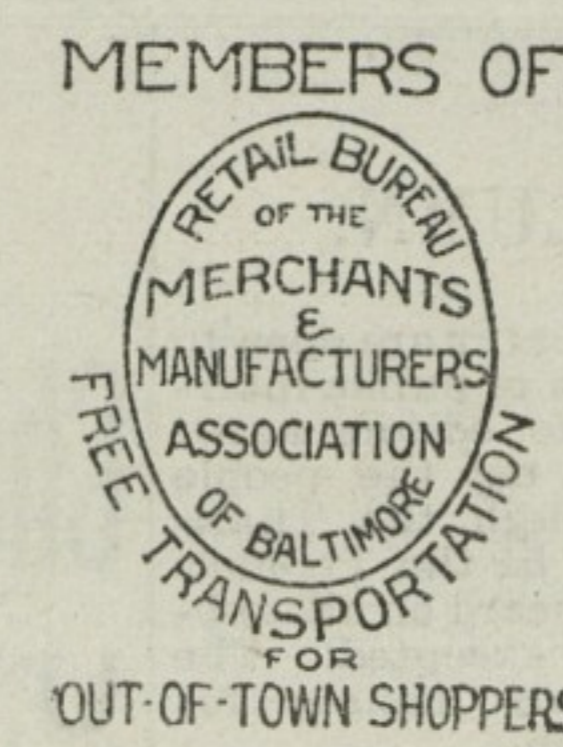

PROPOSED ROAD LAW.

Its Provisions and Benefits Stated in Concise Form.

A great many people of the county have asked us to state concisely the provisions of the proposed road law, as well as the benefits that will accrue to the tax-payers of the county by its enactment into a law. Concisely stated the provisions of the law are as follows:

1. The placing of the management of the county roads upon a strictly business basis by the appointment of a skilled Road Engineer, at a salary of \$1500, who must have had at least three years experience as a road engineer, and who will have direct supervision and control of every man who works the roads, as well as the machinery and material to be used.
2. The appointment of the Road Engineer of one supervisor for each election district in the county, who in turn will have the power to employ the labor to work the roads, at a sum not exceeding \$1.00 per day for a day's work.
3. The absolute accountability of all supervisors and road workers to the Road Engineer, who is required to make monthly statements to the Board of County Commissioners of all money expended and the character of work done upon roads and bridges.
4. The supervision of the entire system of county roads by the Road Engineer, who is responsible to the County Commissioners for the faithful performance of his contract.
5. The levying of a fixed sum every year by the Board of County Commissioners instead of an unlimited amount, as at present. The sum to be levied by the commissioners shall not be less than 20 per cent. of the taxable basis of the county.
6. The inability to remove the Road Engineer except for sufficient cause. This removes the engineer from the influence of politics.

THE BENEFITS OF THE LAW.

The following are the benefits of the law to the tax-payers and people generally, as we see them:

1. The law takes the roads out of politics.
2. It curtails the working force and makes efficiency count for more than numbers.

Under the present system we are unable to say how many supervisors are appointed in each district, certainly more than one. The proposed law provides for the appointment of one supervisor for each district, who will be selected by the Road Engineer on account of his fitness, and who will be paid a salary to be determined by the Road Engineer. The supervisor will be directly responsible to the engineer to whom he will be required to make a daily statement of the amount of work done each day in his district, and the amount of money expended for that work. That's business, and insures an economic administration of the road work. The district supervisor is to be allowed to employ as many men as he deems necessary for the proper working of the roads at \$1 per day, which workers are to account to the district supervisors for their work, so that when a man goes before the county commissioners with his bill it is O. K. by the supervisor and the Road Engineer or it is not paid. This will prevent so many large bills finding their way in the county commissioners office.

3. It means lower taxes. The county commissioners are compelled under the proposed law to levy a fixed sum for roads and bridges just as they do now for court and elect on expenses. They cannot levy less than 20 per cent. of the total amount of property in the county, and as we are sure the county commissioners are as cautious as any one else to keep down the taxes, they would not levy a sum greater than the Road Engineer estimates is absolutely necessary for repairing the roads each year. Under the present system \$40,000 has been spent on the roads, and the amount has sometimes reached \$45,000. This is the fault of a pernicious system which has been allowed to grow and thrive in our body politic because of custom. This custom can be and should be broken up by the commissioners levying a fixed sum for roads, and when that amount is expended no more money is forthcoming. No business man doubts that upon a purely business basis our roads can be kept in far better condition for \$20,000 than they are at \$40,000 or \$45,000 today. If \$20,000 and no more should be spent, there is a saving to the county of from \$21,000 to \$25,000 every year. The taxable basis of the county is about \$3,500,000. \$20,000 is a saving of nearly 24 cents on the \$100 to the tax-payers of the county and if the proposed law were passed and became effective July 1, 1910, as it provides, the heavy tax rate would be lessened by 24 cents, and our roads would be put in far better condition.

What tax-payer in the county regardless of political affiliations is not anxious to see the tax rate reduced? We believe that every tax-payer in this county is favorable to this bill, because we believe that they feel that even if it does not reduce the amount of money spent on the roads one cent, if their supervision is put upon a business basis, we shall have far better roads than we have now. We submit the interest of our tax-payers to our representatives in the Legislature, and we ask them not to listen to the appeal of the politician, but do something for the good of the people whose money is being wasted every year.
