HALF OF AWARDS GO TO MARYLAND APPLES.

Product of This State Wins Many Prizes at Expositions in the West.

Maryland apples are on top and are the best that grow. Fifty per cent. of the premiums awarded at the Colorado National Apple Exposition, now being held in Denver, Col., went to exhibitors of Maryland apples. So stated a telegram received in Baltimore recently by one who is interested in horticultural exhibits.

The fact that Maryland gets one-half of all the premiums for the apples at the Colorado Apple Exposition is made more creditable because most of the fruit has crossed the continent twice, having been exhibited at Council Bluffs, Iowa, the first part of November, after which it was brought to Baltimore and placed on exhibition at the Horticultural Show in the Fifth Regiment Armory.

From Denver the prize apples were brought East again and were on display at the meeting of the Peninsula Horticultural Society at Centerville, Md., on Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday. In free competition with other apple States at Council Bluffs and at Denver, Maryland has won 77 premiums, 44 of which were first out of a total of only 86 exhibits. This record is only equaled by one or two States.

The section of display of Maryland fruit has been under the care of Prof. C. P. Close, of the Maryland Agricultural College. Prof. Close is now in Denver.

CHAMP CLARK AS PROPHET.

Predicts that High Prices for Farm Products Will Continue.

Washington, December 23.—“The present high prices for farm products have come to stay; the rural population is playing out; the present census, if it classes the unincorporated villages as towns, show between 60 and 65 per cent. of population living in towns,” declared Representative Champ Clark, of Missouri, the minority leader in the House, to-day. “At the present rate, in 20 years the United States will cease to be an exporting nation for agricultural products, except as to cotton.”

“One of the principal causes of the high prices of farm products is the world movement of the people toward the towns and cities. While a few people in towns and cities have gardens and raise chickens and occasionally pigs, practically the entire town and city population are non-producers of anything to eat, but are consumers only. For the first time, last year Argentina beat us in exporting corn, and Argentina and Brazil are now fixing to take the frozen meat trade from us. Until we adopt the intensive system of agriculture we have nearly reached our limit of agricultural output.”

Second Degree Murder.—Scott Johnson, charged with the murder of James McAllister, of near Rowlandville, Cecil county, was found guilty by the court in Elkton of murder in the second degree. “Lack of motive or premeditation,” the court declared in sentencing Johnson, “alone reduces the degree.”
