OBITUARY.

MRS. FANNIE M. NORFOLK.
Mrs. Fannie M. Norfolk, aged 73 years, widow of Dr. William H. Norfolk, formerly of Calvert county, Md., died early Monday morning at the home of her daughter, Mrs. J. Albert Arnold, at Forest Park, Baltimore, after an illness of over three months. Mrs. Norfolk was a daughter of the late Thomas and Mary Hamilton Tucker, and was a granddaughter of James Hamilton, prominent in the Revolutionary period. At the time of her death she was an officer of Mordecai Gist Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution. She is survived by two daughters, (Mrs. Arnold and Mrs. William Gilmore Booth, of Seattle, Wash.,) one brother (Mr. John W. Tucker, of Baltimore,) and two sisters (Mrs. Wm. Richards, of Franklin, Pa., and Mrs. Rachel Mathiot, of New York) and eight grandchildren. The funeral took place at 10:30 o'clock on Wednesday morning. Services were conducted by Rev. Henry T. Sharp, rector of the Prince of Peace Protestant Episcopal Church, Walbrook. Interment was made in Loudon Park Cemetery. The deceased was a cousin of Mrs. Edgar P. Beck, of Chestertown, and she and her daughters had been frequent visitors to our town and county, where she was held in the highest esteem.

The funeral services of the late Wm. B. Uilton were held in Christ M. P. Church on Saturday afternoon at two o'clock, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Dr. F. T. Little, who delivered a splendid eulogy upon the life and character of the deceased. Miss Ida Smith sang the impressive solo, "Light From the Tomb," which the deceased requested sung at his funeral, and the choir sang one of his favorite Sunday school hymns. The pall-bearers were Messrs. Marion deK. Smith, Jas. W. Lambert, Samuel Vanort, John F. Howard, J. L. Smith and J. D. Bacchus. Interment was made in the family lot in Chester cemetery. The floral tributes were beautiful, among them being a beautiful wreath from Christ M. P. Sunday school, of which the deceased was superintendent for forty years, and a beautiful design from the board of stewards of the church of which the deceased was a member for many years. Undertaker Charles L. Dodd had charge of the funeral arrangements.

Maryland Legislature.

Among the petitions introduced in the Senate on Monday night was one by Senator Goslin, of Caroline, which requests the Legislature to extend the term of Chief Justice James Alfred Pearce, of the Second Judicial Circuit. It was signed by the members of the Caroline county bar.

Why was not this petition filed by some member of the Kent county delegation? Kent county is the home of Judge Pearce, and it would have been proper thing for this petition to have been presented by the Kent delegates, it seems to us. Is not the Kent county delegation favorable to the extension of Judge Pearce's term?

Little business of any moment has been transacted by the Legislature yet, owing to the failure of the presiding officers to announce their committees. The Legislature is consequently adjourned on Wednesday until Monday.
