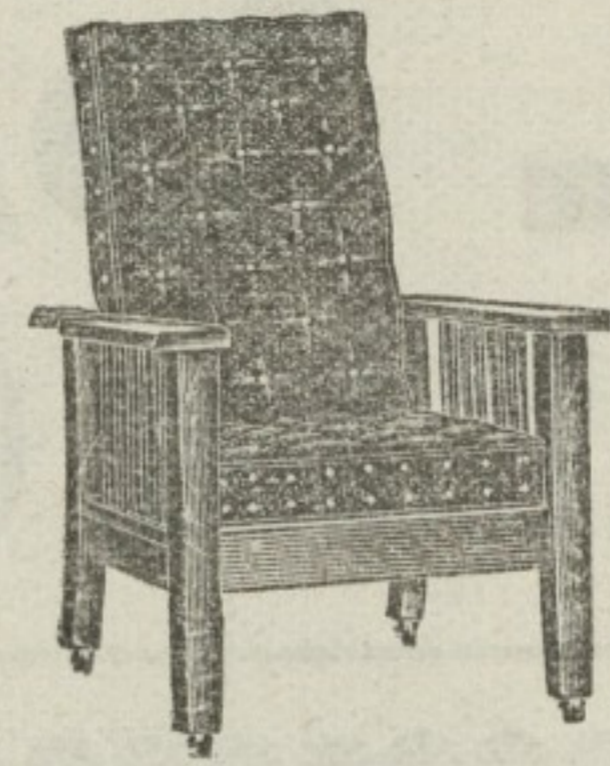

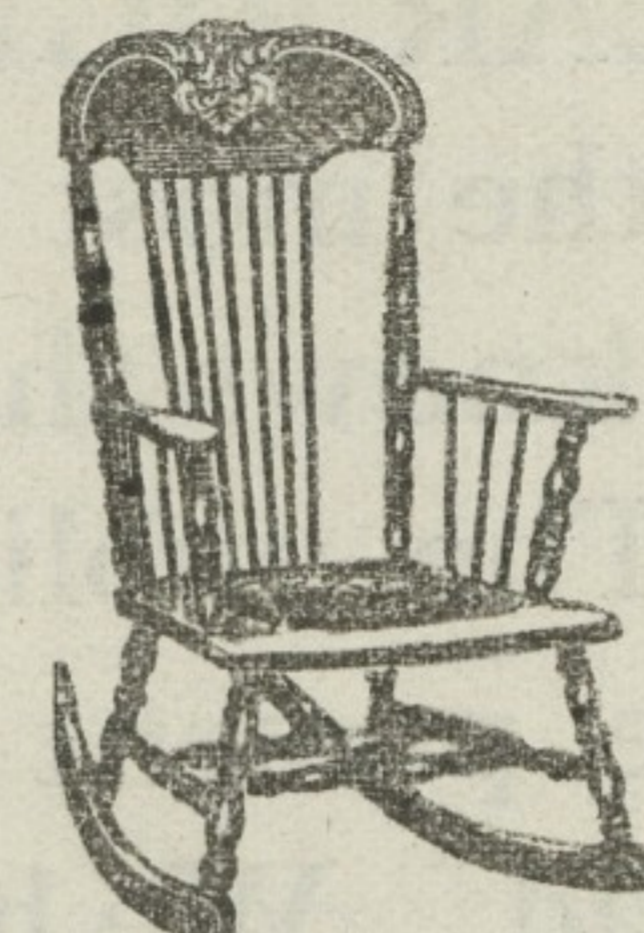
Mr. Lloyd Dill and his bride have moved on the farm vacated by Mr. Christopher Conner.
