The condition of Bishop Cyrus D. Foss of the Methodist Episcopal Church, who was stricken with paralysis at his home in Philadelphia, on Tuesday, is serious, and but little hope for his recovery is entertained. He was stricken while in a street car and was moved to the Hahnemann Hospital, where it was found that his entire right side had been paralyzed and that he had lost the power of speech.

Bishop Foss is 76 years old and is one of the best known prelates of the Methodist Episcopal Church. He was retired in 1904 because of advancing age.

Miss Margherita Dodd led the Christian Workers service in Christ M. P. Church last Sunday evening. Features of the service were appropriate solos by Mrs. Mamie Dodd and Mr. Hill. Mr. Hill has a rich baritone voice, but he was suffering with a severe cold last Sunday, which made singing quite difficult.

The roads have been almost impassable for several weeks and many of them at this time. The fields have been used, but since the rain they have been badly cut up. This is nearly always a damage to the farmer, and in the majority of cases could be avoided. Why would it not be a good idea for the community to band together to keep the roads open, independent of any money consideration from the county. As it is everybody wants to travel, but few are willing to come out and break the roads. It shows a lack of public spirit and good old-fashioned generosity. What is the county coming to if white men refuse to do a little for the public good without a money consideration. If the county had offered a dollar a day, men enough would have applied to have made a string miles long. Some of the farmers came out with their teams and did what they could, but why let some corn while all are just as able to do their part, and owe it to themselves and the whole community? May there be a revival of the good old-fashioned spirit of public interest.

Recently there has been a good deal of stealing in the vicinity. About Christmas time Mrs. Edie Spry lost some chickens and hens and since that several people have had corn stolen from their cribs. On Wednesday night Mr. England had a quantity taken from his crib, in this case the lock was broken. The guilty will probably read this item, and it may be a good thing to go and settle with the parties from whom the corn and chickens were stolen, it might save a term at the "cut," for tracks in the snow, mud, and other indications make good evidence.

It is expected now that the free lecture on the "Brownies of Dia Niopon," will be given in Trinity Church, Millington, on the 27th, and in Emmanuel on the 28th of this month. This lecture is for the spread of missionary information concerning Japan. 78 beautiful slides will be used.

#### Doings in Legislature.

The committee on organization in the House of Delegates recommended 44 more additional employes in the House this week, bringing the total number of employes up to 115. Governor Crothers "Economy Plan" has gone plimmering, and the State of Maryland will be the sufferer in consequence.

Mr. Jas. S. Harris has employed his son, Mr. Carson Harris, of Still Pond Neck.

The Anti-Saloon League Local Option Bill was introduced in the Legislature on Monday evening.

An amendment to the fisheries laws is proposed by Mr. Sullivan in a bill he will introduce in the House providing in brief, "The use of pound nets or stake nets shall be prohibited in the Chesapeake Bay north of Pooles Island, except on the bay shore of Kent county up to Howells' Point, at the mouth of the Sassafras river and also on the Susquehanna river." Seines shall be subject to the same license and regulations of all sections under the subtitle "Chesapeake Bay," except gill nets.

Senator Wm. M. Slay introduced a petition from the bar of Kent county asking for the extension of the term of Chief Judge James Alfred Pearce. Delegate Harry C. Wills, of Kent, was a member of the committee selected by the speaker to notify Hon. Murray Vandiver of his re-election for the sixth term as State Treasurer.

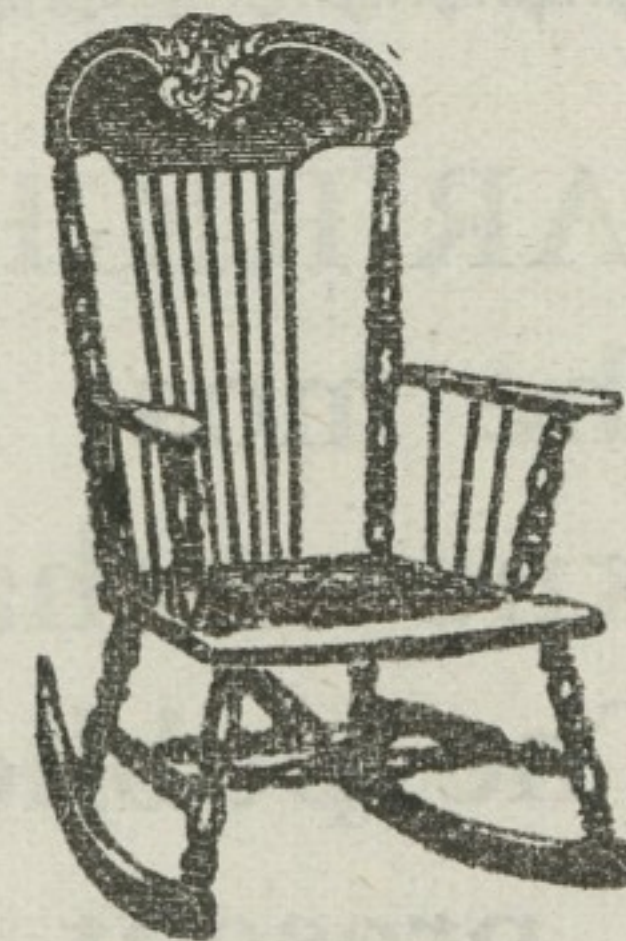
