Mail Not to be Accepted Unless Stamped by the Sender.

Washington, D. C. Jan 24—Estimates made by the Post Office Department indicate that approximately 300,000,000 one-cent pieces annually are taken by rural letter carriers from letter-boxes for the payment of postage on mail matter deposited.
