Legislative Doings.

The following bills have been introduced by the Kent County Representatives during the week:

By Senator Slay—The new State-wide banking law.

By Mr. Harris—To permit the killing of crippled ducks from power boats.

By Mr. Willis—To amend the general election laws. To amend the law relative to revenue and taxes. The latter bill is to repeal the rebate of discount on State taxes paid to the county treasurer. Mr. Willis claiming that the State treasury will be benefitted to the extent of \$40,000 to \$50,000 annually. Dr. Hering, the State Comptroller is opposed to this bill. The amendment to the salary of the Supervisors of Election from \$100 to \$200 per annum, the County Commissioners being authorized to provide larger compensation.

The bill to extend the term of Chief Judge James Alfred Pearce has passed its third reading in the Senate.
