Scale on Trees in Chestertown

Those who seem to know about the depredations of the San Jose Scale state that nearly every shade tree in Chestertown is badly affected with it. Mr. Edward Robinson, who helped to trim the shade trees and haul away the tops which were cut out two years ago when the new telephone wires were strung, states that the scale then was thick on nearly every tree. If this is so, it is only a matter of a short time before the beautiful shade trees in Chestertown will be bare trunks and leafless branches much as were those which stood in front of T. W. Eliason's store and the Second National Bank, also at Wm. M. Slay's residence.

Some of our citizens have been writing to the State Horticultural Department. Mr. Symons, the State Entomologist, says there is a public sprayer in Chestertown and he is trying to make arrangements with some one to work it. Public spirited citizens and our Town Commissioners should take an active interest in this matter and see that every effort is made to kill and destroy this dreadful pest. The following letter was written to one of our citizens:

MY DEAR SIR:—I have your favor of the 22nd instant and beg to advise that it is my purpose to inaugurate a public sprayer at your town at the earliest possible date. I cannot say at this writing when this will be possible. I have a rig in your town which I will take up just as soon as I can get a man to operate it.

Big Year For Book Concern.

Rev. Dr. A. S.
