**Ordinance Against Stove Pipes.**

Be it enacted and ordained that the use of stove pipes in all buildings is prohibited except where such stove pipe or pipes enter into brick chimney solidly constructed, extending either from the ground or from below the joist or rafter of building to at least 2 1/2 feet above the roof.

Be it enacted that the use of stove pipes through all stud partition is prohibited unless the partition where the pipes go shall be bricked up around the pipe to a point not less than 12 inches both below and above the pipe.

Be it enacted that the fine for the violation of either of the above Ordinances shall be One Dollar for each and every day of the violation of same. Be it further enacted that where such violation do now or may hereafter exist, and where notice has been given of the same, if the parties owning such property fail to remedy same within five days of such notice, the Commissioners of Chestertown shall proceed at once to have same removed or remedied and all costs connected with such removal or remedying shall be at the expense of the owner of the property and shall be a lien on said property.

**THE WEDDING DELAYED.**  
Rev. G. J. Hooker, a Prominent Pastor of Kennedyville M. P. Church Figures in an Exciting Marriage Ceremony at Hurluck, Last week

Rev. G. J. Hooker, a former popular pastor of Kennedyville M. P. Church figured in an exciting wedding ceremony at Hurluck last week as told in the following manner by a correspondent of the Sun:

Hurluck, Dorchester county, about 15 miles from Easton has, the past week been the scene of much excitement. First, it was the arrest of a school teacher for whipping a scholar, Friday it was threatened by a destructive fire which drew crowds of people from all parts of the surrounding country. He had gotten as far in the ceremony as "if anyone can show just and lawful cause why these two people should not be joined together, let him now speak or forever hereafter hold his peace," a member of the Holiness Church, John Harper, who had come in just behind the bridal party, rushed up the aisle, Bible in hand, reading it and at the same time crying out:

"Stop it! stop it! he is a divorced man. It's against the laws of God! You have no right to marry him; you are violating God's law!"

This he kept up all the time the minister was praying. He was told to stop. Mr. George Trice went to him and tried to keep him still, but could not. The preacher said "Put him out." The bridal party, especially the young lady, was nervous and trembling. Frank Parvin and A. N. He was finally gotten out and the marriage ceremony completed.
