

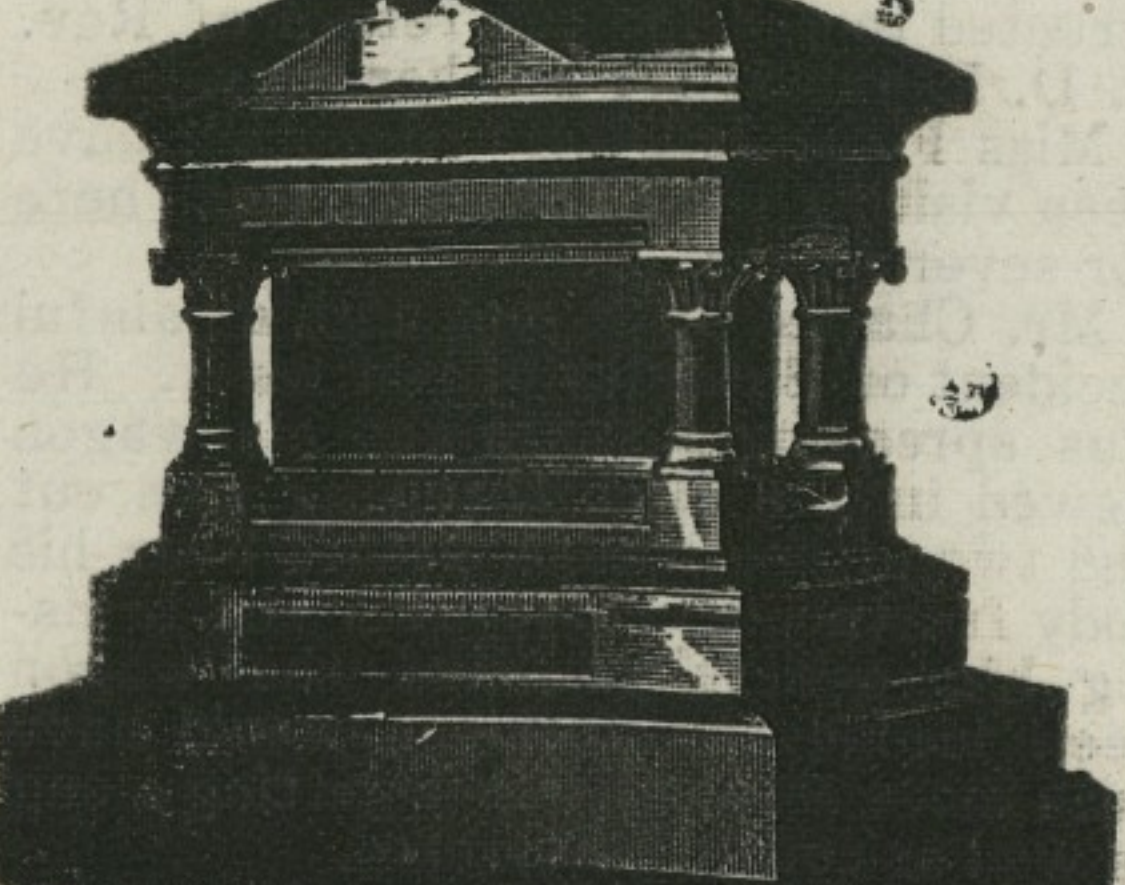

otherwise.  
Our next stop was Rangoon, Burma, where we see elephants piling lumber and doing work about the saw mills, and many other interesting things.  
From Rangoon we go to Singapore, whose beautiful harbor is the meeting place of all ships. Boats from all places in the world, Australia, India, China, Japan, England and Germany; in fact, I saw more boats come and go and at anchor at Singapore than any place in the world. Here is a fine climate, being under the equator, it is not as hot as many other countries either north or south; it rains every night, but the days are beautiful. This is one place where the sun rises and sets at six o'clock.

From Singapore we went to Jahor, India, to see the palace of the Sultan. Didn't see his majesty, as he was up at another mansion on a hill, where he has a glass palace, and when it gets too hot has it so arranged that it can be sunk in the lake and cooled off. Who would not be a Sultan!  
We now go off the beaten track of the globe trotter, away south of the equator to Batavia, Java, a very beautiful island; here we were royally entertained and had a most delightful time among the little Javans.

Our next stop was the Island of Borneo; here the wild men of Borneo entertained us with their war dances, spear throwing, buffalo racing, wrestling and many exhibitions peculiar to this far-away island. Borneo was the hottest place we found in our around-the-world trip; other places were hot, but Borneo was the hottest.

We next sail for Manila, and here we are met by Americans and given a good, hearty American welcome; in fact, we had the freedom of the city, and nothing was too good for us. Our stay in our far east possession was all too short, but had we stayed longer, they would have killed us with kindness.

We next crossed the China Seas and anchored at Hong Kong and saw much of interest. A sail up the Pearl River of 100 miles to Canton, where we see the way the people live in the flowery kingdom was very interesting.

Our next stop was in the land of the rising sun and in no City or Country were we more royally treated than in Japan and from the time of our arrival at Nagasaki until we sailed from Yokohama, at every station and town throughout the empire, it was one round of receptions; fireworks by day and by night; the illuminated and decorated in our honor, miles of flags and beside each Japanese flag was to be seen the Stars and Stripes. Free shows, free entertainments, each city trying to do out the others in doing us honor. We finally bid farewell to our little Jap friends and beautiful Japan and in ten days, reached our own beautiful Hawaiian group, the paradise of the Pacific—the paradise of the world. Here our stay was all too short and in seven days we were back in San Francisco, just three and one-half months from New York.

The Cleveland is the largest ship that ever went around the world and the first ship to carry a group of excursionists around the world. We had a very remarkable trip. There were 650 passengers, all out for a good time and I doubt if that many people ever had a better time. This being the first trip ever made of its kind, the people of the different countries laid themselves out to give us the time of our lives and had been kings and princes, we could not have been treated more royally. Well, it's great to see the world and the strange people and stranger customs, but it is great to get back and put foot on good American soil once more.
