At the appointed hour, eight o'clock, the bridal party entered the large edifice to the sweet strains of Lohengrin's wedding march, sung by a choir of thirty voices. First came the ushers, Messrs. L. Price and Horton Silcox, in full dress, followed by Master Joseph Rae, as ring-bearer and little Miss Catherine Rae, as flower girl, carrying a huge basket of sweet peas, dressed in white. Upon their return they will spend some weeks at Betterton, during which time their home, the "Greenwood Farm," recently purchased by the groom from the Turner estate, will undergo many repairs and improvements and be fitted up for their occupancy. The bride's only ornament was a diamond brooch, gift of the groom, which held her veil in place. She carried a prayer book and sweet peas. The ring ceremony was used. During the three days previous to the event, she entertained the bridal party and others at her home, at a house party, a jolly time being enjoyed. The bride is a niece of Mr. and Mrs. Numsen, the well-known millionaire packers, and a first cousin to the late Mrs. Chas. Steiff, well-known in Baltimore society and an artist of some note, having graduated from the Md. Institute of Art several years ago. With her mother and sisters she has traveled much and enjoys a large acquaintance. Mr. Silcox is well-known in Kent and is very popular with a wide circle of friends who are most pleased to learn of his happy marriage. The wedding presents included large sums of money, rare and handsome cut glass, silverware, bric-a-brac and many other articles, useful as well as ornamental.
