

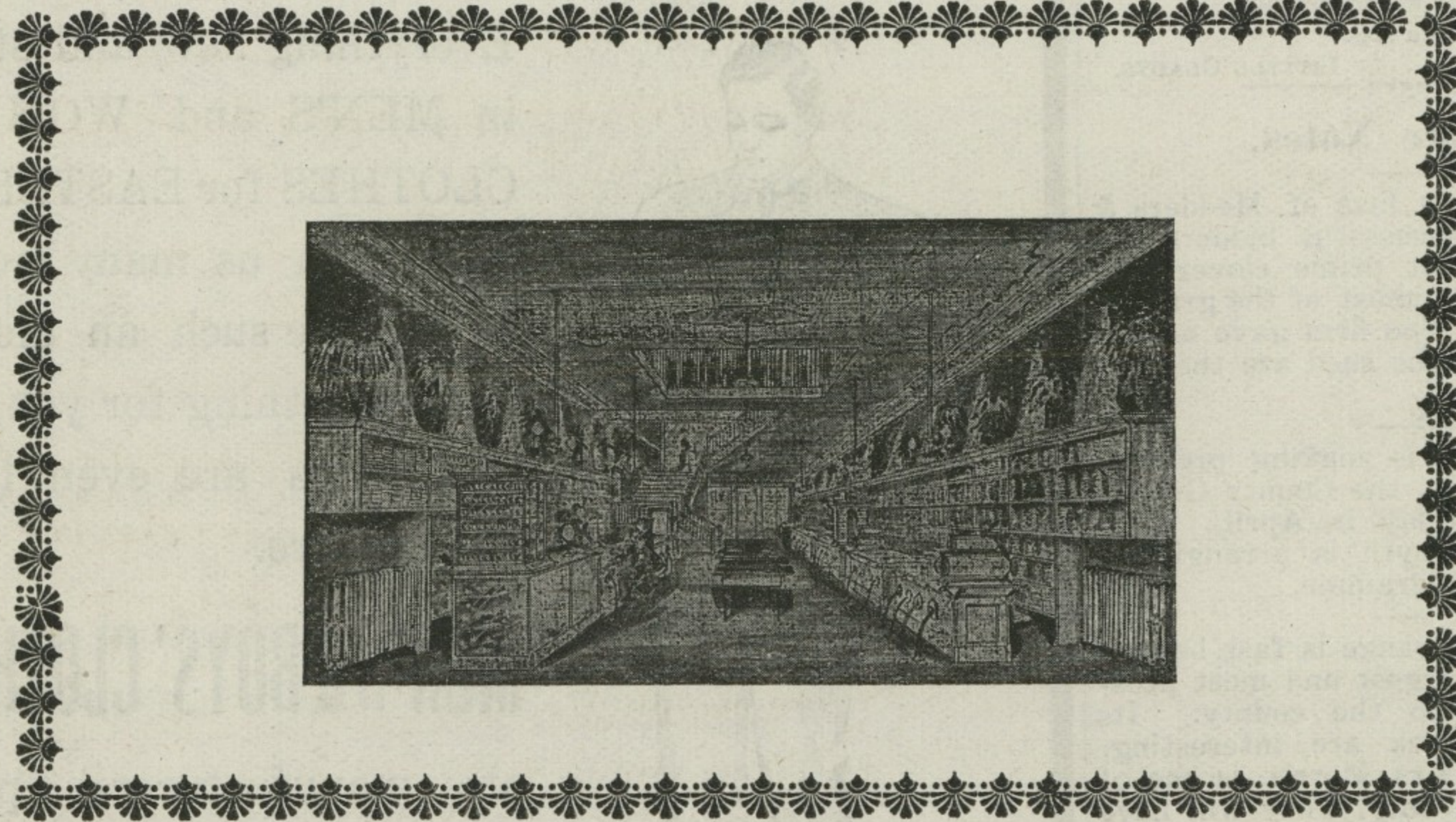

OBITUARY.

T. ROMIE STRONG.
Mr. T. Romie Strong, one of Kent's most prominent citizens, died at the home of his son-in-law, Dr. W. O. Selby, near Edesville, Wednesday, March 16, 1910, of heart trouble, aged 69 years. Mr. Strong had been ill for about eight weeks, and every care and attention possible had been given him by his devoted wife and children. Mr. Strong had many warm and personal friendships throughout this county and State who learned with regret of his death. He had a long and honored public career and he filled with marked faithfulness every trust reposed in him. The first public position he filled was that of county commissioner, which office he held for eight years, having been re-elected at the end of his first term. He was next elected Register of Wills for a term of six years and at the end of this term he was elected to the House of Delegates for two consecutive terms. At the end of his second term as a member of the Legislature he retired from public life and devoted his time and talents to the cultivation of his beautifully located farm on Lewisford's bay until about a year ago when he rented his farm and removed with his wife to Baltimore where he lived until a few days ago, when, at the request, he was brought to Edesville to the home of Dr. Selby where he spent the last hours of his life amid the scenes and friendships of his boyhood days. A few hours before death he called his daughter to his bedside and said: "The end is near, I know it, I see it written in the book of God."
Mr. Strong was a man of tender feelings toward his fellow man, a loving and devoted husband and father, a true and faithful friend and died as he had lived without malice or ill-will. He leaves a widow, a Miss Charlotte Augusta Wickes, a daughter of the late James P. Wickes, before her marriage, and seven children, Mrs. W. G. Falton, of Virginia; Dr. J. Page Strong and Mrs. Merritt Brice, of Baltimore; Elwood Strong, of Queen Annes county; Mrs. W. O. Selby, Miss Edna and Mr. Wm. R. Strong, of Edesville.
Funeral services were held at St. Paul's Church yesterday afternoon, conducted by Rev. L. Linger. The pall-bearers were his three sons, Dr. J. Page, Elwood S. and Wm. R. Strong, and Dr. Merritt Brice, Dr. W. O. Selby and Lewin W. Wickes. Charles L. Dodd funeral director.

MRS. MARY LOUISE BAKER.
Mrs. Mary Louise Baker, widow of the late Charles H. Baker Esq., a former prominent lawyer and churchman, of this town, died in her apartments at the home of Mrs. J. Hall Denny, on Tuesday, of paralysis, aged 75 years. The deceased was a resident of this town for a long number of years, and during her young days was intimately identified with the social and religious life of the community. She was an active member of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and when her health would permit, was a regular attendant upon the services of the church. The deceased had been in failing health for some years, but she bore her sufferings with christian fortitude, and passed to the great beyond as peacefully and quietly as the coming of the morn. She is survived by two daughters, Miss Ida Baker, and Mrs. John D. Urie, both of Chestertown. Funeral services were held on Thursday afternoon, conducted by Rev. Dr. L. E. Barrett, in the cemetery in Chester cemetery. The pall-bearers were Messrs. Henry Brown, Walter S. Trew, Wilbur Eliason, Jr., Herbert E. Perkins, Nicholas Denny and Wilbur W. Thomas. Undertaker J. E. Ferguson had charge of the funeral arrangements.

DANIEL W. HADAWAY.
The funeral services of the late ex-Sheriff Daniel W. Hadaway, whose sad and sudden death was reported in our last issue, were held on Sunday afternoon at 3.30 o'clock in the M.E. The church was crowded with sympathetic friends from all parts of the county, and the great esteem in which the deceased was held was evidenced by the great feelings of grief manifested at the services. Barrett and Little spoke touchingly of the good deeds and upright life of the deceased. The combined choir of the Methodist churches sang appropriate hymns. Interment was made in Chester Cemetery. MRS. ELIZA WALBERT.
Mrs. Eliza Walbert, a highly esteemed and aged resident of this county for years, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Benj. F. Rash, near town, on Thursday morning at 3.30 o'clock from the infirmities of age, aged 88 years. The deceased was born in Pennsylvania. She and her husband removed to Kent county and engaged in farming on the farm near Fairlee, now tenanted by Mr. Vansant and owned by Mr. W. Frank Jarrell. For the past 18 years she had made her home with her daughter, Mrs. Rash, who did everything in her power for her comfort. She is survived by ten children, all of whom are living. They are Messrs. Alfred, Geo., Israel, Theodore, James and Joseph Walbert, Mrs. B. F. Rash, Mrs. C. G. Hadaway, Mrs. John Joiner and Mrs. Moses Cranor. Funeral services will be held at the residence of Mr. B. F. Rash, this (Saturday) afternoon at two o'clock with interment in Chester cemetery. The pall-bearers will be her six sons. Undertaker J. E. Ferguson will have charge of funeral arrangements.

CAPT. SHADRACK W. WATKINS.
Capt. Shadrack W. Watkins died at his home on Eastern Neck Island Thursday of last week, after a long illness, aged 80 years. He was a citizen of correct life and habits, and was held in the highest esteem by all who knew him. He was a consistent member of Wesley Chapel M. P. Church, and took an active part in all its interests. He leaves the following children: Chas. L. of Eastern Neck, Wm. H., of Baltimore, J. B., of New York, and Mrs. Walter R. Kendall, of near Worton. The funeral took place Saturday at 2 P. M. at Wesley Chapel, Rev. C. M. Compher officiating.
