DIDN'T they fall into the trap in fine shape?

THE STATE TAX for 1911 has been fixed by the Legislature at 22 cents on the \$100. This is 6 cents higher than it is this year, and 4 1/2 cents of the increase is going on the State roads being built by the State Good Roads Commission.

SENATOR SLAY has passed the bill for changing the method of recording deeds in the court house. This is the bill which means a great unnecessary expense to the tax-payers of the county, and its passage is a great blunder. The tax-payers will not forget this bill.

If anybody in Kent county believes that the Slay road bill will take the roads of the county out of politics, he will have a far different idea of it before the end of the year 1910. It means more politics than ever and the tax-payers of the county are not fooled one bit.

THERE is an interesting rumor in regard to a political deal having been made by the passage of the Slay Road Bill. If the bill becomes a law and this deal develops we shall let the people of the county know what it is. It is said that the deal is the cause for the passage of the bill.

THE appointment of Mr. Foster Cannon as one of the census takers for Chestertown district is a most excellent appointment. Foster can be depended upon to do the job right, and he is just the fellow to ask the ladies the questions which they will be required to answer, and Mr. William H. Lambert is O. K., too. The ladies are in for it, with these two fellows, sure.

DELEGATE WILLIS' bill providing for a new registration in Kent county with party affiliation in 1910, has been favorably reported in the House. We do not wish it to be construed that we are opposed to the provisions of this bill, but as there are a number of bills in the Legislature relating to registration, Senator Gorman's in particular, which provides for a new general registration in 1911, what is the use of Kent county incurring the extra large expense of a general registration in 1910, when it will have to be done again in 1911, to comply with the disfranchisement amendment or to other laws already passed? Such procedure is similar to the folly of neglecting to exempt Kent county from the provisions of the general reassessment bills.

PRESIDENT WOODROW WILSON, of Princeton University, in a great speech at the Democratic dinner in Elizabeth, N. J., Tuesday night said: "One of the chief duties of the Democratic party is to initiate such reform, alike in local and in Federal Government, as will secure economy, responsibility, honesty and fidelity." This is the policy which the TRANSCRIPT has adopted for the good of the party and for the welfare of the people. Dr. Wilson said that the time is at hand when the Democrats must take charge of the country's affairs. So say we, or the Republican trusts and tariff barons, kept in power by the colored voters throughout the nation, will bring on war between the masses and the classes.

IF THE Chestertown Water Board carries out the provisions of the report of the committee of citizens in reference to improvements to the water plant, the town tax will have to be raised at least ten cents on the \$100 in order to provide for the extra expense to be incurred. The revenue from the plant will never pay the expense, and Mr. Thomas W. Eliason's persistency in having done what he wants done will bankrupt the Water Works. We shall prove later on that this statement is true. No one in Chestertown knows the condition of the Chestertown Water Works better than does Mr. Eliason. He knew it when he was a member of the private corporation, and he knows the town bought a gold brick when it purchased the plant at the fabulous sum of \$24,000. He held the bonds then. Now he is willing that the tax rate of Chestertown shall be raised and that the Water Works shall be bankrupted in order that his impractical ideas and fancies may be carried out. So far as the passage of the bill in the Legislature is concerned, his influence has tied the hands of the Water Board, but the question as to whether the people of the town are willing that their tax rate shall be increased, and that their money shall be spent for purposes as impractical as they are impossible, from a financial point of view, remains to be seen. And if the people fail to ratify the bond issue at the polls, charge the whole thing where it properly belongs, to those who are determined to block all progressive moves made for the town's welfare and advancement.

KENT COUNTY should have been exempted from the provisions of the general Re-assessment bill, so far as they relate to the re-valuation of personal property. An assessment of personal property was made by the County Commissioners in 1908 at considerable expense to the tax-payers, and to include this kind of property in the new assessment bill at this time is a great mistake. In fact we do not believe that the present is the proper time for a re-valuation of property in Kent for many reasons, one of which is the great expense, and another reason is because of the inflated value of farm lands. The County Commissioners have kept pretty close watch on property owners, and if there is any property not assessed, it would likely be placed on the books in the next two years. A general assessment for the county means a great expense to the tax-payers. The assessment bill passed this week.

POLITICAL INSINCERITY.

The Board of County Commissioners have had control of the financial affairs of Kent county since its foundation. To them has been entrusted the levying of the money necessary to provide for county expenses and to disburse this money. The people have been content for years to entrust such powers to the commissioners, and when the board has transcended its power, the people, by their votes, have brought about changes in its management. This has been the history of the county for years. Never once, however, has there been a demand for doing away with the board, and bringing into the county a stranger under nobody's authority save the Governor of the State, and to give this stranger a free hand in the expenditure of the people's money, with no one to say him nay, and with no power given to the people to appeal from the authority of the engineer either to the County Commissioners or to the Circuit Court. This strange and drastic innovation is the result of the determination of the Organization element of the party to control the roads of this county as they have been for years past to their political advantage, regardless of the effect of such procedure upon the great mass of the tax-payers. If the Board of County Commissioners has been the office where political influence and pressure have been used to the greatest extent for years past, whose fault is it, but that of those who are determined that because their candidates were defeated by the people in the nomination, they will defeat the will of the tax-payers by the passage of a bill through the Legislature that will be the most iniquitous piece of political machinery ever perpetrated upon the people? Who but the Organization forces of the Democratic party are responsible for the political pressure and influence exerted by the commissioners for years? They have had control of the board since 1903, and if they had shown any disposition to free the board of politics, they have certainly had ample time to show their good faith. Now, when by every fair and honest means, the People's faction of the party won control of the commissioners' office, and by all that is fair and honest, they should be allowed to enjoy their just rights unmolested, the bosses of the Organization forces out on a sanctimonious air and say they desire to take the roads out of politics by giving the Governor the power to appoint a complete stranger to come into the county and help them get away with the money which the board of commissioners will be compelled to levy for them to use. If they would not keep the roads out of politics from 1903 to 1909—six years—but use them for all they were worth to further their political advancement, and in the last six months of their administration squandered \$30,000 that we know of, and no one knows how much more, does any one have any faith in their sincerity when they say they desire to take the roads out of politics by giving the Governor the power to appoint the engineer? Is it not laughable? Is it not ridiculously absurd to think for a moment that the Organization forces could keep the roads out of politics, even if they tried? Senator Slay, by the passage of his bill, has cast the greatest reflection upon Messrs. Charles D. Wood and T. Benj. Crew, two as honest and conservative men as we have in the county. We believe that the confidence of the people in these two men with Mr. Harry Davis as the president of the board was not misplaced when they elected them to office. Their acts since they have been members of the board demonstrate the fact that they are determined to look after the interests of the tax-payers. Now, then, for them to be discounted, their honesty and integrity to be called in question and the will of the people to be trodden in the dust by the passage of a road law forced upon us by a few politicians, is the most reprehensible injustice, and the most partisan factional politics. Senator Slay passed this bill in the Senate last Friday, a day before it was possible to publish his excuse for foisting such a law upon the people as his letter contained last Saturday. He gave the people no time to answer his letter, he simply listened to somebody and passed the bill regardless of the people's opinion. One of our largest tax-payers came into our office on Monday morning with a letter addressed to Senator Slay protesting against the passage of the bill. We told him it was too late. He had passed his bill Friday. It would not do for us to publish what the tax-payer said. And so it is. The Organization has driven another nail in its coffin. They have undertaken to fool the people again, and Senator Slay has been their instrument. But they are not fooled. Just wait and see.
