How it Works in Caroline.

The Baltimore Sun on Tuesday in discussing the value of the Caroline Road Law to the people of that county says: "Caroline got its road law in 1904, when Senator Goslin, who is the father of the bill, was a member of the House of Delegates from that county. For many years previous—since Caroline had been a county, no doubt—the highways had been looked after under the old system of local supervisors. Each road was cut up into so many sections and each section "farmed out" for repairs and improvement. Each man worked his section according to his ideas, and "repairs" consisted generally of throwing loose dirt into holes in the road. The result was a discouraging patchwork and a poor system of roads. If the system was not good for the roads, it was good for the politicians; in fact was one of the principal assets of whatever party was in power. For years it was realized that the people's money was not being well spent, although the road supervisors, as a rule, were honest and worked hard. The trouble was lack of a system, a scheme and the application of modern, scientific principles. In 1904 the leading men of both political parties got together and decided that Caroline should have a new road law. This, as stated, Mr. Goslin had passed by the Legislature. It gave the County Commissioners authority to collect a complete road-making outfit and appoint a road engineer at a salary of \$1,500 a year. There was no bond issue; the cost of improvement was to be carried in the tax levy each year. The county now owns 32 miles, a complete set of road-making equipment and recently has added a steam roller. During the road-making season from 25 to 30 men are employed. The system is out of politics, and Caroline has some of the best roads in the State, where formerly it had some of the worst. This is convincing testimony, and proves the economy of the law as it is applied to Caroline, and yet for purely political reasons, and no other, the people of this county are to be deprived of the benefit of a law like this, and compelled to take a piece of political machinery that will grind out, as has been done in the last six months, the taxpayers' money. Shame on the framers of such a law as is being forced upon us in place of the Caroline law.

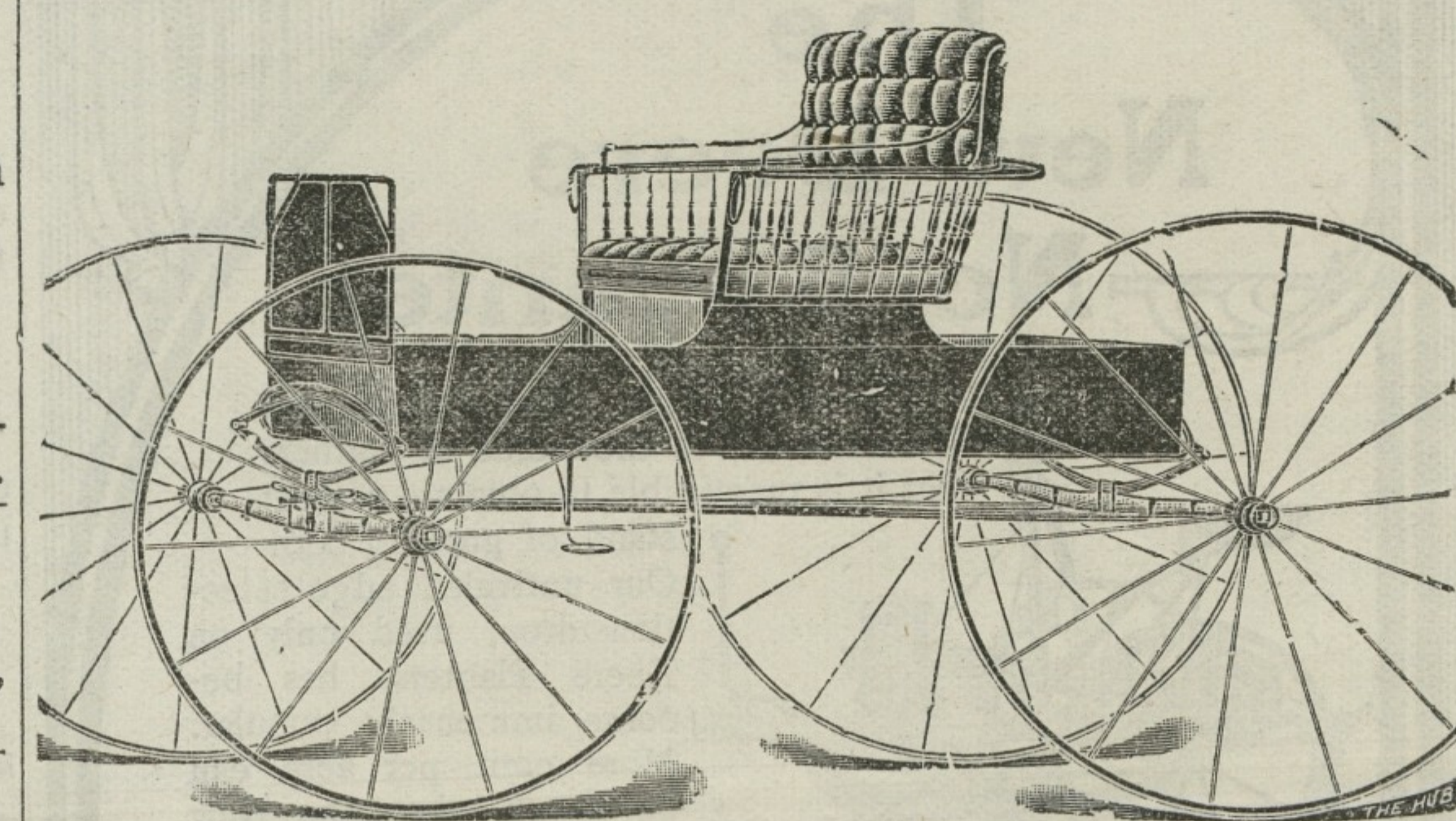

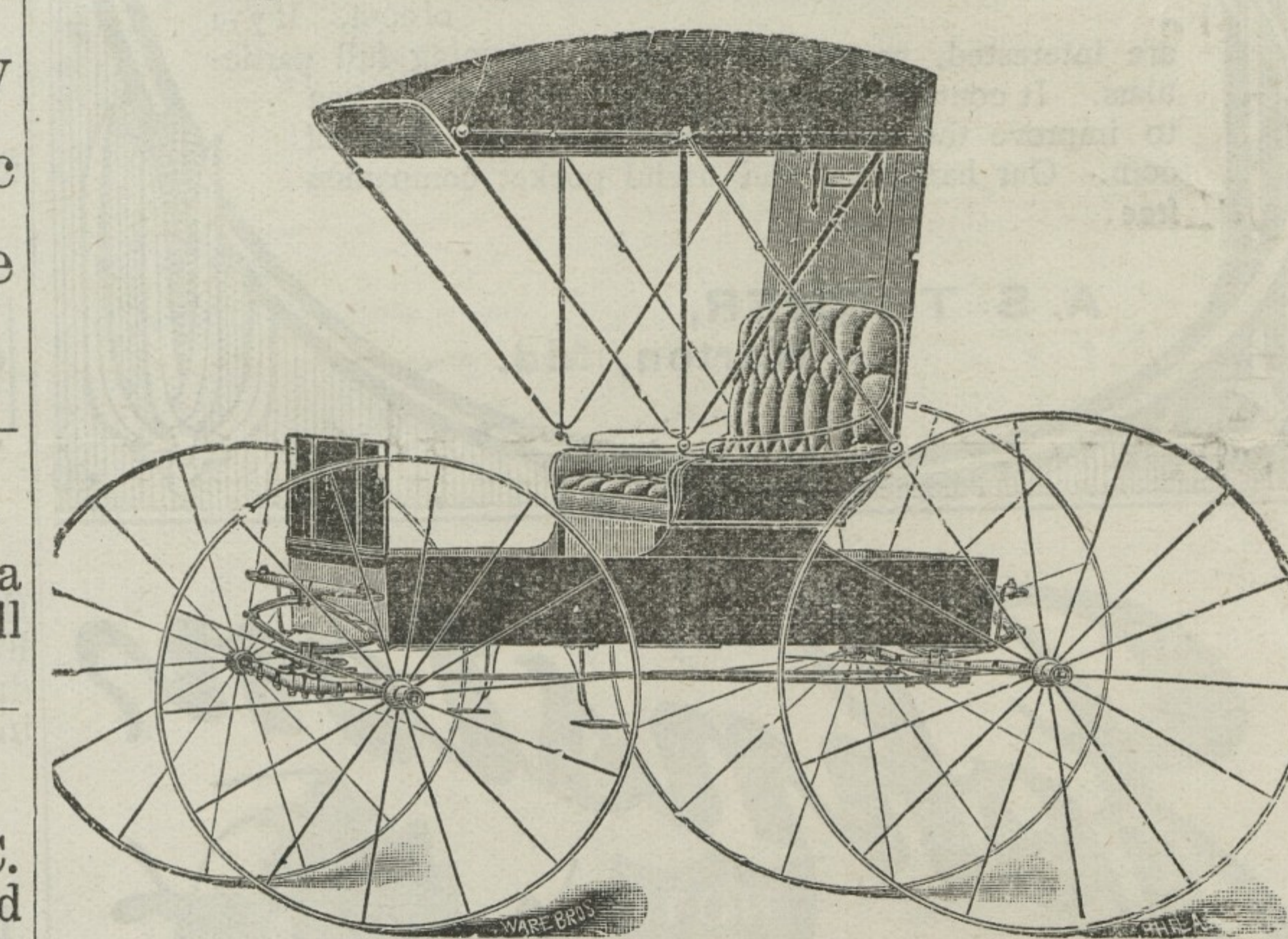

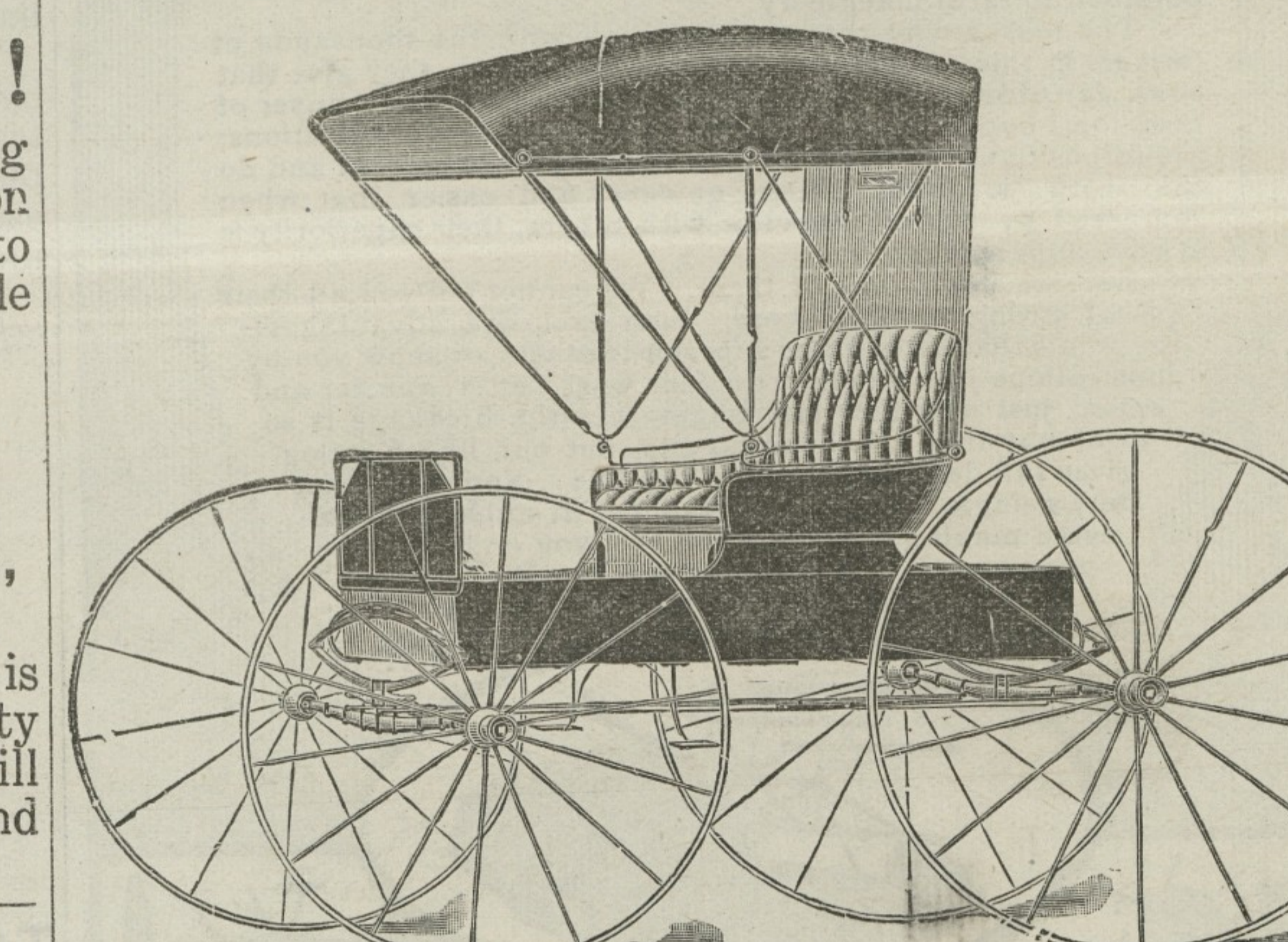
