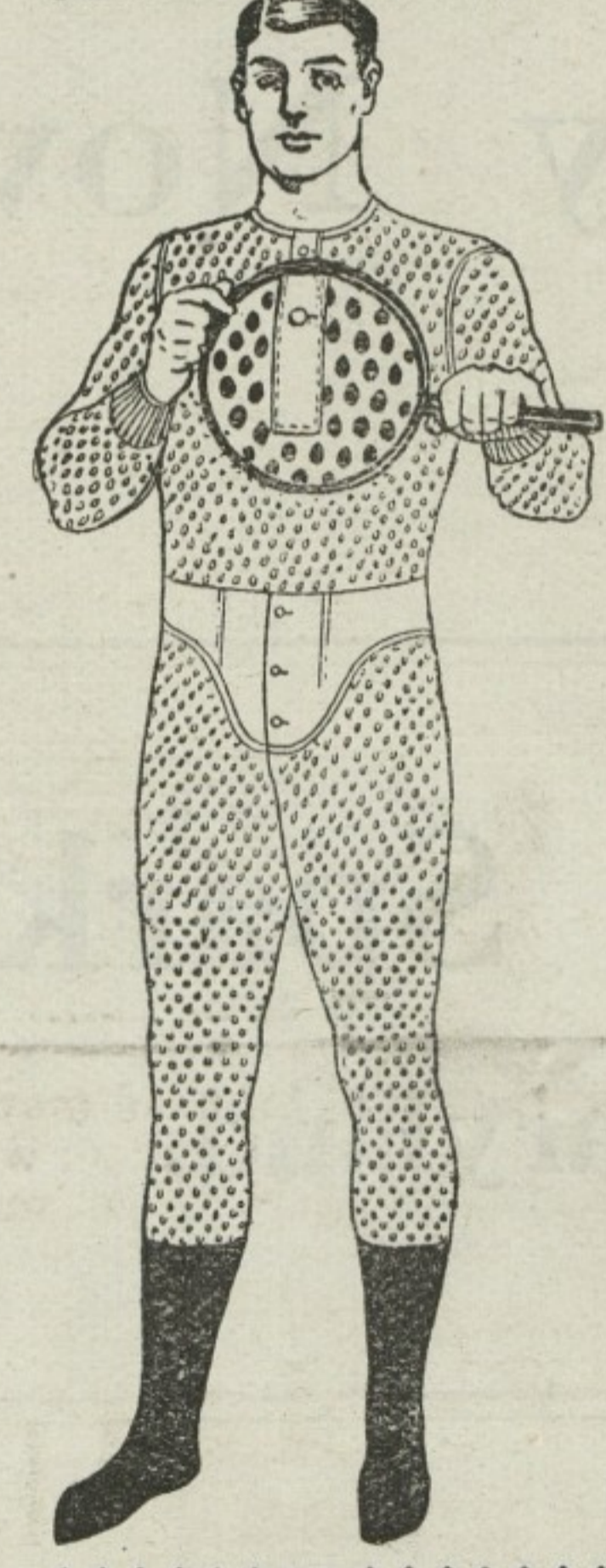
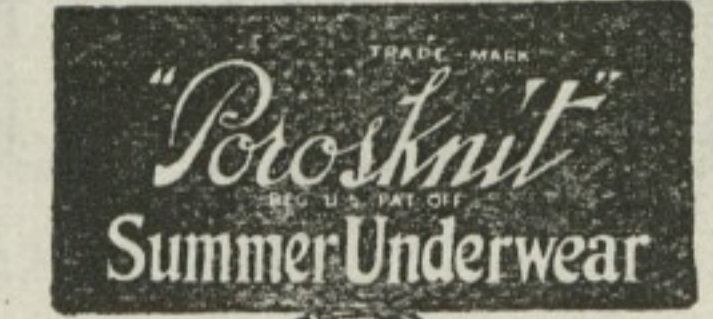

### TOLD IN BRIEF.

—Mr. Thomas Elison has received a fine new touring car this week.

—Dr. Galen Wright will be in charge of the practice of his late father in Warwick.

—Gov. Crothers has issued a proclamation designating Friday, April 21, as Arbor and Highway Day.

—Who will be the first gardener in Chestertown to have a ripe tomato? Get to work now real quick.

—It is reported that the headquarters of the Singer Sewing Machine Company will be removed to Lavre de Grace.

—There was a heavy frost on Thursday morning, but owing to the dry weather it is not thought that any damage has been done to fruit.

—The Kent County Land Company has purchased from Mr. W. Wilson, his farm of 188 acres, situated near Millington. The price is said to have been \$8000.

—The Peerless Fertilizer Co.'s Bowlers vanquished the Fairlee Grange bowlers at a game of duck pins at the Chestertown Bowling Alley Tuesday evening.

—Mr. Carl Bordley has drawn a map of Chestertown that is the most complete and accurate extant. Mr. Bordley has rare talent and ability as an artist with pen and ink.

—Ex-Senator Garrett Foxwell is the first farmer in Kent to begin planting corn. He began last Monday. Col. Albert Story, in Queen Anne's, has a 10-acre field up and growing nicely.

—The asparagus crop promises to be a large and profitable one this season. Mr. Edmun Hurt, of Locust Grove, is becoming one of the leading growers in the county, and has a big acreage.

—The Water Board is having installed by Mr. Wm. C. Sutton, plumber, sixteen new fire plugs in various sections of the town. This is being done independent of the proposed bond issue for the town.

—One of our oldest and most prominent citizens has caught the automobile fever, and is seriously considering the purchase of one. We would not be surprised any time to hear that it has arrived.

—Mr. Louis L. Smith, of Baltimore city, has purchased the J. H. Gooding farm, situated on the new State Road, near Chestertown. Real estate agents, real estate brokers, prepared papers for the negotiation.

—The Kent County Land Company purchased this week Mrs. Thomas D. Bowers' residence on High street, now occupied by Miss Annie Copper, and sold the same the next day to Mr. Geo. W. McWhorter.

—Mr. Klugh, owner of the Spry farm, near Crumpton, is perhaps the largest potato grower in this county this year. He has planted 500 bushels which means about 60 acres. It will be interesting to watch this yield.

—The Maryland Experiment Station will conduct a spray demonstration at Mr. D. B. Stewart's White Hall farm, near Chestertown, Thursday, April 21. The public is invited. The spraying will be in charge of Prof. Norman, Asst. Pathologist.

—The Denton Automobile Show was visited last week by Dr. and Mrs. F. B. Hines, Chas. Jessup, Wm. B. Glogh, Wm. McKee, J. H. Sides, Emerson Sparks, C. C. Jones, Webster Hague, Mr. and Mrs. Jas. G. Beck, Mr. and Mrs. A. L. Sparks and others.

—Washington College reopened on Monday after having been closed several weeks on account of sickness. The students will be in the city in order to work before the close of the year in order to make good the lost time. We understand that commencement will be held as usual in June.

—The census enumerators began their work yesterday. They desire us to state that they will call upon every person in Chestertown, ask them questions, and will endeavor to slight no one. They sincerely hope that every one will be at home. The enumerators for this district are Messrs. Foster Cannon and William H. Lamb.

—The Glee Club of the Chestertown High School will hold its first concert in the Assembly Hall of the school on April 28th, under the direction of Miss Fannie Stuart. It is most commendable in Miss Stuart to develop the musical taste of the children, and the public should encourage her efforts by their presence.

—The Board of Town Commissioners is contemplating a number of improvements for the town during the spring and summer. They mentioned several to us this week, that will add much to the beauty and attractiveness of the town, among which is a new street sprinkler. We respectfully urge the Commissioners to purchase this needed improvement as early as possible, and get one that will sprinkle the whole of Main street at one time. Then keep up the good work you are already doing, clean and pave all the ditches, enforce the ordinance against throwing rubbish and peanut hulls in our streets for the ladies to drag their dresses over on Sunday, and you will be alright. It is a shame that some people have no more regard for the beauty of their town, and the health of its people, than to sweep rubbish from their places of business into the street. The town authorities should put a stop to it.
