**DEPARTMENT COMMANDER.**

Col. Wm. J. Vannort, one of Chestertown's Foremost Citizens, Receives Signal Honor.

Col. Wm. J. Vannort of Chestertown who attended the session of the Grand Army Encampment in Baltimore during last week was elected Department Commander of Maryland on Saturday. This is a well deserved honor for Col. Vannort who is one of the most prominent and enthusiastic Grand Army men in this State. In speaking of Col. Vannort, the Baltimore American on Saturday said: Comrade William J. Vannort, who was elected department commander, enlisted as second lieutenant in company H, Second Eastern Shore Maryland Volunteer Infantry, on March 20, 1862. He was in every engagement in which the regiment participated until July 15, 1864, when he was severely wounded at Snickers Ford while in charge of his company, receiving a gunshot wound in the right arm and a shell wound in the left leg, which disabled him from active duty until March 11 following, when, by reason of a consolidation of the regiments with the Eleventh Maryland, he was made first lieutenant of company H of the latter command, and was mustered out August 17, 1865. Comrade Vannort was a charter member of Wilkens Post, No. 17, at Chestertown, in 1882. He remained in that post as commander until, by reason of losses by death and removal, the post surrendered its charter. He then joined Wilson Post, No. 1, on April 9, 1891, and has been an honored and useful member ever since. He has held the position of senior vice commander in the Department of Maryland; has attended many of the national encampments, having the highest honor of being selected on important legislative committees and as aid to the commander-in-chief.

**CONFERENCE MEMBERSHIP 27,306.**

One of the most interesting features of the closing session was the reading of the statistical report of the conference, which showed that there are 13 less unstationed ministers than last year, the present number being 71. There are now 1,416 probationers on the rolls, a decrease of 245, while the full membership of the conference is 27,306, an increase of 211. Two hundred and fifteen adults were baptized, the number having been less than that of last year by 162; 1,595 children were baptized, a decrease of 157. Conversions made numbered 2,245, less by 1,924 than last year. The number of Sunday-school officers and teachers increased by 64. The value of church property now is \$2,073,800, the increase over last year having been \$20,150. The value of the parsonages is \$267,735, an increase of \$33,710.

" 1,500 " 2,500..... 18.00  
" 2,500 " 4,000..... 22.00  
" 4,000 " 6,000..... 28.00  
" 6,000 " 10,000..... 35.00  
" 10,000 " 15,000..... 42.00  
" 15,000 " 20,000..... 50.00

The applicant must either make oath, as heretofore, before the Clerk of the Circuit Court of the county where he is engaged in business, of the amount of goods kept on hand at the principal season of sale or the oath may be administered by a Justice of the Peace when the person wanting a license applies through an agent.

STATIONERS—Any owner and keeper of every stallion or jack shall before being permitted to stand or station such animal pay to the clerk of the Court or one of the justices of the peace of the state the highest sum that he intends to receive for standing or stationing such a stallion or jack for one year from the date thereof, provided that in case shall the sum directed to be paid by this section for such license be less than ten dollars, and that every stallion or jack, upon which the said tax is paid, shall be exempt from all other state tax.

Any owner or keeper standing or stationing any stallion or jack without a license shall forfeit and pay twice the sum authorized and required to be paid in the last preceding section one-half to the state and the other half to the informers.
