THE BOND ISSUE.

The election for one member of the Board of Town Commissioners to succeed Mr. Thomas S. Bordley, whose term expires May 1, 1910, will be held on Monday, April 25th. Mr. Merriek Clements, book-keeper in the Chestertown Bank of Maryland, is the only candidate, and there will be no contest in the election. Mr. Clements will make an excellent commissioner we are sure. But there is a matter of the greatest importance to be decided at the election, and one in which the tax-payers of the town are vitally interested, and that is the proposition to bond the town for the sum of \$10,000 to provide improvements to the water system and more adequate fire protection. The bill has been published in all the papers, and it is the duty of the tax-payers to familiarize themselves with the provisions of the bill in order that they may vote intelligently in the election.

It will be observed that the bill provides for an increase in the town's tax-rate, provided the revenue of the water works is not sufficient to pay the increased cost of making contemplated improvements, and to pay for the maintenance of the same. It will also be observed that the bill binds the Water Board to spend the \$10,000 and make the improvements, if such they can be called, in strict accordance with the provisions of the report of a special committee of citizens of Chestertown appointed for the purpose. The tax-payers of the town should study carefully what the provisions of this committee's report are before voting to spend \$10,000 of their money for something which we believe will fail to produce the desired results. Let us see what these provisions mean.

First—It provides for testing the old pool near the home of Hope H. Barroll, Esq., and if it is found fit for service to use its water for drinking purposes. This will cost close to \$3,500 to test and repair. The value of this proposition depends entirely upon the character of the testing.

Second—To keep a man at the pump house during the night as well as day. This means a great outlay of money in additional expense. Such a man as was reported, that the bond issue of \$10,000 would be worth at the very lowest per year \$350. Then to maintain a service at night which will be adequate for fire protection would mean an additional coal bill of to say the very lowest \$500, and would likely be far in excess of that amount if the coal bill for day service last year had been \$102 and the cost of keeping a man at the pump house during the night is to provide fire protection.

Third—The Water Board must provide from its revenue an annual interest on \$500 for the payment of the interest of these bonds of \$10,000. They are paying now \$1,500 per year interest on the previous issue of the \$50,000 bonds.

Fourth—The report requires the Water Board to lay thirty additional fire plugs and to take up all three-inch mains in the town and replace them with four and six-inch mains.

We claim that if the Water Board be compelled to carry out the provisions of this report, that the bond issue of \$10,000 will not be sufficient to make all necessary improvements, and the additional expense incurred in maintaining these improvements will practically bankrupt the Water Board and render a substantial increase in the tax rate absolutely unavoidable. Let us see. The net revenue of the water system last year above all expenses was only \$700, which is more imaginary than real. If these improvements are made the extra running expenses will be:

Interest on bonds.....\$500
Man at pump house at night, 350 lowest estimate
Increased coal bill..... 500

Total increase in expenses \$1350

It is not likely that the net revenue of the plant will be any more than it was last year. Deduct \$700 from \$1350 and you have \$650 which the town is required to make good in no other way than by an increase in the tax rate, and there will be no possible chance for the Water Board to create a sinking fund to provide for the payment of one of these bonds every year as they come due. Can the people not see where Mr. Elliott's persistency has led them? To provide for the payment of increased running expenses and the payment of a \$1000 bond after a certain date means an increase in the tax rate of from 10 to 15 cents, and the commissioners have no authority in law to raise the rate beyond 50 cents. The town faces an interesting situation.

We also claim that \$10,000 will not be sufficient to make the necessary improvements, for to build a new reservoir at the pump house, to replace the old pool, to lay larger mains, and to put a new floor in the reservoir at the college, which by testing has been found to be losing nearly 60,000 gallons of water a day, and costing the town for more coal by reason of the leakage, it will cost nearer \$15,000 than it will \$10,000, and we claim that after this money is expended there will be no better protection to the town than we now have, because even if we have more water, we shall be compelled to depend upon uncertain pump pressure. Had the Water Board been allowed to use its best judgment there may have been erected an elevated tank or a standpipe system that would have saved the town money in running expenses, and would have given the fire protection which the town so much needs. We make the statement that if it were not for the condition of the reservoir at the college, which is absolutely useless, both for fire purposes and for storage, the town would have saved the \$10,000 by having had pressure, we could have saved the \$10,000 by having had an abundant supply of water by discarding the worthless reservoir. As it is we are facing a condition forced upon the Water Board, and which will be of no avail except in an increased supply of water. Such improvements are not progressive, they are not adequate, and it is only in the interest of the tax-payers, both of the present and the future, that we make this statement. If the town is compelled to wait for the necessary improvements, it will be the fault of no one but those who insisted upon forcing upon the people the spending of their money for something impractical and impossible so far as the earnings of the Water Board are concerned.
