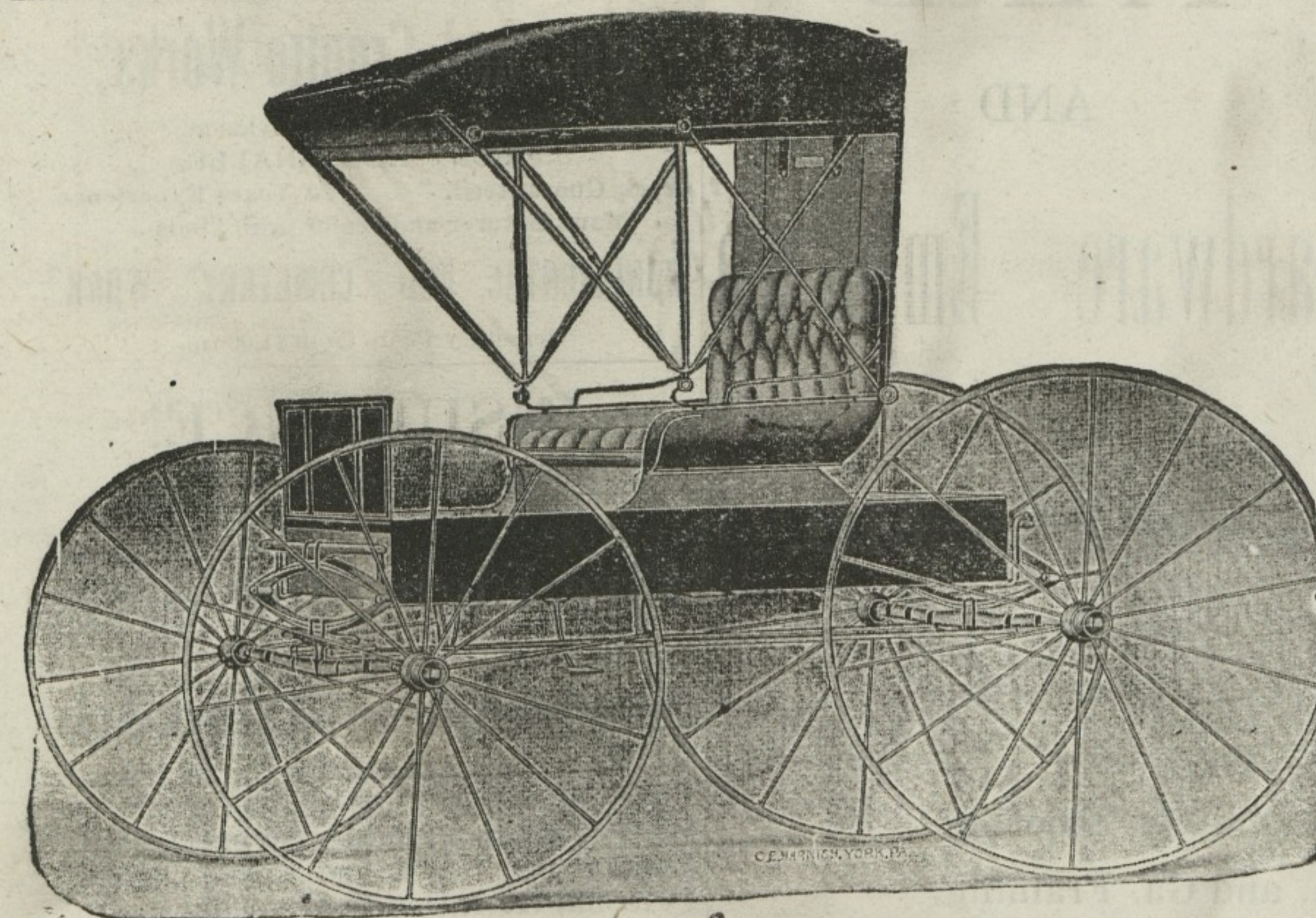

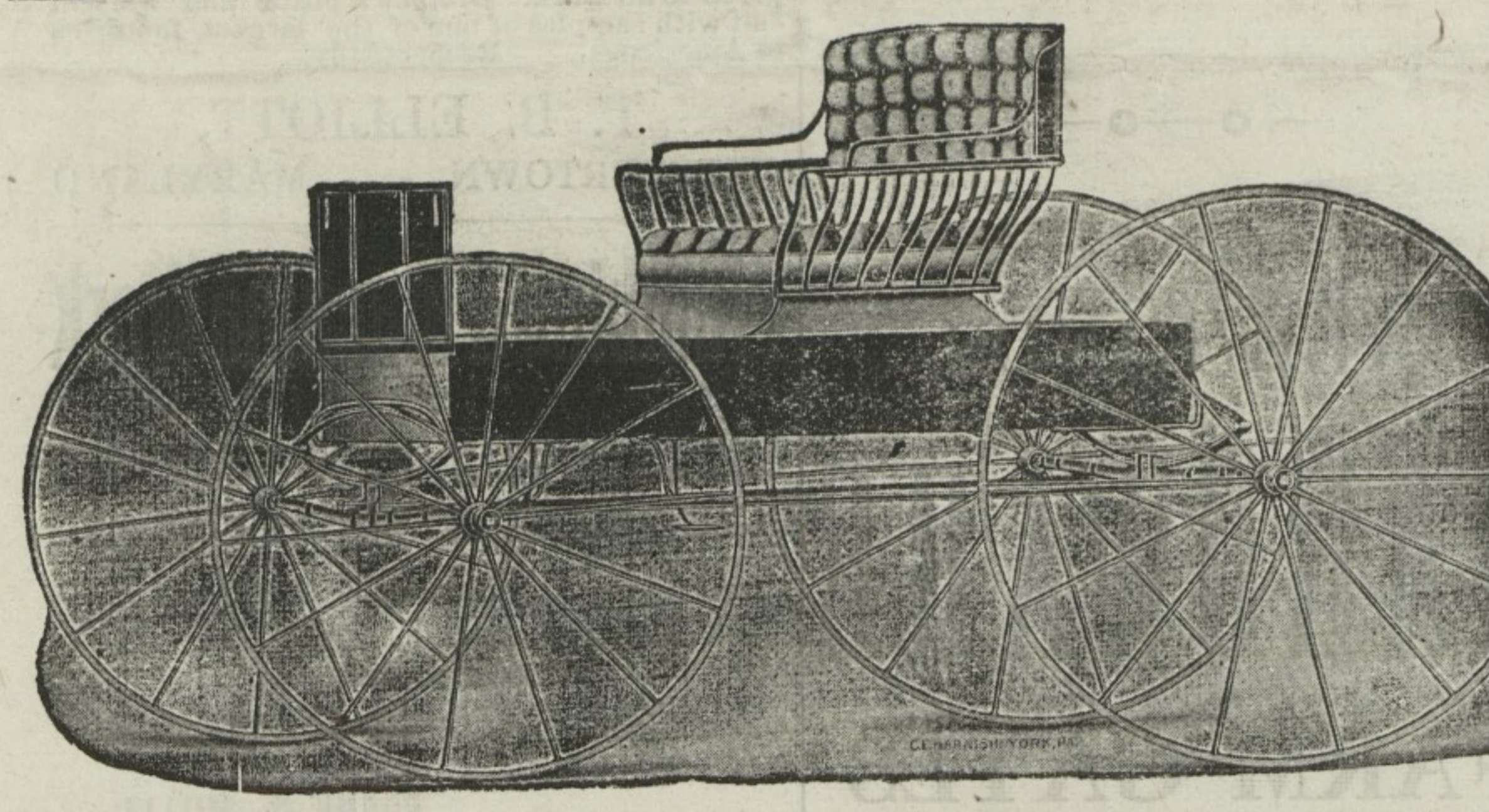

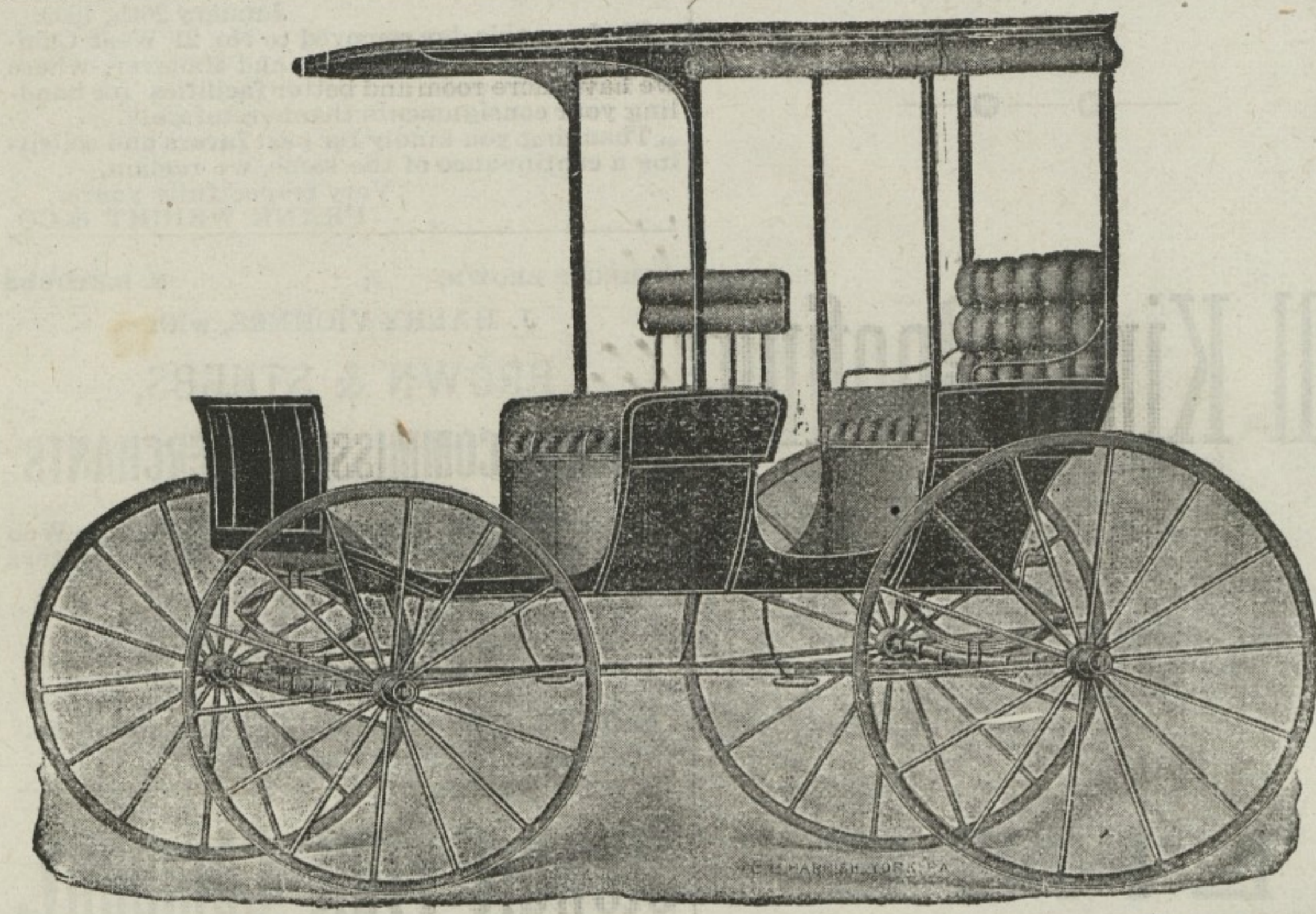

LITTLE-LOW WEDDING.

The following communication was taken from the Brooklyn Eagle, descriptive of the wedding ceremony of Rev. Francis K. Little and Miss Esther Hope Low:

A day that was practically perfection for a spring wedding was the good fortune yesterday of another Low bride, Miss Esther Hope Low. This youngest of the five daughters of Mr. and Mrs. William Gilman Low of 58 Remsen street became the wife of the Rev. Francis Little of Baltimore at 4 o'clock in the afternoon, in historic St. Ann's Church. A reception followed at the bride's home, and here the beauty of the weather came into substantial account, for the spacious house was greatly added to for entertaining by a marquee covering that in these Remsen street residences just below Hicks stretches back to Grace court.

Both reception and ceremony were large, and the charming details of this wedding, together with the social importance of the bride, made it one of the very noteworthy marriages of the year. There was a bridal party of much moment, the decorations and gowns had many attractions, and an infinite number of Brooklynites and Manhattanites of prominence assembled in St. Ann's and at the Low home.

The marquee very greatly increased the decorative effect of the house. Pink roses and American Beauties against ferns were the flowers used. Back of where the bridal couple stood receiving congratulations in the front drawing room of the Low residence was a bank of white Anunciation lilies, extending from floor to ceiling. Only the chancel of St. Ann's was decorated. Here were palms and lilies reverently and beautifully arranged.

Miss Low had her bridesmaids in pink chiffon over white satin—very dainty frocks—and her maid of honor in white chiffon over white satin. She herself was in an embroidered robe of white satin and point lace. But much more is to be said about the costumes of the bridesmaids and maid of honor. The former carried pink sweet peas, the latter white sweet peas.

All these girls in attendance on the bride in addition were very effective Marie Stuart headdresses of black velvet embroidered in pearls. These gave an unusual and an extremely effective touch to the wedding train. From these headdresses hung little short bridesmaids' veils.

The maid of honor was one of Miss Low's sisters, Miss Harriette Low, and the best man a Baltimorean, Frederick Thorp. Four of the most important Heights girls were among the bridesmaids, the fifth and six maids being Miss Frances Clark of Chestnut Hill, Philadelphia, and Miss Katherine Little of Chestertown, Md. The four Heights girls attending this bride were another of the bride's sisters, Miss Lois Low (named after her mother, Mrs. Low having been Miss Lois Curtis of Boston, Mass., before her marriage), Miss Thyra Benson, Miss Carolyn Putnam and Miss Jean White.

A brother and a cousin of the bride—Benjamin R. C. Low and A. A. Low, jr.—were two of the ushers. Their colleagues were Pere Wilmer Little, Henry Veazie, of Baltimore, Austin McLean Little of Chestertown, Md., and Wilbur Caswell.

The rector of Emmanuel Church, Baltimore, where the bridegroom is curate, and the Rev. Colin Campbell Walker, rector of St. Ann's, officiated. A striking feature of the ceremony was the presence in the organ loft of Miles Farrow, organist of the Cathedral of St. John the Divine, Manhattan. Mr. Farrow played the wedding march. His coming over to Brooklyn for the occasion was due to his being a friend of long standing of Mr. Little's.

Yesterday's bride is not the first of the daughters of Mr. and Mrs. William Low to marry into the church. Miss Rosamund Curtis Low that was, one of her sisters, married the Rev. John H. Chapman, now of the Episcopal Church at Ridgeford, Conn. Another sister is Mrs. Herbert A. Grant Watson, whose husband is an Englishman in the diplomatic service. She has two brothers, William G. Low, jr., and Benjamin R. C. Low.

Young Mrs. Little is a great-granddaughter of the original Seth Low. The late William Henry Low, brother of Abiel Abbott Low, was her grandfather. Thus the present A. A. Low and Seth Low are her cousins, or, rather, first cousins of her father, and uncle by marriage.
