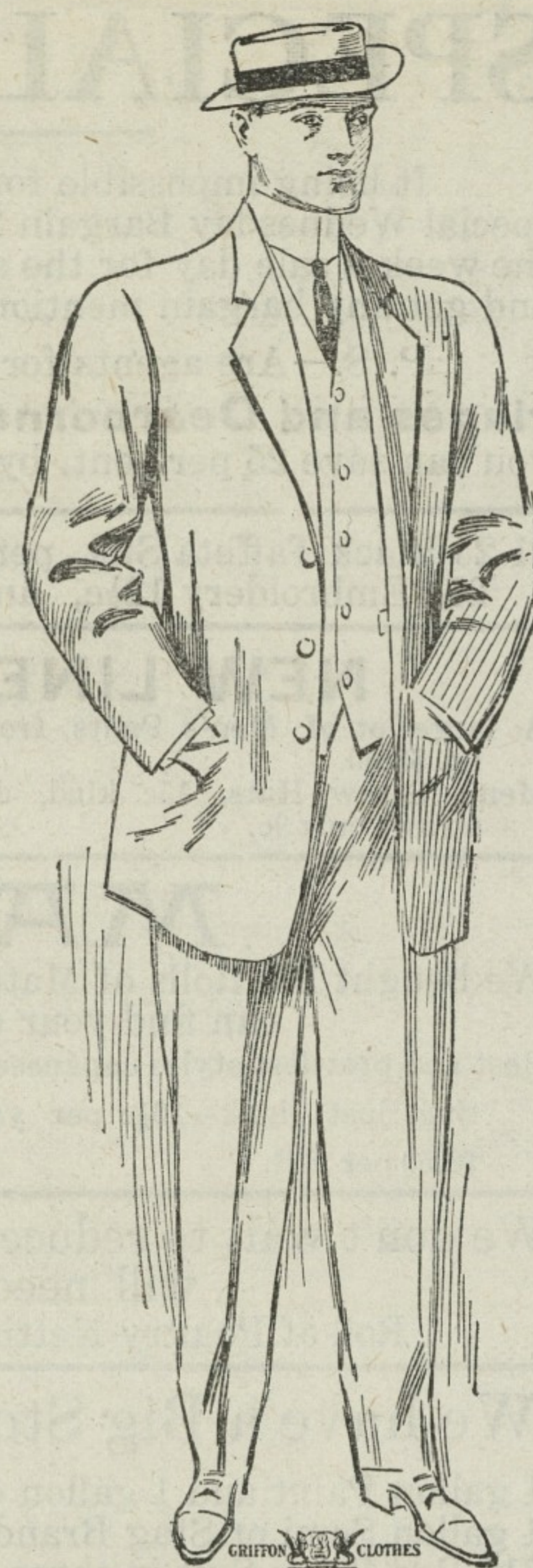

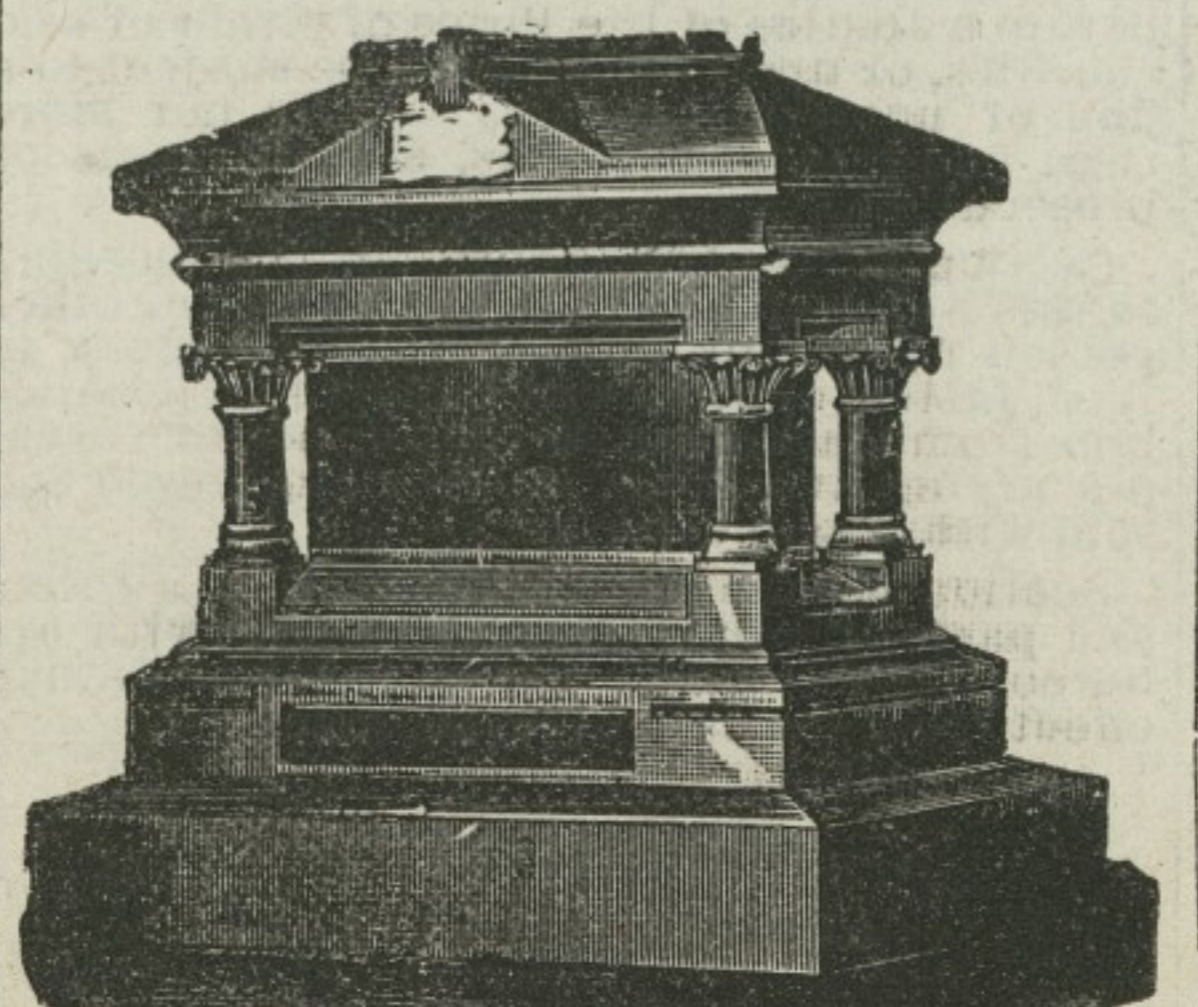

Fine Price for Farm.

The sale of the Hurlock farm situated near Kennedyville, and advertised in the TRANSCRIPT, brought a crowd of moneyed men from Kent and Queen Annes counties on Tuesday, when the farm was offered at public sale by the trustees, Messrs. Hope H. Barroll and Sydney P. Townsend. The bidding was spirited, and when it was all over, Mr. William T. 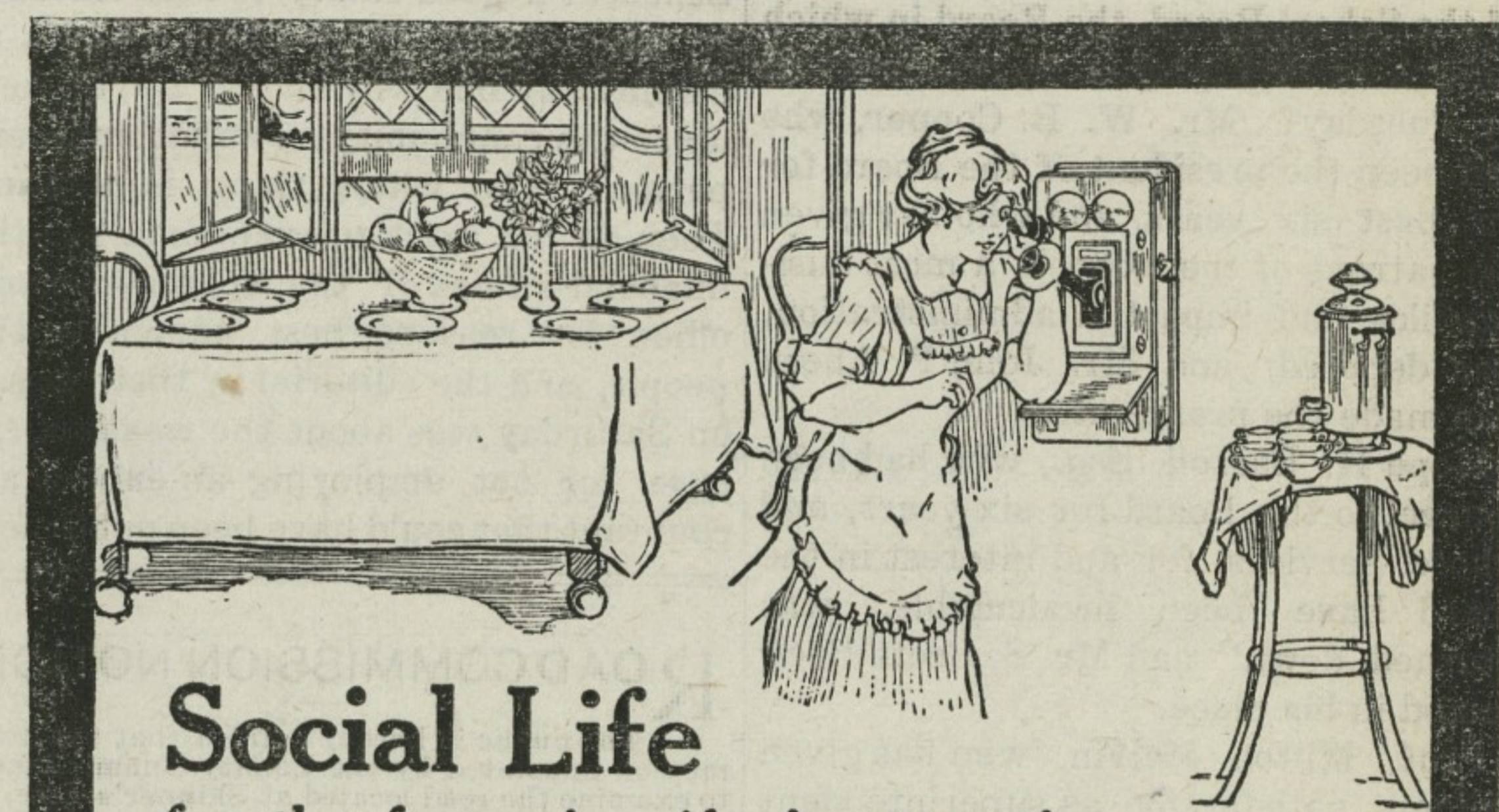
