MR. THOMAS R. EMORY.
Thomas R. Emory, a retired farmer of Queen Annes county, died suddenly at the home of his son, Howard Emory, on Fairview Farm, near Centerville, last week of heart failure, aged 73 years. He was a son of Mr. and Mrs. William Emory. His English ancestors settled in this country in the early days of the Maryland colony. He was educated in the public schools and at Dickinson College. He then engaged in agricultural pursuits and was very successful. In 1862 he married Miss Fannie Wright, of the old Wright family of that county. He is survived by five daughters (Mrs. Benjamin Beck, Mrs. Mary Hayman and Misses Elizabeth, Ruth, Nellie and Florence Emory) and by two sons (Messrs. Thomas R. Emory, Jr., and Howard Emory). He was an uncle of Mr. Edward W. Emory, of near Chestertown, this county.

MR. THOMAS H. WHALAND.
Mr. Thomas H. Whaland a native of this county, but for the past nineteen years living in Philadelphia, died on Friday, April 29, of pulmonary trouble, aged 58 years. He was a son of the late well-known Dr. Thomas Whaland, and is survived by two brothers and three sisters. He was unmarried. The remains were brought from Philadelphia on Monday morning and taken to St. Paul's, where funeral services were held in the church by the Rev. Mr. Litzinger, followed by interment in the family lot. The bearers were Messrs. George B. Westcott, Edgar Beck, J. T. DeCorse, J. E. Ferguson, George Brice and Dr. C. W. Whaland. Undertaker J. E. Ferguson had charge of the funeral arrangements.

The deceased was a descendant of one of Maryland's colonial families, and was one of the most prominent business men in Baltimore city. He was well-known here.
