One of the most artistic and up-to-date parsonages will be erected at west side of Garrison avenue, between Piedmont and Alto avenues, Baltimore for the Starr Methodist Protestant Church. It will be of stone construction, two and a half stories, 35 by 35 feet. The cost will be \$10,000. Plans were prepared by the Fidelity Construction Company and ground will be broken as soon as the bids are awarded. The parsonage will be erected on a lot 200 by 150 feet.

Rev. G. W. Haddaway, pastor of the church, said that the congregation contemplated abandoning their old church, at Poppleton street, and take up a new field at the Garrison avenue location. He also said that as soon as the parsonage was erected plans would be prepared for a new church. He has been pastor of the Starr Methodist Protestant Church for many years. The new parsonage is especially designed for reception quarters, and all of the rooms will be by private entrance.

The M. E. Sabbath School is preparing a first-class program for Children's Day which will be held the first Sabbath in June. All the teachers and scholars are requested to be in place next Sunday afternoon for musical practice.
