Mr. Sylvester has rented the Hurlock farm for next year.

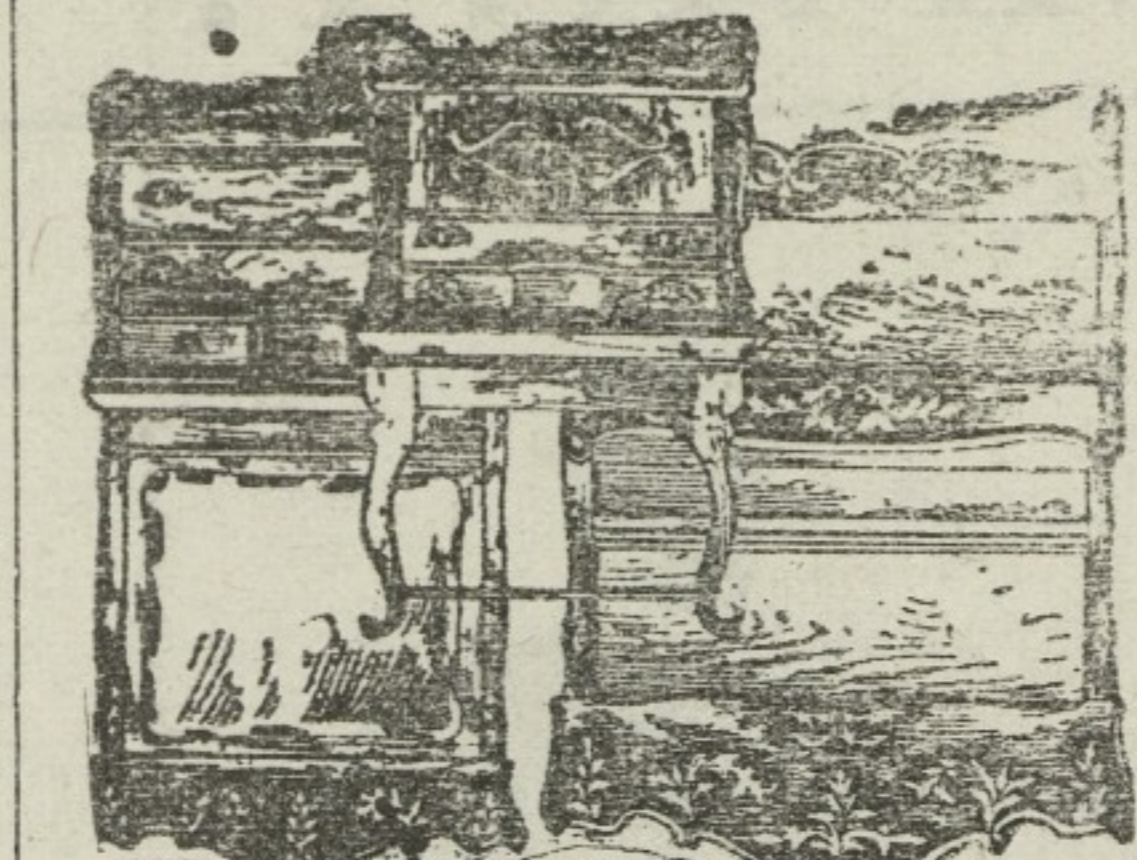
