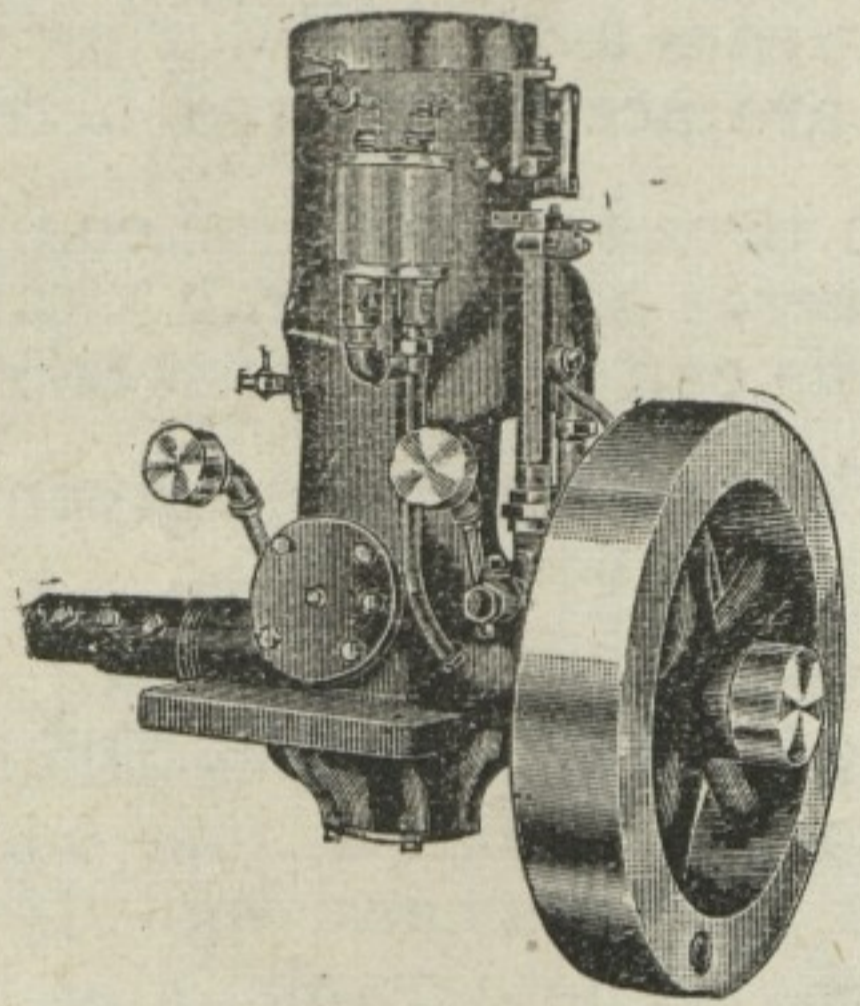

A Sad Incident.

This is the sad story of a little boy, whose name it is not necessary to mention, and whose act it is needless to magnify. A lock box in the Chestertown postoffice had been tampered with for some months, and its owner had been missing valuable packages. The postoffice officials here finally detected a little boy last week, and secured from him all the packages which he had taken from the box and they were returned to their owner. The little boy and his mother went to Baltimore Thursday morning via Tolchester where they were met by the Washington postoffice officials, and it is likely that the little fellow will be placed in some good institution where he may learn to become a useful citizen. This is a sad story, and while we do not wish to condone evil in any manner, yet the circumstances of this case are such that we hope they will be a warning to all little boys, and a solemn lesson to parents.

Almshouse Trustees.

The new board of Almshouse Trustees, Messrs. George T. Hudson, J. Hyde Thompson and Thomas J. Donohoe, qualified on Wednesday before the big dinner was eaten. They also affected a partial organization by electing Mr. Hudson president and Mr. Thompson secretary. A complete organization of the board will take place at the first meeting in July, when it is understood Mr. Ford will be re-appointed superintendent, Dr. Charles W. Wheland physician and Mr. Walter Greenwood retained as tenant. The books were turned over to the new board, and it may be interesting to state that along with the passing over of the books, bills amounting to more than \$387, including accounts which had been accumulating since last March, and which should have been paid for by the old board, were turned over to the new board for payment. The above amount includes the cost of the big dinner which the old board arranged as a farewell shot at the tax-payers of the county, and if the above amount had been paid for, as it should have been by those who made the bill, perhaps much of that \$500 which it was claimed had been saved to the county would have been wiped out. Let the tax-payers remember that even the almshouse board could not resist the temptation to saddle an unnecessary debt upon them to be paid out of the levy of 1910, and thereby add another effort to make the tax rate as high as possible.
