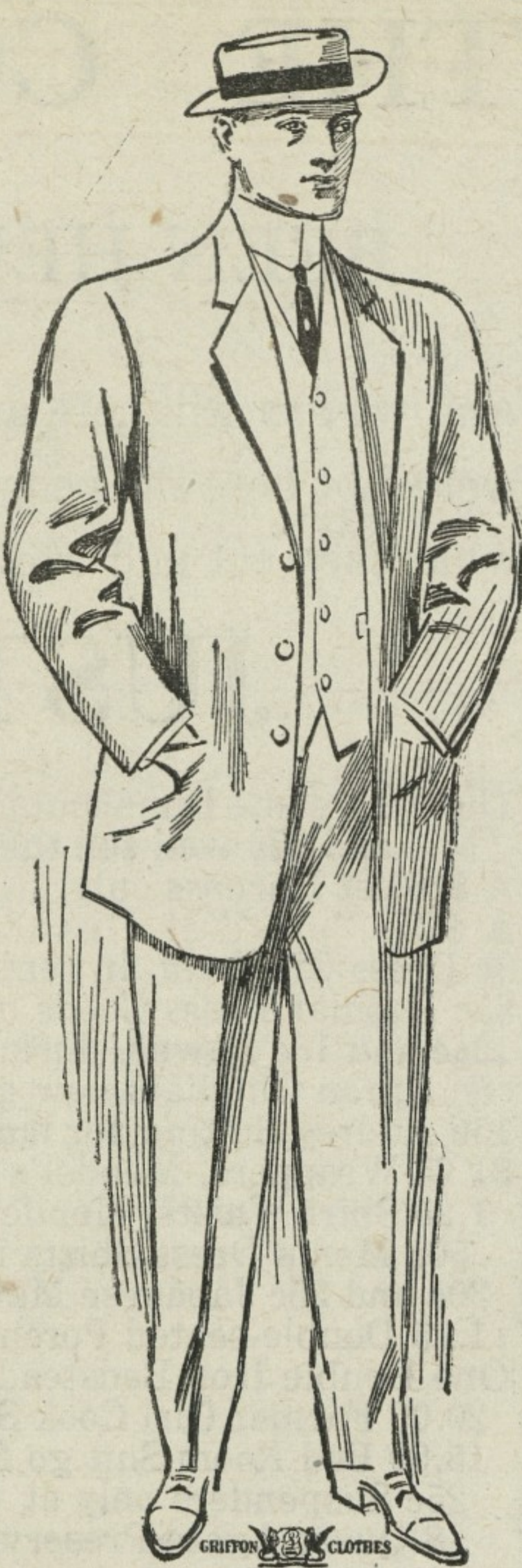

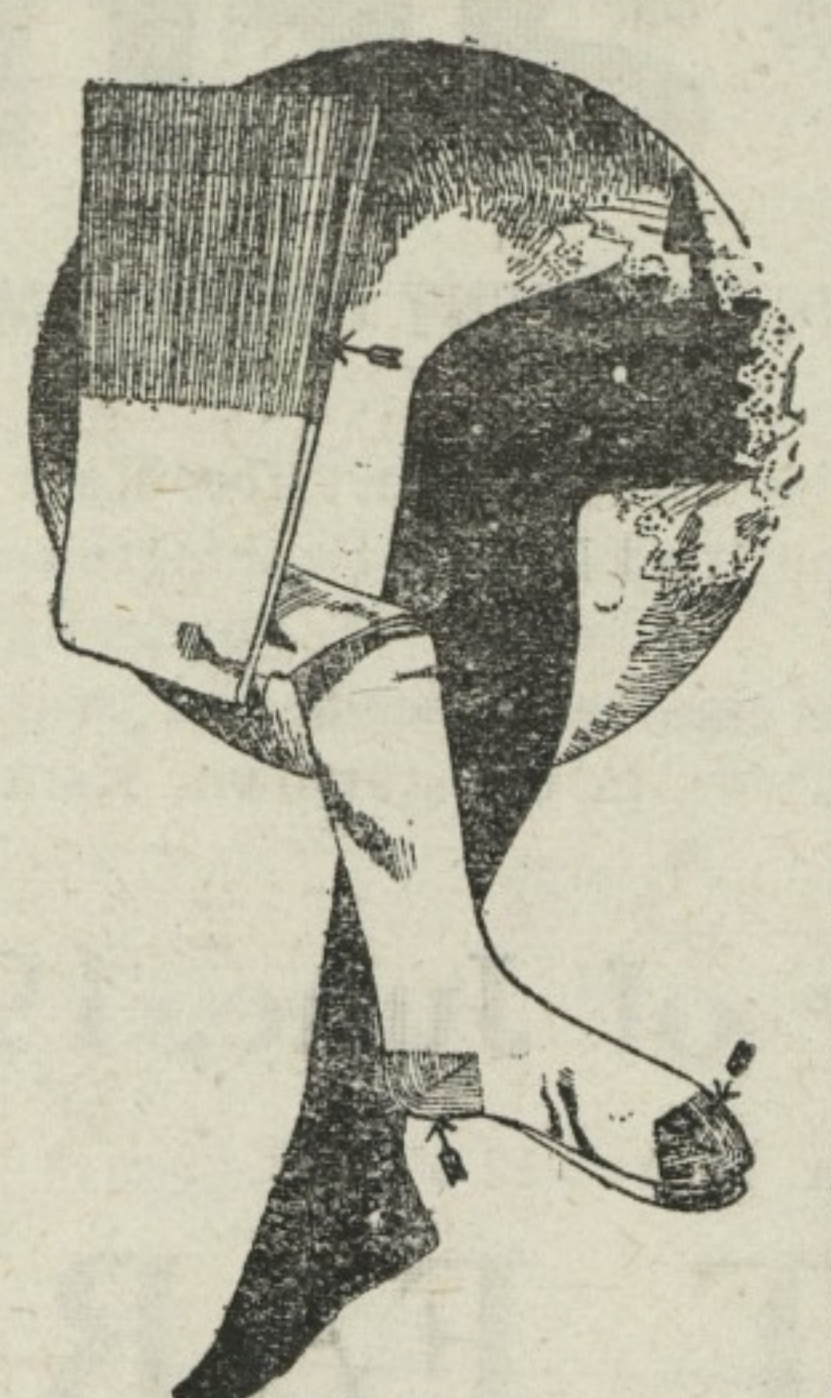

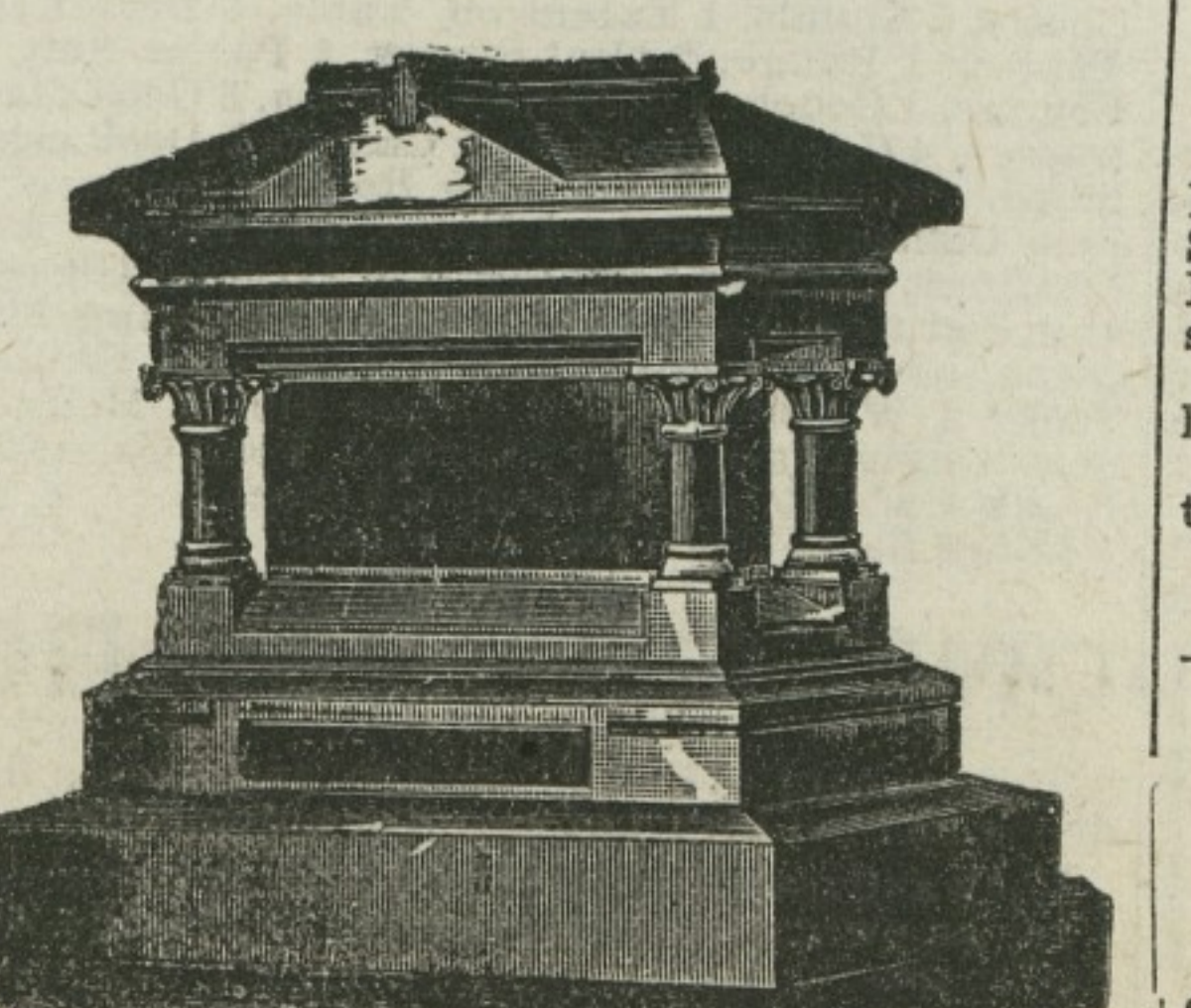

## IN CHURCH CIRCLES.

Children day services tomorrow.

Christ M. F. Church—Rev. F. T. Little, pastor. Testimony meeting at 9.30 A. M. Sacrament of the Lord's Supper at 10.30 A. M. Sunday School at 2.30 P. M. Annual Children's Day services at 7.30 P. M. Special program of music and recitations. Collection for foreign missions. You are welcome to all these services.

The First Quarterly Conference for Chestertown M. E. Church was held Monday night, with the new district superintendent, Rev. Dr. Watt, in the chair. The reports indicated progress along all lines. The pastor's salary was fixed at \$1200, an advance of \$100, and he was paid an unusual and flattering compliment, thus early in the year, of being invited to return as pastor next year. Such action is usually taken at the third or fourth conference.

Chestertown M. E. Church—Rev. L. E. Barrett, D. D., Pastor—Children's Day Services begin at 10.30 A. M. with a short sermon by the pastor—Subject: "The Boy Drawn From the Water"; 2.15 P. M. Sabbath School; 7.30 P. M., Children's Exercises in the auditorium, consisting of Choruses, Recitations, Declarations, etc. The Church will be beautifully decorated—All who have cut flowers to spare are requested to send them to the Church at 2 P. M., Saturday. Come out and enjoy the services.

Children's Day services will be held in the Methodist Churches of the town tomorrow (Sunday). Elaborate programmes of music and recitations will be rendered. The collections will be in the interest of Foreign Missions.

The Huntley Standard Bearer held a very successful and pleasant festival on Mrs. H. H. Klinefelter's lawn on Washington avenue on Friday evening last.

Mr. Thomas D. Bowers led the Christian Workers' service in Christ M. P. Church last Sunday evening. It was a meeting in the interest of Missions, and Prof. Walter R. Gale, of Baltimore, gave a most interesting talk on the organization and work of the Laymen's Missionary movement.

## Dr. Hering on Commission.

Gov. Crothers has appointed State Comptroller Joshua W. Hering a member of the Public Utilities Commission in place of Mr. Walter W. Abel resigned. He also appointed Senator William B. Claggett State Comptroller and W. Cabell Bruce, of Baltimore city, chief counsel to the Public Utilities Commission.

These appointments have occasioned considerable surprise, and much political significance is attached to them by political observers. The removal of Dr. Hering from the comptrollership and the substitution of Senator Claggett, who is the leader of the organization forces in Prince George's county, will not only give Gov. Crothers control of the Board of Public Works, which will name a State Tax Commissioner shortly, but it will give the Governor control of the Prince George's Democracy through the influence of Senator Claggett. Dr. Hering, as a member of the Board of Public Works, was pledged to Col. Buchanan Schley for re-election as State Tax Commissioner. Senator Claggett's appointment of comptroller makes doubtful Col. Schley's re-election, as he can now count on only one member of the Board of Public Work, Hon. Murray Vandiver. It looks very much like Gov. Crothers is using his power of appointment for futures, whether it be for Governor or for a seat in the United States Senate, remains to be seen. Certain it is, however, that he is playing the game to the limit, and he is not done yet.

## More Commissions.

With the view of developing the agricultural interests of the State, Governor Crothers announced Tuesday night a commission of well-known farmers and landowners to study the question and adopt plans for increasing the productivity of the soil of Maryland. In addition to honoring Maryland the commission will adopt plans for teaching scientific methods of farming throughout the State.

The teachers of the Maryland Agricultural College will assist in the work, as will national experts. A series of public meetings will be held throughout the State, and later experiment stations, where scientific farming will be engaged in, will be established. The railroad and steamboat companies have promised to co-operate in the movement by furnishing transportation facilities and reduced rates. The commission will meet in Baltimore within the next few weeks and organize.

The members of this commission from Kent are former Senator Garrett Foxwell and Mr. Alday Clements. From Queen Anne are W. Irving Walker and William T. Mckenney.
