A FINE MATINEE.

Worton Driving Club Provides an Afternoon of Excellent Sport on Decoration Day on Old Worton Race Track.

The one hundred and more lovers of horse racing who attended the initial matinee of the Worton Driving Club on old Worton race track on Decoration Day afternoon, were not only reminded of the good old days of the past, and the fleet footed trotters whose names have passed into history, but they were treated to some excellent racing by the flower of Kent's racing stock. Horsemen and horses were present from all parts of the county, and the three classes reeled off brought together a number of horses whose speed was so evenly matched as to furnish excellent racing in each event. The members of the association had gotten the track in excellent shape, and while it is not the desired length as yet, this defect will be remedied as soon as possession can be gotten of the remainder of the ground, when the old race track will be duplicated and made as fine as of old. A judges' stand has been erected, and it is the intention of the club to have matinee races at different periods during the year, in order to provide the means for development of the best qualities to be found in the large number of good horses in the county. This is a most commendable effort of the driving club, and it should be encouraged by horse owners and stock breeders. The quality of the stock, both as to speed and breeding, displayed by the horses which were entered in each class on Monday would do credit to any county in the State, and there are not many counties which can produce a roadster like Frank Miller's May or Chas. Tolson's Jessie, which can show speed in a first race in .38 and better.

From Lady Thompson, the fleet footed pacing colt, owned by Capt. W. C. A. Thompson, and driven by Joseph Kennard, to Marvel, owned by Harry Legg, the entire list is an excellent one, and these horses will make a fine race whenever pitted against one another. The TRANSCRIPT would suggest that the club arrange a matinee on the track for sometime in July, and open the classes to Kent and Queen Annes horses. This would bring the Rock Hall flyers to the track as well as those over in the State, and we shall undoubtedly see some fine sport. The summary of the races on Monday is as follows:
