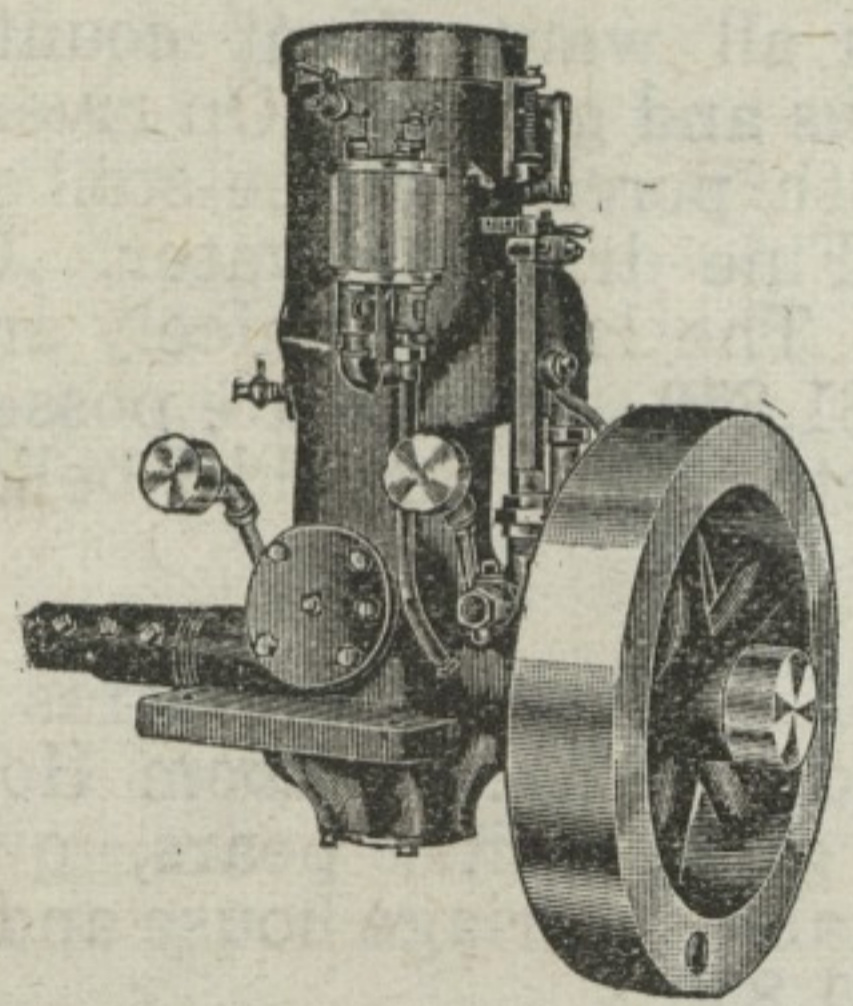

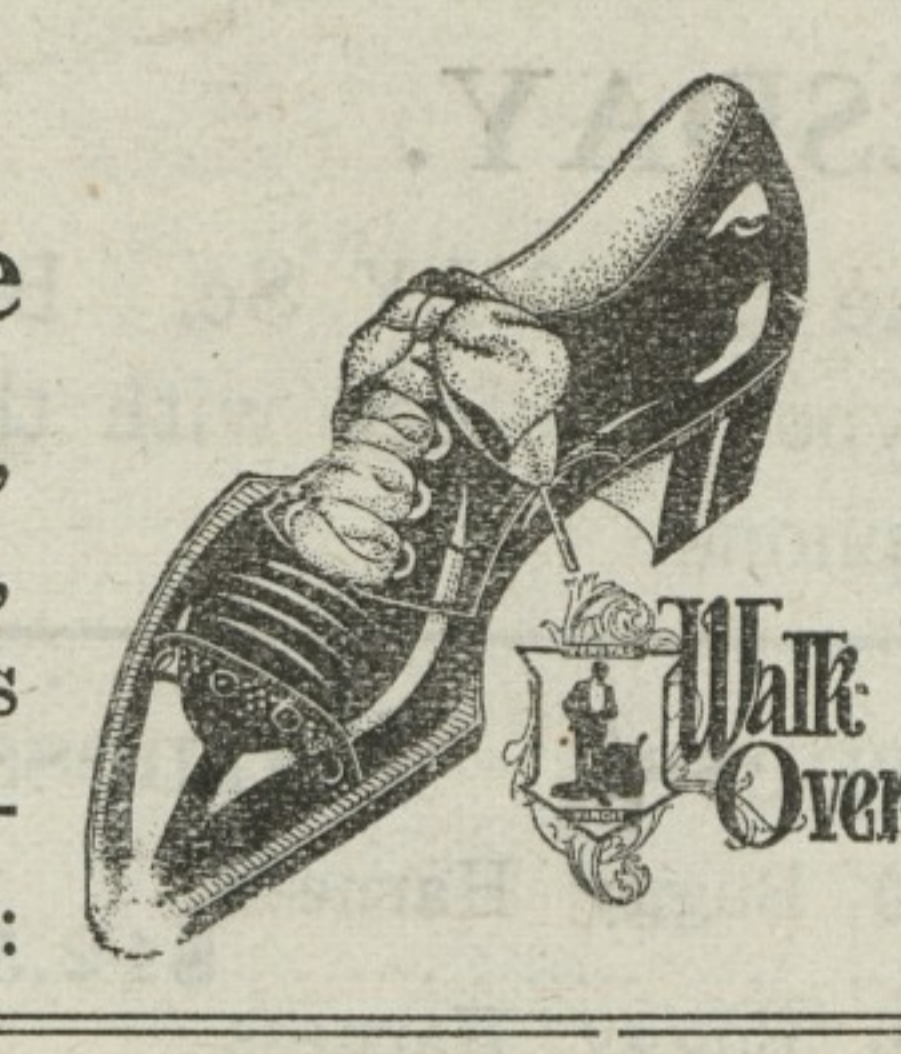

Wheat Yields.

The past week has produced some remarkably fine yields of wheat, all of which is in excellent shape. Mr. Linwood Sutton, one of our best young farmers, on the Parks farm, near town, got the following splendid yields:

26 1/2 bushels per acre on fallow, 35 2-7 on tomato patch and 30 1/2 on corn ground—an average yield all over of about 31 bushels per acre.

George W. Rash, another of our best young farmers, got 38 bushels per acre from 38 acres of corn ground and 20 bushels per acre on fallow, an average of 29 bushels per acre all over.

William T. Nicholson on Fancy farm, holds the record in the county for the largest yield on any one field. On a 13-acre corn ground field he got 40 bushels per acre. His average yield all over was 29 bushels, having gotten 23 on fallow and 29 on a second corn ground.

Since writing the above we have learned that Mr. Benjamin F. Rash, of near town, holds the record for the best yield. He beats Wm. T. Nicholson 5 lbs. to the acre. Mr. Rash's yield on his best piece being 40 bu. and 5 lbs. per acre. He got 19 1/2 bushels from 63 acres, an average of nearly 31 bushels per acre and sold his crop this week for \$1.00 per bushel.

Mr. Walter Kendall on the Wroth farm near Worton got an average yield of 29 bushels from a tillage of 113 acres.

Mr. Frank Leaverton on the Wroth-Jump farm near Fairlee, got an average yield of 23 1/2 bus. on 72 acres.

Mr. Frank Leaverton on the Wroth-Jump farm seeded 38 lbs. of the Miracle wheat on 2 of an acre and got a yield of 22 bushels, weighing 65 lbs. to the bushel. Mr. Leaverton will use this for seed wheat.
