A NEW INVENTION.

The Great American Pneumatic Water System.

Messrs. Brockson and Merritt, two well-known gentlemen of Warwick, Cecil county, have been exhibiting and demonstrating the actual working of their new machine for pumping water by compressed air, called the "Great American Pneumatic Water System." As shown by them in their test the method of its operation is as follows: A four and a half H. P. Olds gasoline engine runs a small compressor which fills a steel tank of 800 gallons capacity to a pressure of 100 pounds to the square inch, which stored air power will pump 1200 gallons of water a distance of 30 feet. The pumping is effected by an ingenious machine with two cylinders connected with the tank by piping and submerged in the well or any body of water, into which cylinders the compressed air, by means of an automatic valve, alternately forces the water in such a way as to give a continuous stream. The force of the stream is regulated by a pressure reducer placed between two water gauges attached to the intake pipe, in such a way as to give a gentle flow at the spigot such as would be used for housekeeping purposes, or the full head which would be used to throw a strong stream in case of fire.

In their demonstration Messrs. Brockson and Merritt used a zinc cylinder can something less in circumference than the ordinary well, in which they set their machine.

The advantages claimed for the system are, 1st. It stores air instead of water, and so the water does not get warm or stagnant in summer nor freeze in winter, nor become so cold as to injure stock, nor rust out the tank; 2d. It has a much greater capacity than any water storage system. 3d. It is cheaper than any other system of equal size and far more durable having practically no parts to get out of order, and will last indefinitely, whereas windmills and standpipes wear out and are in constant need of attention and repair.

The system can pump a tank of any size with air at a pressure of 75 pounds to the square inch that will force more water out of a well than a tank of the same size 175 feet high would hold, and this tank with its 75-pound pressure will have a hose pressure available for fire purposes equal to that given by a standpipe 175 feet high.

Farmers having, as many do, gasoline engines could utilize them to store the tank with compressed air. It takes about an hour to fill a 200-gallon tank with compressed air at a pressure of 100 pounds to the square inch, which will deliver 1200 gallons of water. The steel tank will last indefinitely if kept painted on the outside, since no water enters it to rust or destroy it.

Mr. Andrew W. Woodall, of Georgetown, has equipped his large residence with this system and it supplies four toilets, three baths, all the kitchen and stable faucets, etc., and only uses about 800 gallons of water daily. It is giving perfect satisfaction to Mr. Woodall.

Mr. Brockson has invented other things besides this one. A corn harvester and a horseshoe nail extractor have been patented by him. Farmers and others should examine his system. Mr. Brockson claims he could supply Middletown with water from Silver Lake or wells sunk, far more cheaply and with greater fire pressure than the present system is affording.

Signs Warn All Off Railroad Tracks.

In an effort to reduce the number of accidents to persons walking upon and crossing its tracks, the P., B. & W. Railroad Company has placed signs at a number of stations in various parts of the State, giving warning in graphic language. The signs read:

"WARNING."
"Do Not Walk on Railroad Tracks. You Invite Death When You Walk on the Railroad."

"Many persons walk on or across the railroad tracks in a thoughtless manner, giving little heed to the danger they incur of sudden death or serious injury. Walking on the railroad is dangerous at all times."

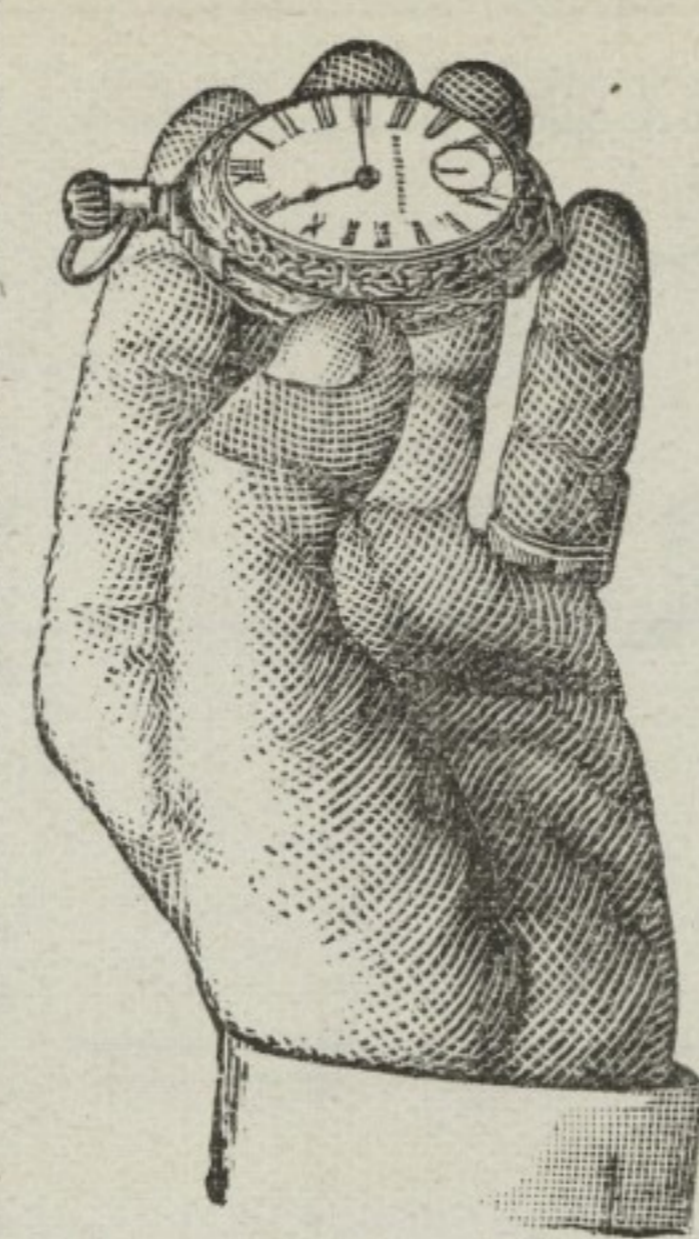
"In emergencies trains are run in reverse directions on double-track railroads. On stepping from one track to avoid a train, there is great risk of stepping in front of a train on the other track."

"Railroads are not public highways. Bear in mind that railroads are not public highways and should not be used as such; it is unlawful, and cannot be done without serious risk."

Highest Price for Delaware Horse.

Middletown has always been noted for its fine horses, and William B. Biggs, one of its foremost horsemen, has won many races in the State and out of it with his Delaware horseflesh, and so have others here. But a sale made last week by him of his dark sorrel gelding R. T. C. was an especially notable event in horse circles.

Mr. Biggs had his attention accidentally called to a very ordinary appearing farm horse about a year ago, and bought it at the owner's figure, \$400. After a year's training and handling, and a few contests, on professional as well as on exhibition tracks, he was purchased of Mr. Biggs by Mr. Sneliker, a trainer on Dr. J. C. McCoy's track at Mt. Pleasant, for a gentlemen in Columbus, O. The price paid is said to have considerably passed the \$5,000 mark, an amount which represents the highest sum ever brought by any Delaware-bred horse.

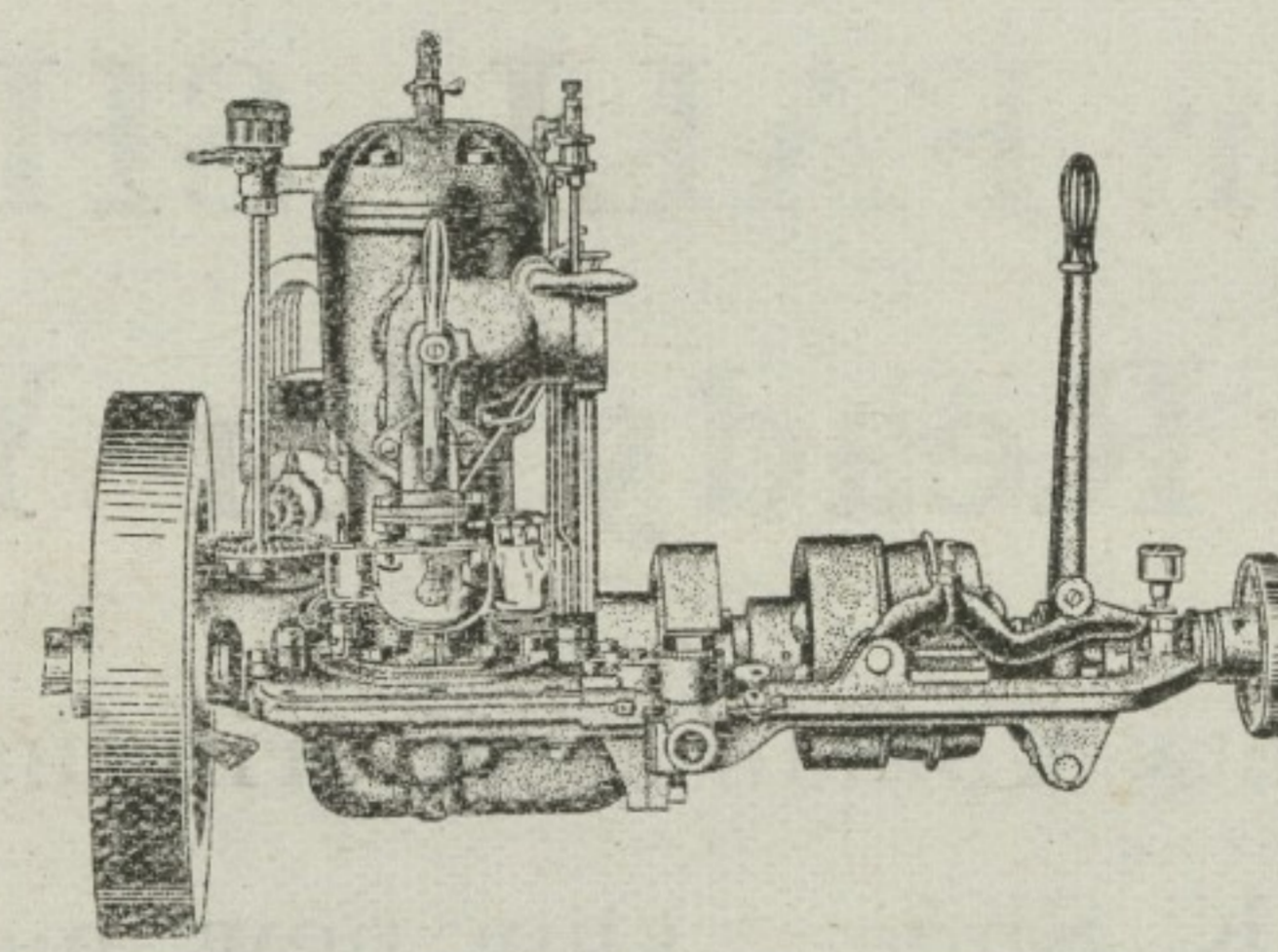

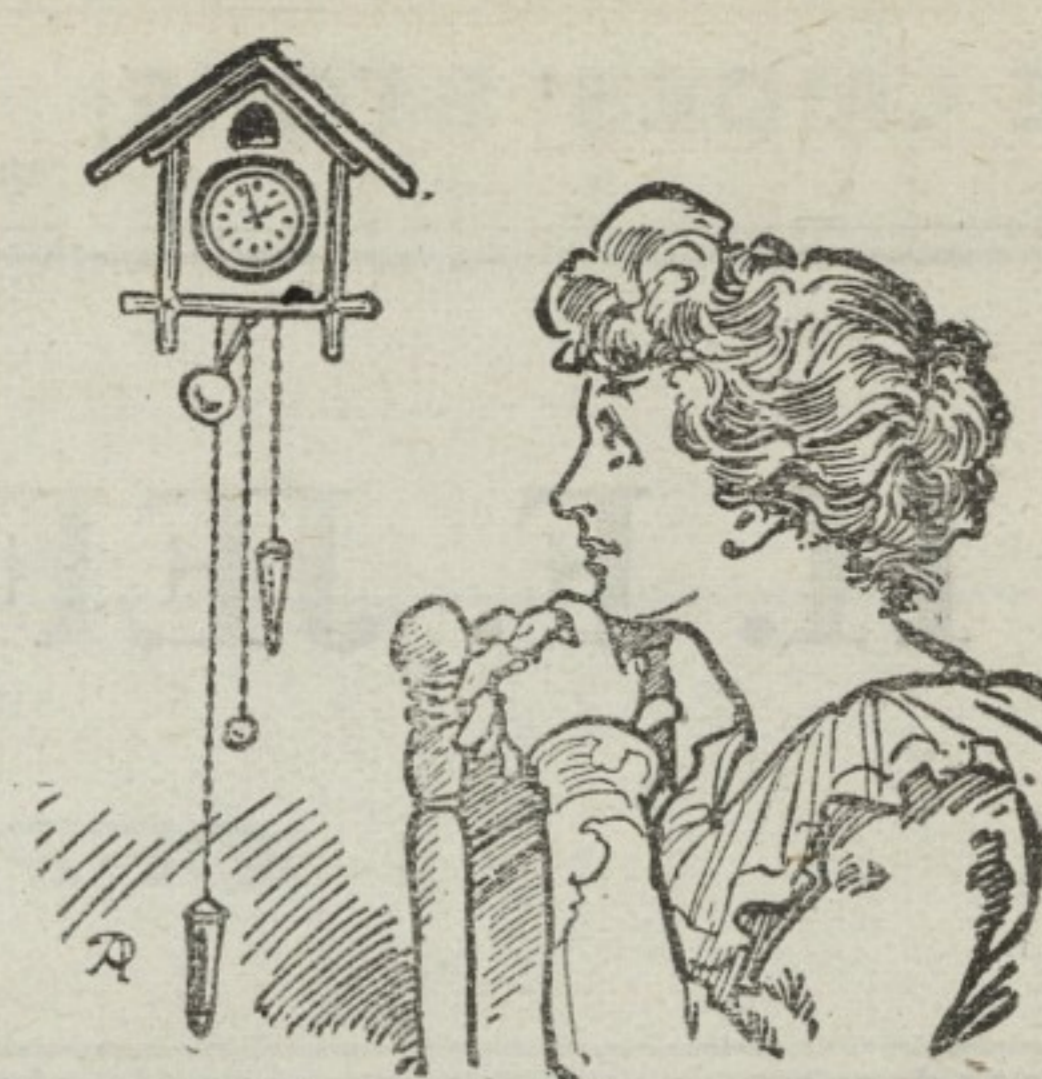

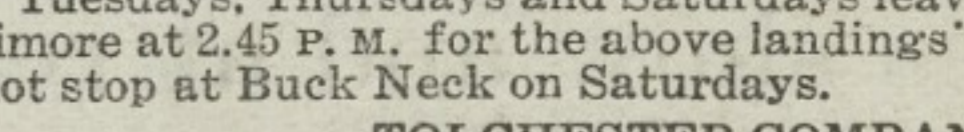
