NATIONAL & STATE BANKS

OUR DEATH RECORD.

MRS. MARY FRANCES HEPBRON.
Mrs. Mary Frances Hepbron, wife of ex-Senator William T. Hepbron, died at her home near Turner's Creek, on Monday, after a long illness of a complication of diseases, aged 76 years. The deceased was before marriage a Miss Webb, daughter of the late Joseph Webb, near Turner's Creek, and for years she and her aged husband had lived happily and devotedly on their estate near Kennedyville enjoying the confidence and esteem of all who knew her. The deceased leaves besides her aged husband, three daughters—Mrs. Jefferson Usilton, Mrs. Charles L. Gill, of Chestertown and Mrs. Robert R. Hill, of near Locust Grove. Funeral services were held from her late residence on Wednesday afternoon, at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. F. X. Moore. The pall-bearers were: Rev. S. S. Hepburn, E. W. Hepburn, William Hepburn, C. B. Krusen, James S. Harris and Wm. T. Hague. Undertaker Wm. H. Krusen had charge of the funeral arrangements.

MRS. BYRON BONCHELLE.
Mrs. Byron Bonchelle, a well-known and highly esteemed lady of Chesapeake City, died Sunday at her home from injuries received from a fall in her room on Friday night. She is survived by her husband, who is a prominent merchant in that town. The deceased was a sister of Mr. J. E. Ferguson, of this town. Funeral services were held on Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock from her late residence, conducted by Rev. William Schuler, of Elkton. Interment in Bethel cemetery at Summit Bridge. The pall-bearers were her three brothers, Messrs. Noble and Robert Ferguson, Cecil, J. E. Ferguson, of Chestertown, and her five brothers-in-law, Messrs. Robert Murray, of Philadelphia, George Beaton, Harry Budd, Thomas Pierce and William Howard, of Cecil.

MRS. EMILIE DESHANE BLOXTON.
Mrs. Emilie Deshane Bloxton, widow of the late Rev. Floyd E. Bloxton and daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William H. Deshane, of Earleville, died suddenly January 18th, of heart trouble, at her home, 2338 N. Calvert street, Baltimore. Deceased was a consistent christian, beloved by all who knew her, and her friends, of whom she had a large circle, feel a sense of personal loss in her death. Besides her parents, she is survived by two daughters, Misses Pauline and Frances Bloxton, and two sisters, Mrs. Harry Price and Miss Julia Deshane.

MR. ISAAC N. MILLS.
Mr. Isaac N. Mills, for many years Superintendent of the Delaware Railroad, died at 10 o'clock on Sunday night at his home in Clayton. He was 77 years old, and at the time of his death was a retired special agent for the Delaware Railroad. Mr. Mills was well-known and highly esteemed by railroad officials and employees.

A Great Revival.

A gracious revival has been in progress at Christ M. P. Church during the past two weeks under the leadership of the pastor, Rev. Dr. W. R. Graham and the noted evangelist, Rev. Lewis Shelhorn, of New Jersey. Last Sunday afternoon one of the most inspiring sights ever witnessed in this town occurred at the Sunday school service when more than 50 of the scholars were converted and signified their intention to unite with the church at the morning service to-morrow. Rev. Mr. Shelhorn has labored faithfully and earnestly and his efforts have caused an awakening here. He leaves to-day for Milford, Del., to engage in the same work, and he will carry with him the love and esteem of all those who have learned to know him and love him during his stay here.

Mr. Harry Rust has rented a large part of the Morgan Creek marsh and will go into the muskrat trapping business on a large scale. He has had a small house built on wheels and will live in it during the season. Mr. Herbert White will assist him. There is big money in muskrats this season. The meat sells readily for 15 cents, while the hides sell for from 40 to 60 cents each according to quality.
