MARRIAGE BELLS.

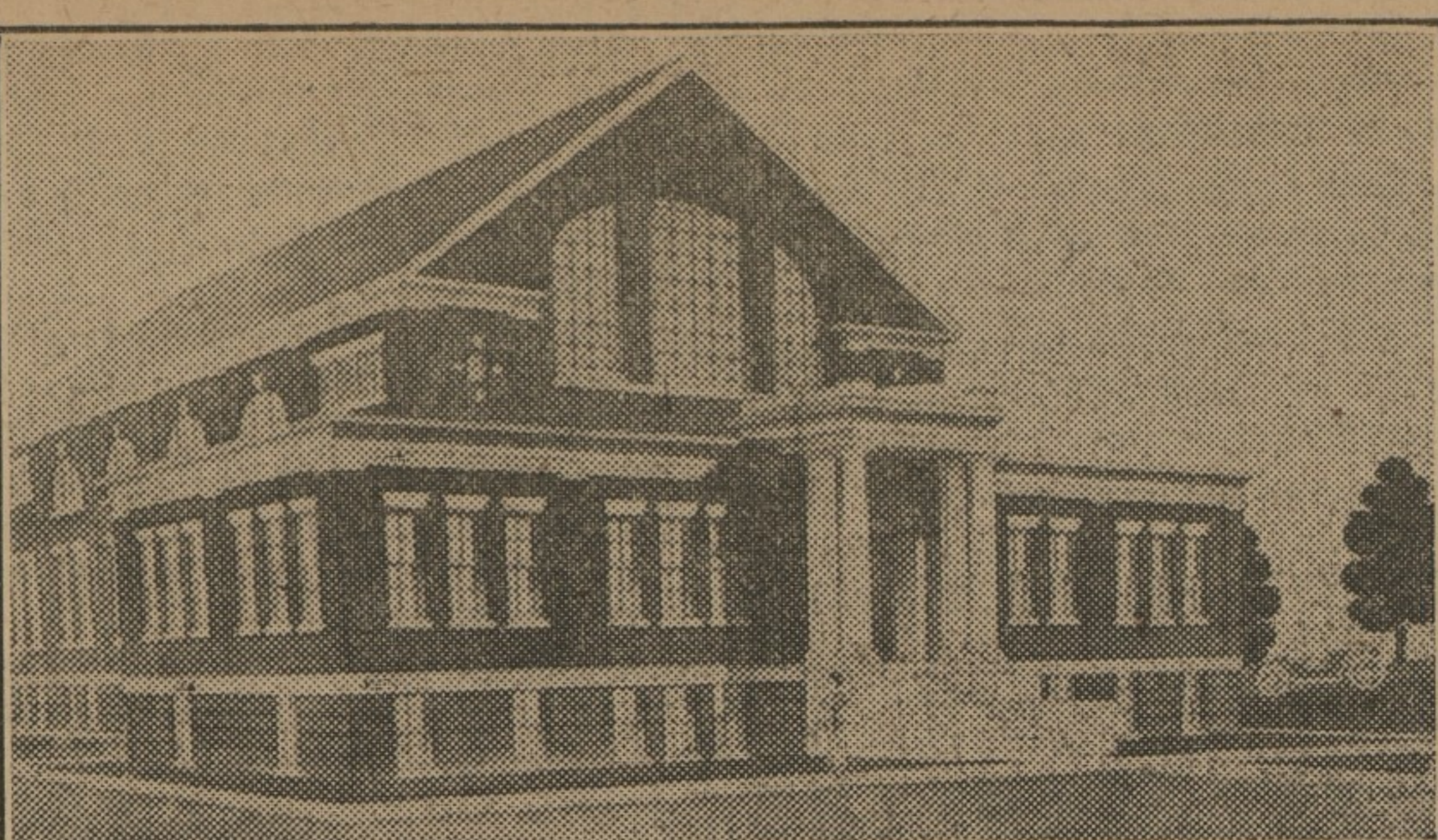
