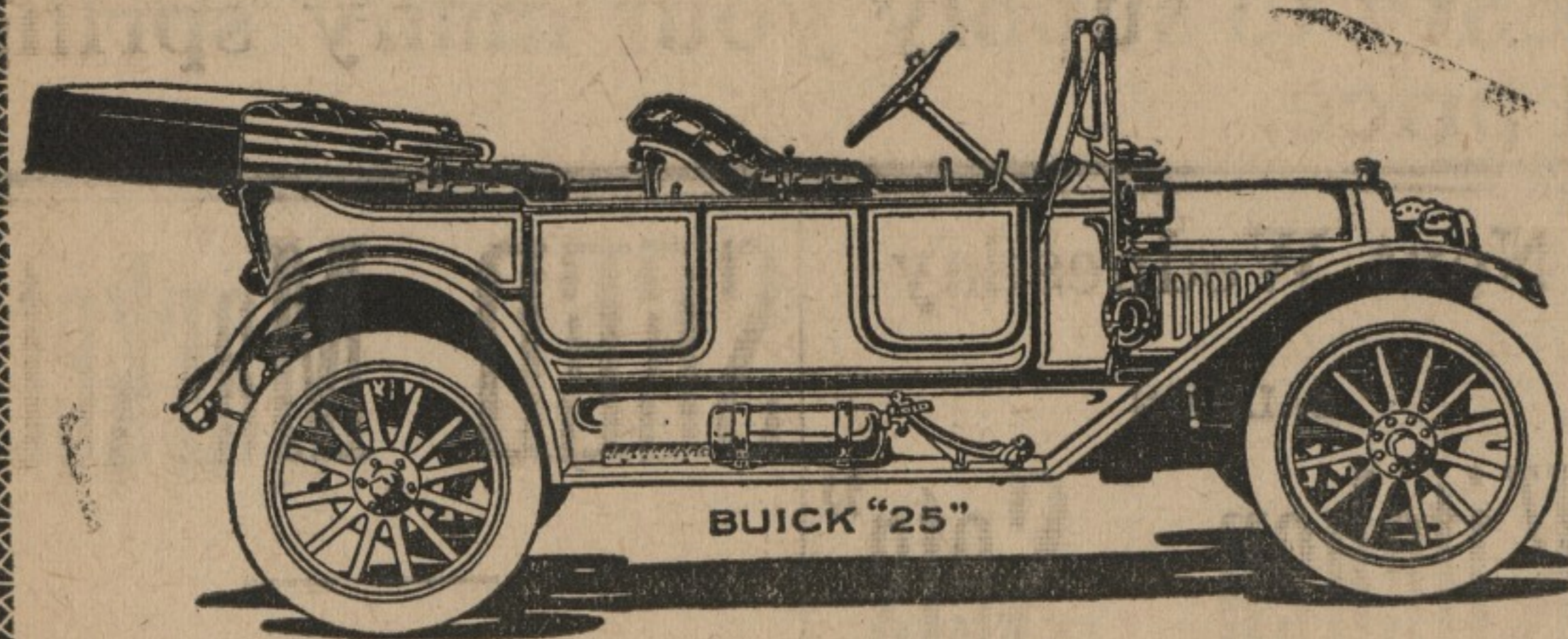

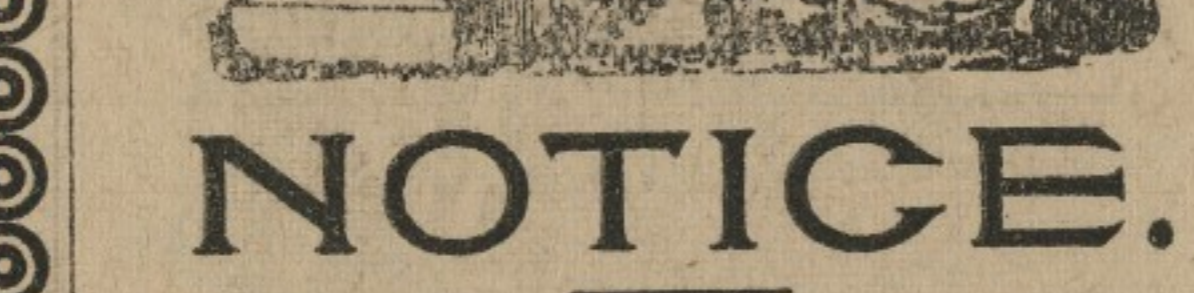

DELAWARE HORSEMEN ACTIVE.

Fine Lot of Breeding and Racing Stock at Millsboro Farm.

Determined to improve the breed of trotting horses in lower Delaware, several Millsboro and Georgetown horsemen secured a lot of selected stock at the recent sale at Madison Square Garden, New York.

The horses are being kept at Millsboro, where they will be bred. Several will be raced on the Delaware tracks this summer. Sixteen of the horses purchased are of pedigreed stock, and include some well-known track horses. 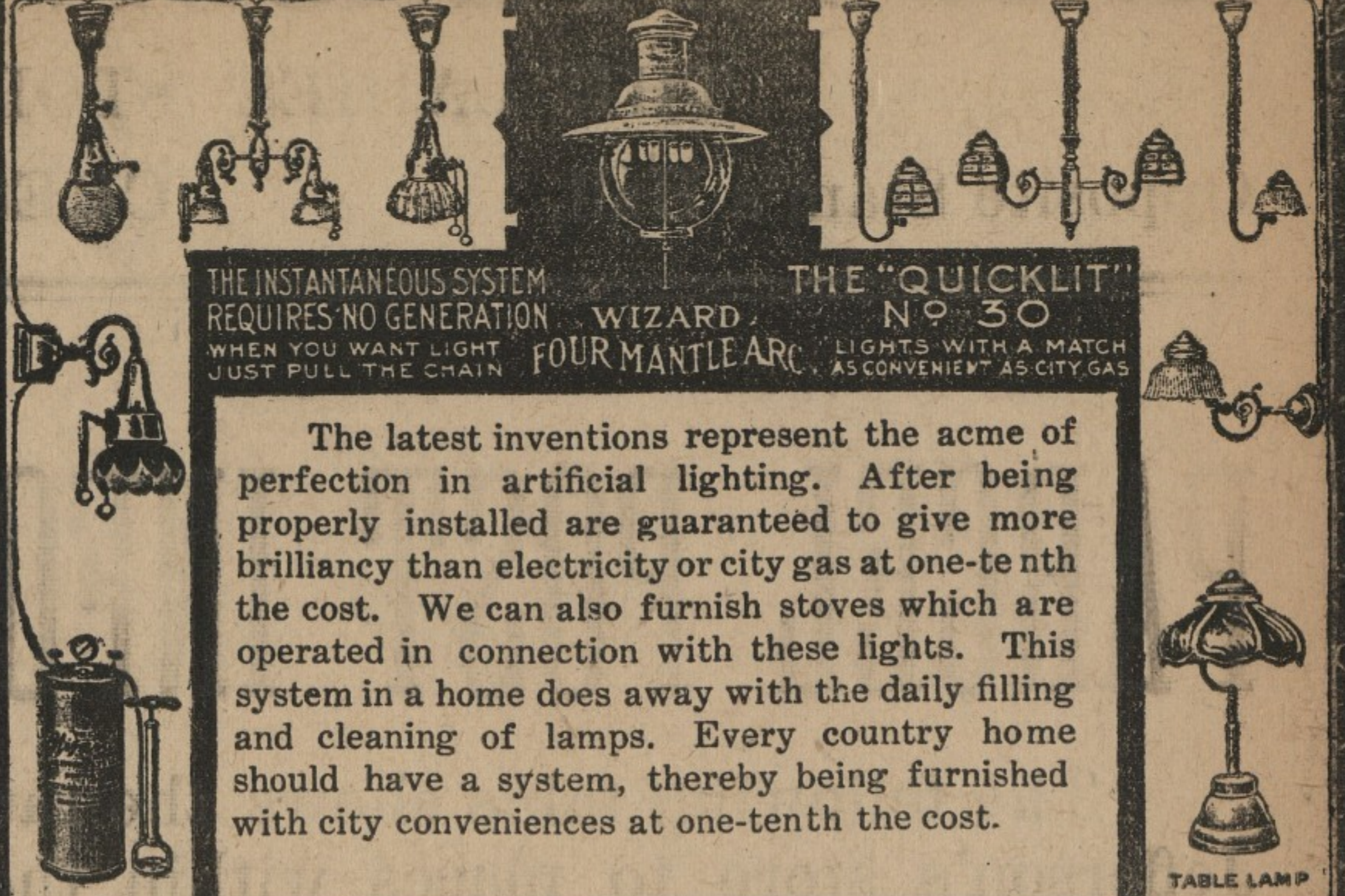

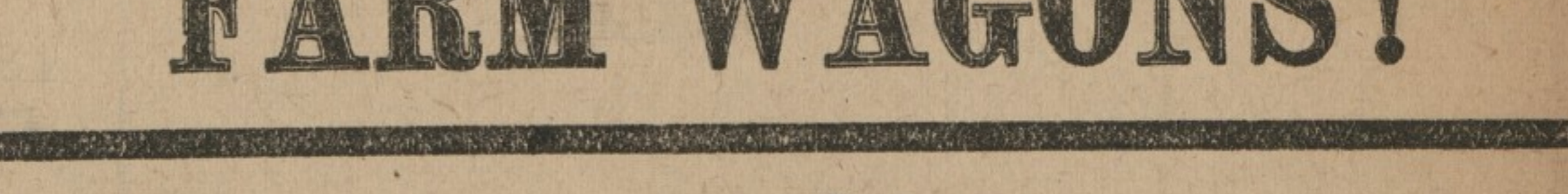
