PREACHERS RAP SMITH.

Baltimore Methodist Episcopal Conference Denounces Smith's Appointment of Schenewolf in Scathing Resolution.

In the hottest fight of the Baltimore Methodist Conference in Baltimore that body on Monday morning passed a set of resolutions denouncing Senator Smith for the appointment of Henry Schenewolf, of the Baltimore "Red Light" district a door-keeper in the United States Senate. The attack upon Senator Smith was led by Rev. Don S. Colt who said:

"It is not a time for words, but for battle. We have fought them with resolutions and rose water long enough. The time has come to measure swords with this element which tends to shame our city. If Senator Smith is penitent let him prove it by removing this man. This is not a fight against persons, but for morals. Pass the resolutions and show Senator Smith that if he does not revoke his action we will fight him at the polls and fight on until we shall have a pure government by pure men."

The resolution as passed stated: "We regard his appointment as an outrage to the decent citizenship of Maryland and in the Senate, and we do hereby record our denunciation of this appointment, which upon the request of our committee our senior Senator from Maryland has refused to revoke."

Senator Smith apologized for the appointment but refused to revoke it. SENDS LETTER TO PRESIDENT.

Dr. Howard A. Kelley, leader in the anti-vice crusade, sent a letter Monday to President Wilson protesting against the appointment of Schenewolf. He also wrote Senator Smith and to each of the Democratic United States Senators sent another letter of protest. The letter to the President is as follows:

"Dear President Wilson: I am sending you two Baltimore papers referring to the appointment of a man named Schenewolf as doorkeeper to the Senate at the request of Senator John Walter Smith. We feel that Schenewolf very adequately represents Senator John Walter Smith and his type of politics, but we do feel profoundly disgraced that a discredited saloonkeeper, a breaker of the law and an ex-resident of the red-light district of Baltimore should in any way represent the Democracy of the State of Maryland. No greater harm could be done the Democratic party of this State and city, of which I am a member, than the admission to the dictation of a politician named Kelley in this city in appointing a man of such a degraded character."

"I have written to all the Democratic Senators and some of the Republicans to protest, and I trust this position is not too small to attract your interested notice. The round of advertising this matter has already had in our Baltimore papers will serve to identify the Democratic party with such men as its leaders unless the Senate purges itself of this disgrace."

MARBURY IN EASTON.

The Progressive Candidate for the Long Term Senatorship is Given a Splendid Reception and Wins Many Supporters in Talbot

The Easton Gazette, published on Wednesday, April 2, in commenting upon Hon. Wm. L. Marbury's visit to Easton Tuesday says:

William L. Marbury, President Woodrow Wilson's candidate for Senator on the Democratic ticket in Maryland, stirred things up in Talbot camp yesterday and last night. He came down to Claiborne Monday afternoon on a boat, bringing his touring car with him. At Claiborne he slipped into the car and made a clean sweep from Claiborne to Easton, stopping to confer with leaders and shake hands with voters at Claiborne, McDaniel, St. Michaels and Royal Oak.

He arrived in Easton about 8.30, went to the Hotel Norris, and in his rooms there held an informal reception, which partook of the nature of a campaign caucus for Talbot county. It is not exactly possible to know the sentiment of those who were present at the reception, as Congressman J. Harry Covington, W. Mason Shehan and Clerk of Court Francis C. Wrightson paid their respects to the visitor with others who are known to be straight out for Marbury.

Among those who took a great interest in the meeting here, and who it is believed will support Marbury against Smith, are Messrs. A. G. Pascual, J. Frank Turner, C. Howard Lloyd, M. B. Nichols, Henry A. Nichols, E. B. Hardcastle, M. Tighman Johnston, N. E. Clark, James C. Godwin, Harry Roberts, Claude E. Lee, Preston B. Spring, Col. F. Carroll Goldsborough, Colonel Oswald Tighman, John S. McDaniel, and Judge L. H. Chaffinch.

Yesterday morning Marbury attended the Nichols sale at Galloway farm, and he was the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Henry A. Nichols at lunch there. A meeting was held at the Hotel Norris in the morning yesterday. Mr. Marbury was introduced to many voters by Mr. G. Pascual and Mr. M. B. Nichols, among Marbury men.

The meeting last night was largely attended, Col. C. Howard Lloyd presiding. Marbury's speech was not long, but it was carefully prepared and delivered, evoking considerable enthusiasm.

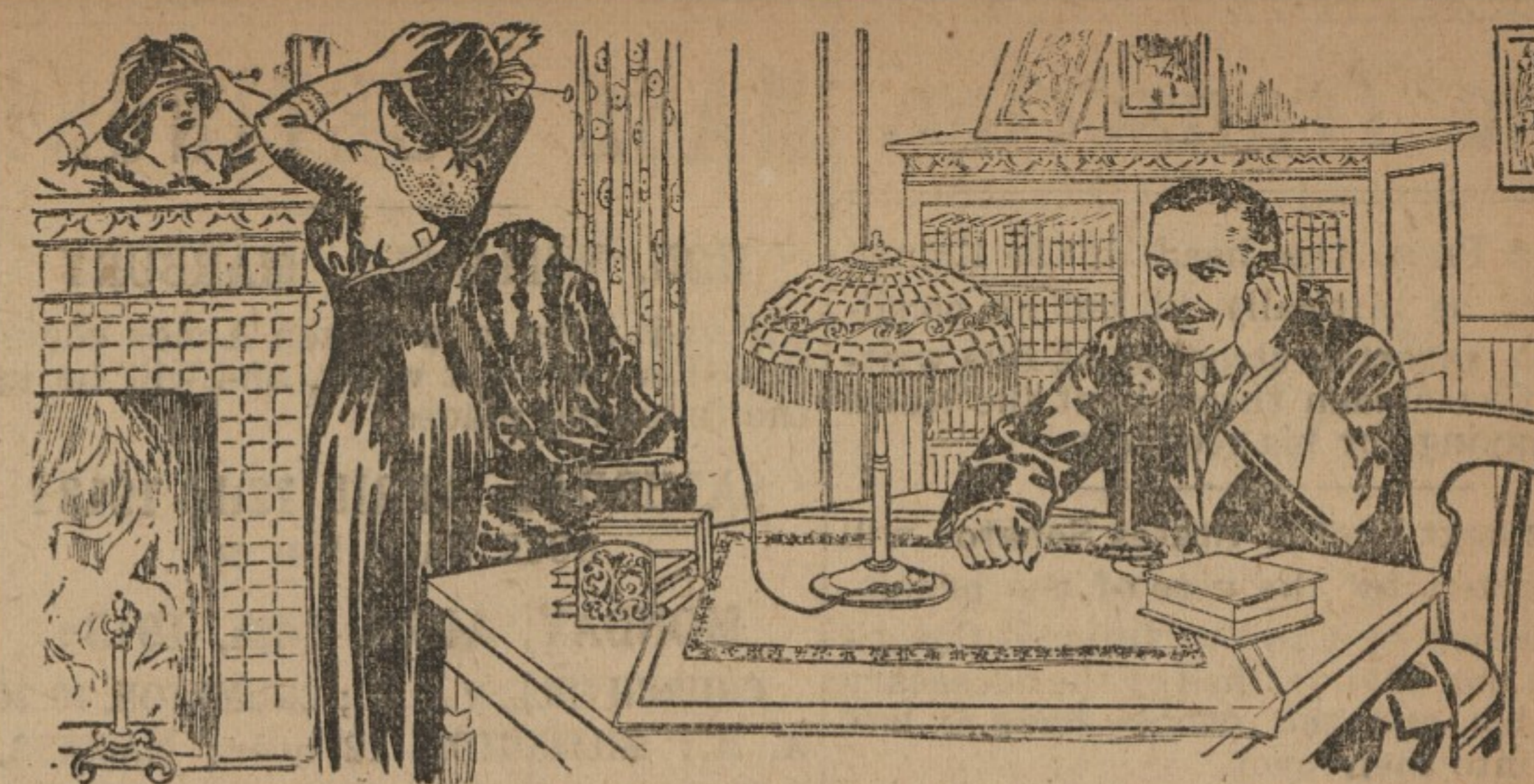
