

# The Transcript.

The selection of Prof. H. J. Patterson as the President of the Maryland Agricultural College is a fitting recognition of a most capable man. The TRANSCRIPT indorsed Prof. Patterson for the place several weeks ago.

HON. LLOYD WILKINSON, of Baltimore, was in Chestertown Tuesday. Whether he came in the interest of his own candidacy for Clerk of the Court of Appeals, or of Senator Smith's candidacy or both, we have not heard. The presumption is that his mission was a "double" one.

SENATOR SMITH bases his claim upon the voters of the State to his campaign contributions. How many thousands of times has he been repaid by his high tariff of \$2 on every 1000 feet of lumber he sells? Have not the tax-payers paid him far more tributes than he has given to the various county organizations to keep his friends in power?

NO WONDER the Organization forces could not attend the Marbury meeting in Firemen's Hall on Tuesday afternoon. The dose they got in Washington from Postmaster General Burleson, had not lost its effect when they reached Chestertown, and they were compelled to remain indoors for fear of taking cold. Poor old fellows, the only thing they have left now is the road engineer, and you bet they will use him for all they are worth while it lasts.

Senator Smith is not a particle of use to the Democrats at Washington now. He can't get a single job for his friends except Kelley, in Baltimore, and he has voted with the moneyed interests for high tariff against the people of his own State. He is clear out of touch with his party and people, and it is time for the State to have a representative who has some influence in appointments, and who is willing to place the interests of his people above his own selfish interests.

IF YOU want to be convinced of the absolute insincerity of Senator Smith and his reactionary followers in the State, just hear how they are honoring Mr. Bryan now, and compare their attitude now with their feeling towards Mr. Bryan during and prior to the Baltimore Convention. Senator Smith and his followers care about as much for Mr. Bryan now as they do for Senator Smith's money lawyer—TO GET VOTES. That's all they are ringing the changes on Mr. Bryan for now.

SENATOR SMITH'S POWER AT WASHINGTON IS DEAD. The only influence left him now is MONEY, and the Democrats of this State will never allow a High Protective tariff Democrat to represent the State of Maryland in the United States Senate BY BUYING HIS SEAT. That is the way Lorimer got to the Senate and he was a representative of the lumber interests, just like Senator Smith, who voted to retain Lorimer in the Senate. Shall the State of Maryland be called upon to suffer the disgrace of another Lorimer episode?

IT IS SAID that a straw will indicate the direction of the wind. Mr. Marbury recommended W. Finley Collins for postmaster at Millington, and Postmaster-General Burleson and President Wilson will see that Mr. Collins gets the appointment. President Wilson on Tuesday appointed Mr. Snowden Marshall, a cousin of Mr. Marbury, to one of the best appointments in New York city. You don't have to knock a man in the head with a brick to make him see things, do you? Can't any one tell where President Wilson's sympathies are in the senatorial fight, without being knocked in the head?

WHEN did the Organization faction get control of the sheriff? Sheriff McKee authorizes us to say that he endorsed the petition of Mr. Finley Collins for postmaster at Millington, and that he is not allied with the Organization faction in any manner whatsoever, as was stated to Postmaster-General Burleson in Washington by one of the HIKERS on Monday. That was a *wild misrepresentation* of the facts, and yet what is the use of making a fuss about that, when the delegation from Kent claimed all the credit for electing Congressman Covington? Leaving Mr. Covington and Sheriff McKee out of their reckoning, their strength dwindles to Messrs. Beck and Vickers and one member of the State Central Committee, which everybody knows is a hopeless minority, and has no claim to any recognition from the national administration.

THE HIKERS IN WASHINGTON. The HIKERS went to Washington last Sunday afternoon to see about the Millington postoffice. They came home with the name of Finley Collins pinned good and hard upon their coat tails. They put up a great big bluff, and tried to make Postmaster-General Burleson believe that they are the whole show in Kent county. They claimed everything in sight as usual, but Mr. Burleson called their bluff, and let them know that he knew as much about Kent county politics as the hikers did. He showed them Mr. Collins' petition which was indorsed by most of the patrons of the Millington postoffice, by two of the three members of the State Central Committee, by the five county commissioners, the Register of Wills, his deputy, the county treasurer, by the sheriff and other influential officials, and said Mr. Burleson, "If you Democrats elect these gentlemen, you must stand by them." Mr. Postmaster-General gave the hikers to understand that Mr. Collins will be appointed postmaster at Millington. Said Postmaster-General Burleson that we had some friends who had been elected to offices in Kent, and who did not indorse Mr. Collins. We referred him to Congressman Covington, Senator Beck, the sheriff, State's Attorney Vickers, one member of the State Central Committee and others, who as truly represent one element of the party as do two members of the State Central Committee and the five county commissioners who indorsed Mr. Collins. BUT IT WAS USELESS. WE'RE UP AGAINST IT." And so they are, you just guess. Congressman Covington informed the delegation that he could not afford to oppose the national administration.

## MR. MARBURY IN KENT.

Mr. Marbury's tour of Kent county and parts of Queen Anne's was a most successful one. Everywhere he went he impressed the voters with his sincerity, his ability and his genuine Democracy. Mr. Marbury's style of speaking is conversational. There is nothing bombastic about him. His style of argument is simple, plain and convincing, and his manner is such as to attract rather than repel. Mr. Marbury undoubtedly made many new friends in his tour, and the impression he made upon the people will continue to grow until, when he can "catch up" with the many falsehoods that are being circulated by his opponents concerning his past record, he will win the hearts and sympathies of the great mass of the voters, who will come to know that Marbury is brilliant, that he is honest, and that he is in thorough accord with the principles and policies of President Wilson and William Jennings Bryan, the great leaders of our modern Democracy, and that he is worthy in every respect to represent our great State in the Senate. Mr. Marbury was much pleased with his cordial reception everywhere. He spoke in the friendliest terms of his opponents, and he feels absolutely confident that he will carry Kent county by a handsome majority. His friends here are jubilant over the receipt he received, and they feel confident that his visit here has not only strengthened Mr. Marbury greatly, but that he has greatly enhanced the prospects of a Progressive Democratic victory at the primaries in September.

## A FUNNY CODE OF MORALS.

In its long and "borrowed" attack upon Mr. Marbury's Democracy last Saturday the Beck Organ said:

"We will excuse Mr. Marbury's antagonism to the ticket in 1895, when many Democrats opposed it. It seems to us to be a funny code of morals that would permit one man to do wrong because many do wrong. 'Tis true that one sinner may not do as much harm as many, but the sin is just as grievous whether one commits it or whether many are guilty. But why excuse Mr. Marbury for his alleged opposition to the Democratic ticket in 1895, and then unmercifully censure him for fighting the Democratic ring twenty years ago?"

Here is the answer: The Kent News was among the many who proved their disloyalty to the Democratic ticket in 1895, and the Kent News not only assisted in electing a Republican Governor, but that paper was absolutely responsible for the defeat of the County Democratic ticket in 1895, as well as in intervening years to 1903, and believing that their unjust and unwarranted attack upon Mr. Marbury, would be a strong reminder of their own political disloyalty, they are willing to excuse Mr. Marbury for fighting the Democratic ring in 1895. If we apply the Kent News' attack upon Mr. Marbury's Democracy to local politics, what right has the Kent News to suggest that Democrats when their OCCASIONAL DEMOCRACY is recalled? If Mr. Marbury has no right to participate in a DEMOCRATIC primary, according to the Kent News' code of political morals, pray tell us what right has the Kent News to participate in a Democratic primary for its offices upon its past record?

We will endorse Mr. Marbury's brand of Democracy anytime and anywhere in preference to that of the Kent News, and their false and unwarranted attacks upon Mr. Marbury's Democracy are an insult to every Wilson Democrat in Kent county, especially since the Kent News and its reactionary crowd have no more loyal Democrat to offer to the voters than Senator John Walter Smith, who has been voting and working with the Republican High Tariff money interests ever since he has been in the Senate. President Wilson thought enough of Mr. Marbury's Democracy to have him manage his campaign in this State, and John Walter Smith thought well enough of Mr. Marbury's Democracy so long as he could use him; and anyone whose Democracy has been so irregular as has Senator Smith's and the Kent News, has no right to sit in judgment upon any man's party loyalty. ## THE TAX-PAYERS BEAR THE BURDEN.

The decision of the Court of Appeals in the case of Harry Richardson vs. the Board of County Commissioners, places the burden of incompetent road management in this county upon the tax-payers. It makes no difference how much money the road engineer spends on the roads, or how incompetent his management of the roads is, it is the tax-payers who, because of the iniquitous road law which the Organization under the leadership of William W. Beck forced down the throats of our tax-payers, are forced to bear the responsibility for the condition of our roads, though they have no control over the engineer nor any supervision of the work on the roads. The present road law is about the most vicious piece of legislation ever enacted in this county, and the Organization faction is not only responsible for the passage of this law, but they are absolutely responsible for the present incompetent and negligent management of our highways. The Board of Commissioners did exactly right in testing the law in the courts. They have found out exactly what the law is, and they have convinced the tax-payers that they are absolutely helpless to relieve them of such a burden. Such a condition is a disgrace to the tax-payers, and yet the Kent News is kicking about the expenditure of a paltry \$300 or \$400 in an effort to relieve the tax-payers of an unjust and unprecedented burden, when they sit smilingly by and permit this injustice to be done our tax-payers, and allow an incompetent road engineer to waste \$225,000 of the tax-payers' money on the roads last year, and with the worst roads the county has had in its history. What are the tax-payers going to do about it? Are they going to submit to such treatment, and allow a faction to continue to force such burdens upon them for no other reason under the sun than to play politics with the tax-payers' money to the ruin of the roads? We urge our tax-payers to see to it that the Anti-Organization candidates for the Legislature are nominated and elected this fall, who will prevent the Organization from inflicting further burdens upon them, just as they did in the last session of the Legislature when Mr. Beck wanted to force through the legislature bills providing for the expenditure of \$68,000 of the people's money without giving them the right to say whether this enormous sum should be spent or not. Mr. Harris and Mr. Miller saved the people this enormous expense.

The county commissioners of Cecil county have appointed former county commissioner Miller F. McDowell, of Port Deposit, road engineer to succeed Mr. Joseph Richards, who has resigned to accept another position.

Several ladies were in the machine, who were enroute for the train, and the accident caused them to remain overnight.
