Revising Cecil History.

Victor Torbert, Esq., former editor and owner of the Cecil Whig, has undertaken the task of revising Johnson's History of Cecil County, and bringing it up to date. Mr. Torbert is well versed in the history of Cecil county, and he has undertaken the work at the repeated and urgent requests from Cecil countians as well as from other interested persons in all parts of the State. The intention is to supplement the Johnson Edition, in order that it may include the history of the county up to the present time, and embrace other facts of local importance, pertaining to family records, development in its various fields—etcetera, with required illustrations in order that the great advantages and attractiveness of this favored section may be widely understood and appreciated.

Mr. Torbert is well-known in this county. One of his ancestors, Simon Wilmer, settled in Kent county in 1660, and his great-grandfather, Edward Price Wilmer, owned and lived at Wilmer Point in Kent. His paternal ancestors settled in Kent county, Del., in 1680. Quite a number of Kent countians have subscribed for several copies of the history.
