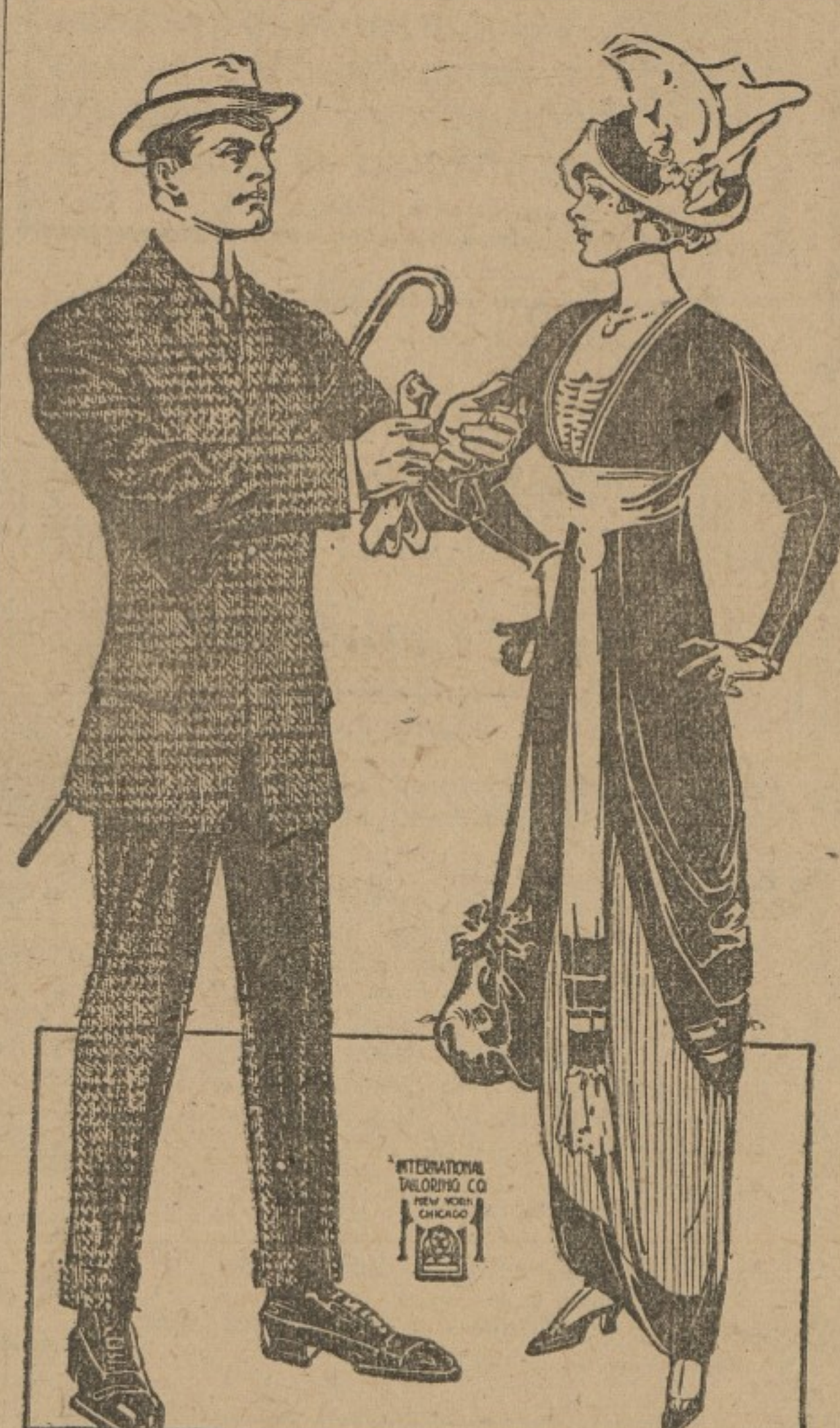

Ice Plant Sold.
Mr. Robert G. Nicholson has sold to the Chestertown Electric Light and Power Company his large and splendidly equipped ice plant, situated near the old depot. The consideration is \$20,778.36. When negotiations for the transfer of this property arose, both parties to the transaction agreed to abide by the decision of three arbitrators, as to the value of the plant. By mutual agreement former Judge James A. Pearce, Messrs. George D. Lofland and Merrick Clements, were appointed arbitrators, and after performing their duties faithfully and well, going into every detail of the plant, the good-will, etc., these gentlemen agreed upon the price stated above as a fair and just valuation of the plant. Mr. Nicholson has been officially notified of the sale, and possession will be given as soon as the necessary papers are signed. The location of the plant will remain unchanged for the remainder of this year, after which it may be removed to the company's property on the old Thompson wharf. Mr. Nicholson has given the public good service during the time he has owned the ice plant. He has manufactured a fine grade of ice and sold it at a reasonable price to the consumer. We have every reason to believe that the new owners will do the same thing, and give the public the same satisfactory service. It is rumored that the purchase of the ice plant may mean day electric light service for the town.
