### THE SERVANT PROBLEM.

How One Farmer's Wife Settled it Satisfactorily.

We are situated some few miles from any town or village, and it seems impossible to secure even decent help, as all of the really good women want to live very near town. Having tried one after another, with about the same success, driven to desperation, I determined to do the work myself, and in spite of all protests from my family I refused to consider help and plunged in. Dire and dreadful were the prophecies. "You will always be tired to death and look like a fright," one member exclaimed. Another declared, "I would be so tired and cross there would be no living with me, so immediately packed her suit cases and fled to the city. She returned in a few months time to find my temper improved, as there was no slipshod work, no waste of food, and we never had to search half an hour for some particular cooking utensil, only to find it hidden somewhere in a frightful condition, as was so often the case when we had a girl.

I was determined to so arrange the work that the afternoons would be free for rest, reading, sewing or visiting. By planning my meals ahead, and partially preparing supper while getting dinner, I easily had four hours nearly every afternoon. The dinner dishes were out of the way by one and it was not necessary to start supper until five. In spring and fall, I would go out at four o'clock to attend to my poultry, but by the time the young poultry was trained to come for feed to the coops and go to roost I usually did not go out until five, as I could attend to them while my fire was getting hot.

On Monday I did my washing. The clothes were soaped before breakfast and allowed to soak while we were eating, and I was cleaning the dishes. Tuesday was ironing day. Wednesday and Fridays were the regular cleaning days. As we make our own butter I also had the milk to attend to. We used a stand separator. While breakfast was cooking I drew off the milk and cream and washed the cans thoroughly, scalding and then cooling them. The men always emptied the milk for me as they also strained the fresh milk.

The rooms were brushed and dusted every morning except Sunday. We used all the downstairs, four large rooms and a hall, so do not think I made the family sit in the kitchen in order to save work.

We have as much company as ever before and frequent callers. They do not hinder my work, but really give me new energy as I find stopping to entertain freshens one greatly.

Personally "I look none the worse for the wear," as I consider it of the utmost importance that I take care of myself and my appearance, so I am "bathed and brushed" as regularly as ever. I have heavy gloves for sweeping, spreading beds, and any outdoor work I may do, and use a mop for washing dishes. When doing the weekly wash I never get my hands in very hot water, or plunge from hot to cold, as this will enlarge joints. I have holders hanging near the stove to handle all hot or greasy cooking utensils.

After giving the work a year's fair trial, I was determined that while I lasted, and the domestic labor was such a problem, I for one would do my own work. I enjoy planning and preparing meals for it is a wonderfully attractive work.

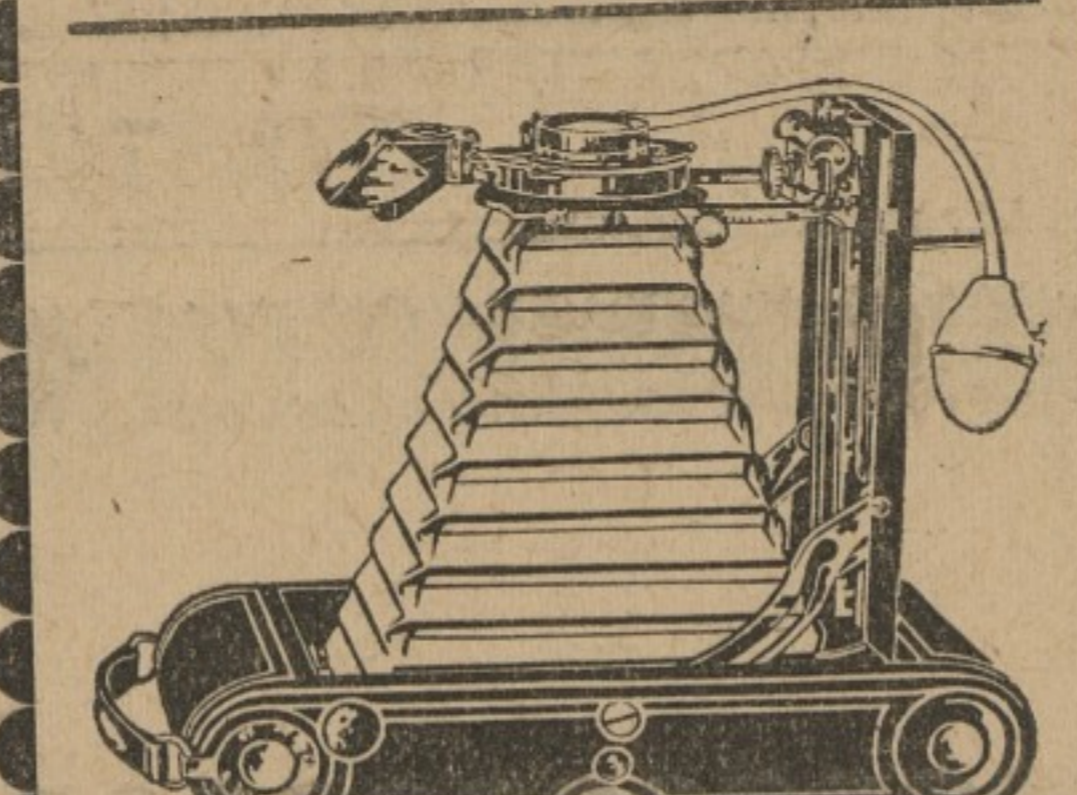
