OUR DEATH RECORD.

JOHN NEWELL DODD.
Mr. John Newell Dodd, one of the town's most prominent citizens, died at his home on High street last Saturday evening about six o'clock, of a complication of diseases, in the 67th year of his age. The deceased had been in failing health and suffering with loss of eyesight for some years, but his critical illness was only of about a week's duration. The deceased was born and raised in this town. He was the son of the late John T. and Mary Jane Dodd, pioneer Methodist Protestants in this town, and two of the noblest and best people that ever lived. For years the son was associated with the father in the undertaking and contracting business, in connection with which they conducted a large lumber business. After the death of the father in 1874, the son succeeded to the control of the business which he successfully conducted until about five years ago, when on account of failing health he sold the business and equipment to his nephew, Mr. Charles L. Dodd, and retired to the quiet of his home life. Mr. Dodd was a man of gentle manner, and for years his home was the synonym of hospitality and a place where many friends found a cordial welcome and splendid entertainment. In his younger days the deceased was quite a musician, and he was one of the leaders and promoters of the old Kent Cornet Band. He was one of the best undertakers the county ever had, and enjoyed a large patronage. He is survived by a widow, who before marriage was a Miss Smith, daughter of the late Mrs. Anna B. Smith. He also leaves one sister, Mrs. A. M. Bowers. Funeral services were held from his late residence on High street, on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, conducted by Rev. W. R. Graham. Interment was made in Chester cemetery. The pallbearers were: Messrs. Charles L. Dodd, Wm. F. Russell, Fred G. Usilton, Wm. R. Maul, J. Newell Graham, Marion deK. Smith, Dr. Frank E. Hines and Dr. H. L. Dodd. The floral tributes were profuse and beautiful. Undertaker Charles L. Dodd had charge of the funeral arrangements and was assisted by Undertaker Wm. H. Mason, of Still Pond, a life-long friend of the deceased.

MRS. W. J. TOLSON.

Mrs. W. J. Tolson died at her late home on Cypress street, Millington, last Saturday at 3 P. M., of diabetes, aged 66 years. Mrs. Tolson had been in ill health for about two years, having the attention of her physician every day for fourteen months, often 3 or 4 times a day. The funeral was held on Tuesday at 1 P. M. at her late home. Rev. A. E. Owens, pastor of Trinity M. E. Church, officiated, and J. L. Smith was the undertaker. Besides her husband, she leaves four daughters, namely: Mrs. F. F. Boushall, of Philadelphia, Pa.; Mrs. W. E. Hilyard, of Georgetown, Del.; Mrs. Edgar Stevens, of near Sudlersville, and Mrs. Leonard Wilson, of near Tolson, Wilmington, Del. Mr. Frank Tolson, of Chester, Pa., and Mr. Harry Tolson, of Chester, Pa., were profuse. Messrs. Edward Jones, Benjamin Benton, Adolphus Davis and W. A. Felton. Interment in Millington cemetery.

MISS MYRTLE SMITH.

Miss Myrtle Smith, daughter of Mr. Wilson Smith, of this town, died at the home of her aunt, Mrs. Holdson, on High street, on Thursday evening, of gastritis, aged 22 years. The young lady had been living in Baltimore with her brother, but had been visiting her aunt for about a month, in hopes that the country air would improve her health. The remains were taken to Baltimore by steamer B. S. Ford, yesterday morning for interment. Funeral services will be held at the home of her mother to-day with interment in Loudon Park Cemetery, Baltimore. The pallbearers here were Messrs. Jas. Cressley, Norman Nelson, Albert Wheat, Geo. Burk, Thomas Holdson and C. L. Dodd. Undertaker Chas. L. Dodd had charge of the funeral arrangements.

MRS. DORA A. CROUCH.

SUFFRAGE CAMPAIGN OPENS IN KENT.

Meetings to be Held Over the County.

Every important center in Kent will hear of votes for women, if the Just Government League carries out its plans. Miss L. C. Trax, State organizer, is assisting the local league in arranging meetings over the county. The following have been planned:

Foster, president of the Maryland Association of Graduate Nurses; Mr. P. P. Ramey and Mr. Thos. G. Campbell, barristers of Baltimore.

DR. SUDLER WINS CASE.

L. Wethered Barroll, Esq., Defeats Former Attorney-General Isaac Lobe Straus in a Legal Battle Before the Court of Appeals.

The Court of Appeals on Saturday handed down a decision upholding the ruling of the Queen Anne's County Orphan's Court appointing Dr. Foster Sudler, of Sudlersville, guardian of the infant Laury Beaty, giving him jurisdiction of property estimated at several thousand dollars.

The case was contested by Isaac Lobe Straus, representing John E. Sudler, who sought to have the order of the Orphan's Court annulled. L. Wethered Barroll, of Baltimore, represented Dr. Foster Sudler and argued this case against Mr. Straus at Annapolis several weeks ago.

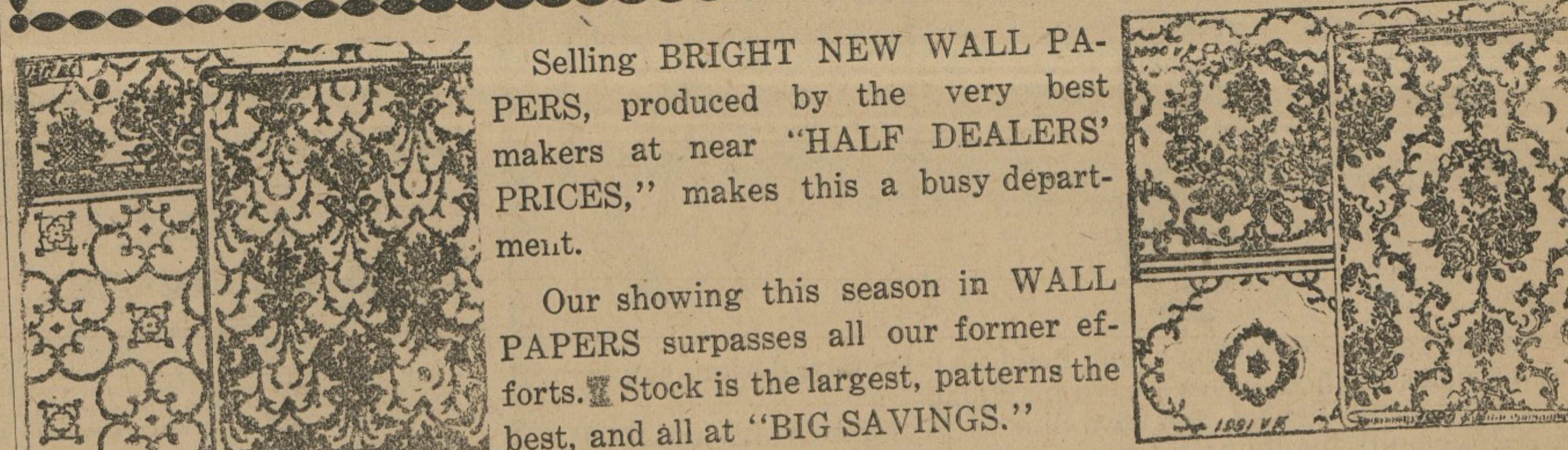
