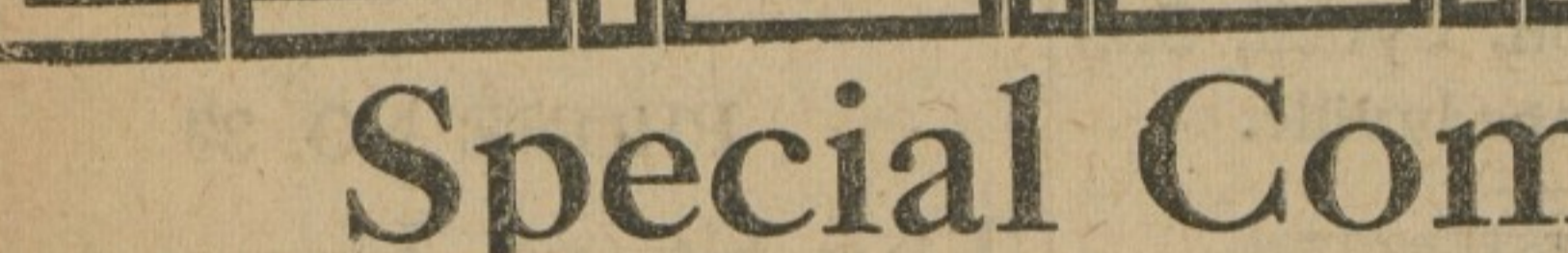

## Did Bryan Have Smith in Mind?

Secretary of State William Jennings Bryan delivered a notable speech recently in Harrisburg, Pa. Did he have such men as Senator John Walter Smith in mind when he made this significant statement?

"It is a settled principle of the country," exclaimed the Secretary, "that a platform is binding upon every man that runs on that platform. Some men violate platforms because they say they cannot violate their conscience. Far be it from me to have any man violate his conscience. No man should violate his conscience, but that does not mean that he should violate his party platform. It means that his conscience should begin to work before he is elected and not afterward. If, after election, he cannot violate his conscience to keep his party pledges he should resign and not put his conscience above the conscience of his constituents."

"A man who violates a party platform and betrays his party and the people, is a criminal worse than the man who embezzles money," declared the Secretary as he pounded the speaker's desk.

Senator Smith violated his party platform when he voted with the stand-pat Republicans in the Senate for a tariff of \$2 on lumber, after his party platform demanded the immediate repeal of the duty on lumber. Mr. Bryan knows the record of Senator Smith as well as that of every other high tariff Democrat, and his statement is a most significant one in view of Senator Smith's candidacy for reelection.

## POULTRY NOTES.

### Production of Better Eggs.

It is conservatively estimated that the farmers of the United States lose over \$45,000,000 annually because of the improper care of the eggs on the farms.

The enormous loss is due to small eggs, cracked and broken eggs, dirty eggs, stale eggs, heated (hatched) eggs and rotten eggs.

It may be easily prevented and the number of eggs produced per hen increased if the following suggestions are followed:

1. Keep pure bred fowls of the general purpose breeds, such as some variety of Plymouth Rocks, Wyandottes, Rhode Island Reds or Orpingtons.
2. Use eggs from hatching from only the most vigorous hens and roosters, and be sure that the eggs weigh at least one and one-half pounds per dozen, or two ounces apiece.
3. Keep the best, healthiest, and quickest growing of the early hatched chickens for laying and brooding stock next year. Sell the runts and late hatched chicks.
4. Keep the males away from the hens, or sell the males, not later than June 1, in order that the eggs laid by the hens during the hot summer months may be infertile and not start to hatch.
5. Provide clean, dry, dark nests in a clean, dry place. Keep the nests clean and dry for five or six days.
6. Gather eggs at least once per day, in the afternoon; twice per day in hot weather, or when hens will soil eggs with muddy feet.
7. Keep eggs in a cool, clean, dry place away from fires.
8. Send eggs to market as often as possible, at least once each week, or ten times in the summer time.
9. Do not sell eggs from stollen nests or incubators, nor wash dirty eggs. Consume the small, dirty add crack eggs.
10. Insist that the buyer purchase your eggs on a graded quality basis, in order that you may get a better price for large, clean fresh eggs than is paid for small, dirty, cracked, stale or rotten eggs.
11. Ask the buyer to show you how to candle eggs and determine their quality, then make an egg candle for yourself and use it.

WHEREAS, In the death of this noble, sweet-spirited and loyal child of God, this society, as well as the church and community, have met with a great loss; and

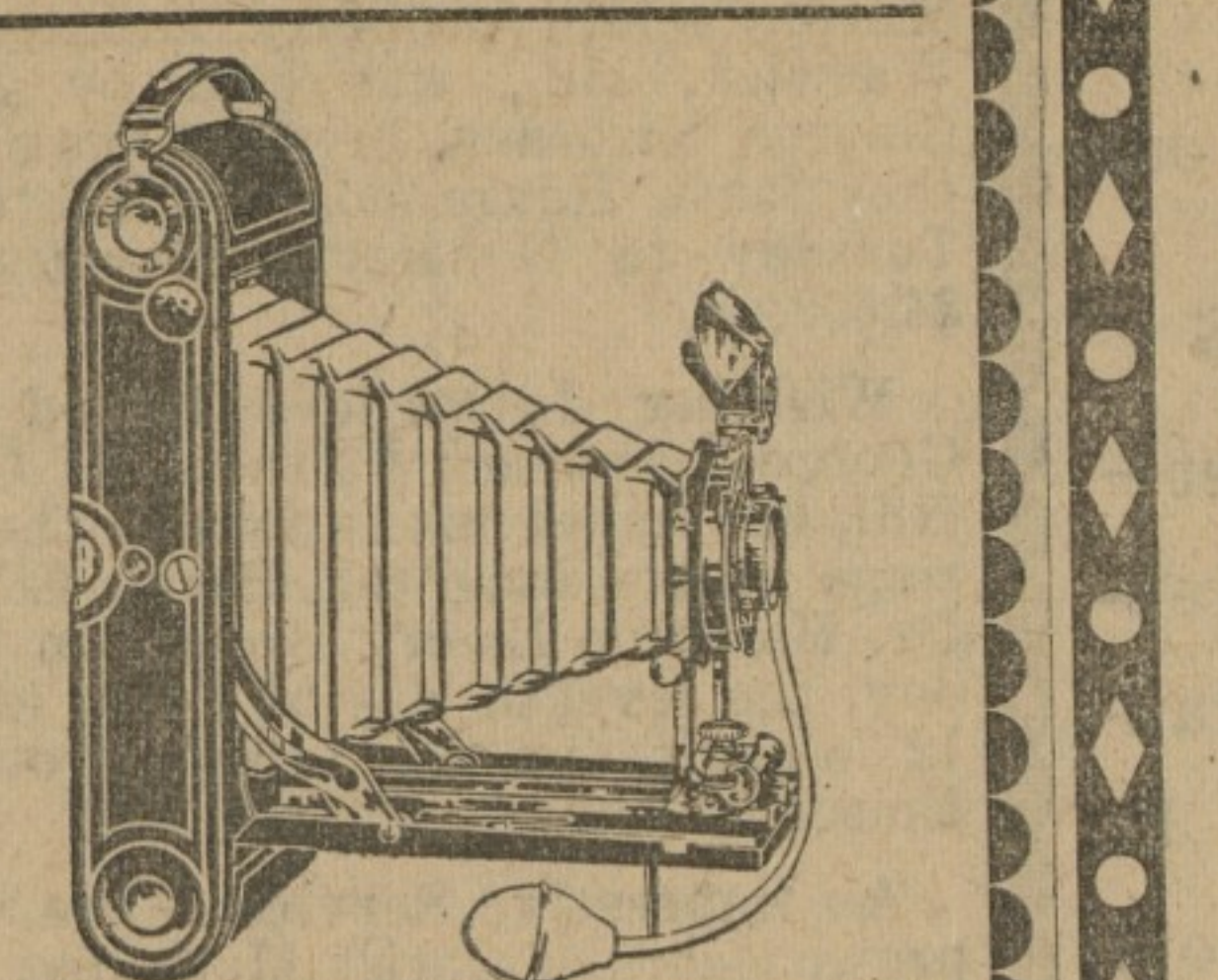

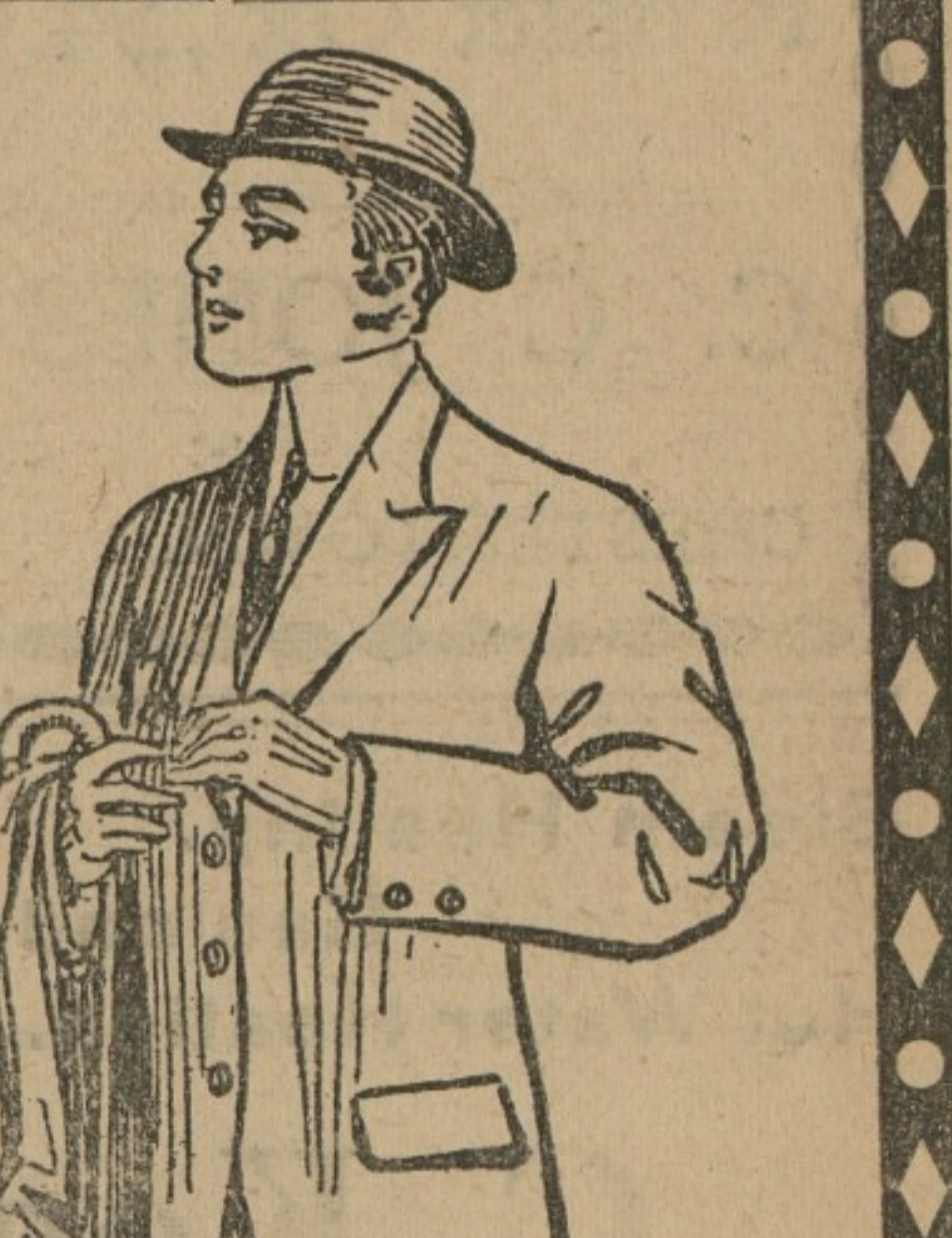
